WADDELL, Bridget Died on November 10, 1926 at the age of seventy-three; buried Catholic Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WVMC).

WADDELL, H.B. Enlisted during World War I; listed on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga. Possessed an allotment at Toole's Creek Soldier Settlement in 1918 (DA Dec 11, 1918).

WADDELL, John Lived at Cowabee in the Wagga Wagga district. Enlisted during World War I; 11th Battalion; listed on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga. Died on November 24, 1918 at the age of forty-six; buried Catholic Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery after a military funeral (DA Nov 26, 1918; and WVMC).

WADDUIS, S. Rode "Barranjoey", owned by H.P. Chew, to victory in the Wagga Gold Cup in 1909 (DA Apr 30, 1917).

WADDUPS, F. Attended the Christian Brothers High School, Wagga Wagga. Enlisted during World War I; listed on the Honour Roll of the Christian Brothers High School and on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga (not listed on AWM Nominal Roll). Deceased by 1920 (DA Dec 16, 1920).

WADDUPS, Henry Bede Enlisted on December 7, 1916 during World War I; lance corporal, 36th Battalion; killed in action on January 21, 1917; listed on Soldiers' Memorial, Wagga Wagga (AWM Nominal Roll; and DA Sept 18, 1922).

WADE, John Born in New South Wales. Roman Catholic. Single. Porter, Wagga Wagga. Died at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital on October 13, 1905 at the age of sixty-three (WWDH Reg).

WADE, William Born Leeds, England. Emigrated to South Australia. Died at Barmedman, New South Wales, on April 22, 1874 at the age of forty; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery.

WAGG, Misses Milliners and dressmakers in Gurwood Street, Wagga Wagga, in the 1870s.

WAINSCOTT, Henry Applied to the Wagga Wagga Council for a licence to ply for hire a motor car but refused; later proceeded against by Borough Inspector for plying for hire a motor car without a licence and fined five shillings plus costs (WWA Oct 4 & 15, 1904).

WAITE, Alfred Richard Married Ellen Isabella Middleton* at Corowa, New South Wales, on December 14, 1874. Died at Wagga Wagga on May 18, 1907; buried at Albury, New South Wales.

WAITE, Ellen Wife of Alfred Richard nee Middleton. Lived in Wodonga, Victoria, in 1917. Died on April 24, 1945.

WAITE, G. Attended the Christian Brothers High School, Wagga Wagga. Parents lived in Albury; brother, W., lived at Borambola. Draftsman, Wagga Wagga Lands Office. Enlisted during World War I; returned in September 1919; listed on the Honour Roll of the Christian Brothers High School and on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga (DA Jan 18, 1916; Sept 17, 1919; and Dec 16, 1920).

WAITE, W. Partner in "Arajoel" station with Messrs P.W. Williamson* and Hutchins and later J.E. Bouffler. Married Miss Lind in 1927. Lived in Kincaid Street, Wagga Wagga, in a house formerly occupied by Bouffler (DA Apr 25, 1927).

WAKEFIELD, William Member of Manchester Unity Independant Order of Oddfellows. Enlisted on October 10, 1915 during World War I; private, 1st Division Motor Transport Company; awarded a Military Medal; returned to Australia on May 11, 1919 (AWM Nominal Roll; and DA Nov 1, 1917).

WAKEFORD, W.H. Enlisted during World War I; listed on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga.

WAKEM, Ernest Second son of James. Married Mary Montgomery Hailey* at St Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Wagga Wagga, on April 9, 1919 (DA Apr 10, 1919).

WAKEM, Frederick James Died on December 26, 1894 at the age of eleven months; buried Wesleyan Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WAKEM, James Son of John Simons (Wakem) of Milton Abbot, Devonshire, England. Born Calstock, England, in 1857. Emigrated to Australia. Lived at Forest Hill, Wagga Wagga, until 1919 (DA Apr 26, 1919). Lived Murray Street, Wagga Wagga, in 1923. Died on March 28, 1955 at the age of ninety-seven years and eleven months; buried Wesleyan Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC). Sons: Ernest; and Samuel John.

WAKEM, Mary Ann Daughter of John Simons (Wakem) of Milton Abbot, Devonshire, England. Married James Henwood* and came to Australia with her husband and three children c.1883; and settled at Lake Albert, Wagga Wagga.

WAKEM, Mary Ann Died on January 24, 1934 at the age of seventy; buried Wesleyan Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WAKEM, Maud Died on March 14, 1894 at the age of eight; buried Wesleyan Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WAKEM, Samuel John Son of James. Enlisted on April 15, 1915 during World War I and farewelled at the Methodist School Hall; driver, 1st Field Artillery Brigade; served in Egypt and France; gassed and sent to hospital in England; returned to Australia on May 12, 1918; listed on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga (DA

Oct 1, 1915; May 2, 1918; June 14, 1918; July 8, 1918; and July 16, 1918). Married Doris Lorraine Jennings* at the Brucedale Methodist Church on September 8, 1921 (DA Sept 17, 1921). Died on December 20, 1969 at the age of seventy-nine; buried Methodist Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WALD, G.F. (Gavin?) Arrived in Wagga Wagga from Western Australia in 1917 to manage Wagga Wagga branch of the Commonwealth Bank (DA Jan 27, 1917). Member of the finance sub-committee of the Reinforcement Referendum Committee, which supported conscription (DA Nov 20, 1917). Member of the Wagga Wagga District Hospital Committee (Morris ADB p.267). Enlisted in 1918 during World War I after trying to get leave to enlist for two years; and was succeeded at the bank by T.H. Slatyer* (DA May 23, 1918; and June 7, 10 & 11, 1918).

WALE, Kevin Policeman; began work as a police clerk in 1955; probationary constable 1961; and served his first year at Redfern, Sydney; then transferred to Henty until 1966; then lock-up keeper at Hay for nearly eleven years; promoted to sergeant in 1977 and remained stationed as officer in charge of Nundle till the following year; transferred to Kootingal till 1984; then Temora two years; and then Wagga Wagga in August 1984 as senior sergeant and the domestic violence liaison officer for Wagga Wagga; to be appointed to the rank of inspector in 1988 (DA June 28, 1988 p.5; Ill).

WALKER, A.B. Policeman, New South Wales; joined the force in 1867; served at Grafton and Uralla; senior sergeant at Glen Innes in 1874; transferred to Wagga Wagga as acting sub-inspector in 1879 and pursued the Kelly gang during this time; transferred to Walgett as sub-inspector in 1880; at Young from 1883; appointed Inspector in

1889; succeeded Inspector Harrison* at Wagga Wagga in 1891; transferred to Deniliquin in 1895 (DA Jan 27, 1891; and Apr 9, 1895).

WALKER, Cyril Joseph Lived at Yerong Creek, New South Wales. Enlisted during World War I; first soldier from the district to be killed, in an accident at Maroubra Bay (DA Oct 26, 1914).

WALKER, Edward Labourer, Wagga Wagga, in the 1850s. Purchased allotments 1 and 4, section 35 at Wagga Wagga on February 28, 1856 (WWBB); and purchased allotments 1-5, Section 30 at the auction sale of March 25, 1857. Account with the Australian Joint Stock Bank, Wagga Wagga, 1860-61 (Ledger). Wife: Emily Eliza. Son: Edward.

WALKER, Edward Son of Edward and Emily Eliza. Born on April 3, 1855 and baptized at Wagga Wagga by the Reverend Samuel Fox* on July 20, 1856 (BDM).

WALKER, Frederick Migrated from England with his brother. Station superintendant in south western districts, New South Wales. First Clerk of Petty Sessions at Tumut in 1845 (Tumut Centenary Booklet p.23). Appointed Clerk of Petty Sessions at Wagga Wagga on May 10, 1847; reported to Henry Bingham*, Commissioner of Crown Lands for the Murrumbidgee District, on June 14, 1847 as there were not any resident magistrates at Wagga Wagga (AONSW 4/2759); applied to the Colonial Secretary for six weeks leave of absence on February 24, 1848 but was advised to apply to the Wagga Wagga Bench first (Colonial Secretary Correspondence AONSW 4/3860); later that year resigned to take up appointment as the commandant of the Native Police (AONSW 4/3860; and WWA Aug 7, 1875). Died in 1866 (Bushby p.40).

WALKER, James D. Mining Warden at Tumut, New South Wales, for a number of years. Clerk of Petty

Sessions at Wagga Wagga 1908-16. Prominent in many committees. Member of the Wagga Wagga District Hospital Committee 1909-12; and 1915-16 and vice president for a while (Morris ADB pp.267). Member of the School of Arts Committee, vice president for a while and president in 1916 (DA May 5, 1916). President of the Library Institute. President of the Literary and Natural History Society (DA June 17, 1916). President of the Wagga Wagga Historical Society until August 1916. Prominent in church work and represented the Wagga Wagga parish at the Anglican Synod at Goulburn. Commanding officer of the Wagga Wagga Rifle Club from May 1915 (DA May 25, 1915). Helped organise recruiting drives during World War I (DA July 14, 1915). Left Wagga Wagga in August 1916 to take up the appointment as Resident Chamber Magistrate at Bathurst (DA Aug 1 & 29, 1916). Son: Roy.

WALKER, John Francis Born at Parramatta, Sydney. Resided in the Riverina district for sixty years. Grazier at "Ravenswood" at the junction of Ten Mile and Mountain Creeks; sold this and selected land at Grong Grong; then purchased "Quandary" near Temora; later engaged in stage coach driving and twice encountered the bushranger, Dan Morgan*. Married a daughter of John Purtell*. Died at Coolamon in 1909 (WWA Sept 2, 1909). Daughter: Mrs A. Battersby.

WALKER, L.W. Enlisted during World War I; listed on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga.

WALKER, Mary Ann Born at Kilkenny in 1820. Roman Catholic. Emigrated to Australia on the **Duke Cornwall** in 1846. Domestic servant. Admitted to the Wagga Wagga Gaol on November 30, 1862 on a charge of murder; forwarded to Goulburn for trial on December 8 (Wagga Wagga Gaol Entrance Book, 1862 AONSW Reel 2377).

WALKER, Roy Son of James D. Attended the Wagga Wagga Primary School. Enlisted during World War I; corporal; and made a sergeant before transferred to the front in 1916; listed on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga (DA Aug 1, 1916).

WALKER, Walter James Son of W. of Haberfield. Enlisted in the "Kangaroo" contingent on December 1, 1915 during World War I; private, 55th Battalion; returned to Australia on June 10, 1919 (AWM Nominal Roll; and DA July 15, 1919).

WALKER, William Born in Scotland in 1787. Employed by a Calcutta firm for a number of years and visited Sydney in 1813 and again in 1820. Member of the firm William Walker and Co with nephew, Thomas Walker, and brother, James; and financed John Smith* and later his son, Alick Smith*, of "Kyeamba", Wagga Wagga district; held pastoral licences for "Kyeamba" (16,000 acres) and "Jellingroo" (25,000 acres) in 1848. Director of the Bank of New South Wales; owned a wharf at Dawes Point; and strongly involved in shipping and whaling (ADB 2 pp.565-6).

WALKER, Miss Yvonne Renowned for strong organisational abilities and efficiency; secretary of the Wagga Show Society 1947-72; and secretary to the mayor of the Wagga Wagga City Council from 1972. Died on April 23, 1988 at the age of fifty-six (DA Apr 26, 1988 p.5).

WALKOM, Archibald John Joined the Postal Department in 1877. Divisional engineer, Postal Department, Wagga Wagga, from c.1918; retired "after a long and meritorious service" in the engineering section of the Postal Department in 1928 (DA July 9, 1928). Keen interest in the Wagga Wagga Eisteddfod. Died in Sydney in September 1942 (DA Sept 23, 1942). Children: Arthur; Bert; and Winnie.

WALKOM, Winnie Probably the daughter of Archibald John. Member of St Andrew's Tennis Club, Wagga Wagga. Left Wagga Wagga in 1921 to marry J. Boulton of Sydney (DA May 2, 1921).

WALL, Arthur Son of Charles; born c.1875.

WALL, Charles Born in Gloucestershire, England. Storekeeper; at first employed by William Brown* at North Wagga Wagga in the early 1850s; then purchased Brown's store c.1855; conducted the store in a canvas tent in Gardner Street, North Wagga; registered as a spirit merchant on January 1, 1857 (GH May 10, 1856; and Morris NWPS p.6); removed to more commodious premises between two public houses in North Wagga in 1858 (WWE Oct 30, 1858); also established a large general store in Fitzmaurice Street, Wagga Wagga (building constructed by Charles Hardy* and Thomas Henderson Hodson* and known as Riverine Stores) in 1866 (WWE Mar 24, 1866); retired from business as a storekeeper, Fitzmaurice Street, in 1877 and leased premises to Mr Henry of Gurwood Street (WWA Jan 27, 1877). Also a farmer and an agent in the 1870s (WWE June 29, 1872) and took an active part in initiating steamboat navigation of the Murrumbidgee, Wagga Wagga to Hay and Echuca. Account with the Australian Joint Stock Bank, Wagga Wagga, 1860-61 (Ledger). Director of the Wagga Wagga Sugar Manufacturing Company; and purchased the sugar factory in September 1873, producing some sugar and selling it for thirty pounds per ton locally (WWE Jan 6, 1872; Mar 2, 1872; Mar 23, 1872; and Apr 3, 1872; and Swan WW p.96). Member of the provisional committee appointed to take the preliminary steps to obtain a pontoon bridge over the Murrumbidgee in 1859 (WWE Sept 10, 1859). Attended dinner for William Macleay* at the Australian Hotel in 1859 (WWE June 11, 1859). Steward at the

annual races at North Wagga Wagga in 1859. Contributed one guinea towards the reward for person responsible for incendiarism on Patrick Fennell's property in 1859 (WWE Feb 19, 1859). Member of the jury in trial of Hector Gillies* in 1878. Member of the finance committee, Anglican Church. Member of the Wagga Wagga Hospital Committee 1871-76 (Morris ADB p.267). Opposed to the collection of border duties in 1872. One of applicants for the establishment of a provisional school at North Wagga in 1879 (Morris NWPS pp.28-30). Alderman, Wagga Wagga Council 1870-77 (WWA June 18, 1870; and May 13, 1871) and 1880-87; member of the committee formed to define the boundaries of the proposed wards in October 1869; mayor in 1876. Died on April 3 or 4, 1887 at the age of sixty; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWA Apr 5, 1887; and WWMC). Wife (1): Jane. Wife (2): Sarah Boswell. Children: James Hope; Herbert; Arthur; Charles; and Edward Booth. Wall Street, North Wagga Wagga, was named after him (Ellis p.104).

WALL, Charles Son of Charles and Jane; born c.1857. Flour millers' engineer; member of the staff of Henry Hayes Milling Company, Wagga Wagga. Involved in an affiliation case brought by Esther Hyde in May 1875. Resided in Edward Street, Wagga Wagga, at the time of his death. Died at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital in August 1921 at the age of sixty-four leaving a widow, three sons and two daughters; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Aug 24, 1921). Children: Frank; Robert; Charles; Edwin; Lucy; Daisy; Alice; and Jean.

WALL, Charles William Son of James Egan and Emma. Born at Bendigo, Victoria, on January 2, 1863.

WALL, David Born in Victoria. Roman Catholic. Married. Labourer, Wagga Wagga. Died at

the Wagga Wagga Hospital on March 18, 1899 at the age of thirty-two (WWDH Reg).

WALL, Mrs E.H.G. Wife of Frederick James. Died in August 1917; buried Methodist Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Aug 20, 1917).

WALL, Edward Born in Ireland. Single. Butcher; travelling through Wagga Wagga. Died at the Wagga Wagga Hospital on July 14, 1903 at the age of twenty-seven (WWDH Reg).

WALL, Edward Booth Son of Charles and Jane; born early 1863. Died on September 6, 1863 at the age of four months; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC)

WALL, Edward James Son of James and Emma. Born on January 31, 1851; and baptized, Yass Parish, on November 8, 1851 (BDM).

WALL, Eliza Egan Daughter of James Egan and Emma. Born on October 26, 1845; and baptized, Yass Parish, on December 21, 1845 (BDM).

WALL, Emma Wife of James Egan nee Tooth.

WALL, Ethel F. Daughter of Charles and S. Died on December 15, 1886 at the age of eighteen months; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WALL, Frederick James Wife: E.H.G.

WALL, Frederick James Hope ("Bob") Born in Wagga Wagga c.1891. Attached to the Wagga Wagga City Council and the Southern Riverina County Council for over forty years. Died at the Wagga Wagga Base Hospital on June 19, 1958 at the age of sixty-seven, leaving a wife, two sons and two daughters; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA June 30, 1958). Children: Frederick (Brisbane);

Robert (Wagga Wagga); Jean; Jan; and one son deceased.

WALL, Herbert Son of Charles; born c.1865. Lived in North Wagga Wagga. Found the body of Thomas Mathews in 1903 (WWA Aug 4, 1903). Single. Anglican. Died at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital on April 3, 1905 at the age of thirty-nine (WWDH Reg).

WALL, James Egan Born Longhrea, Ireland, in 1816. Settler, Tumut Plains, New South Wales, in the 1840s. Married Emma Tooth* at Nimbow, Tumut, on January 6, 1845. Mail contractor, Wagga Wagga-Balranald, early 1851 (SMH Jan 4, 1851) and Wagga Wagga-Tarcutta December 1851 (WWBB). Lived in Trail Street, Wagga Wagga, in the 1850s. Although not a certified doctor he practiced medicine and on one occasion, in November 1850, sued Robert Morton for one pound, ten shillings for "services of a surgical nature rendered and drugs supplied" (WWBB; and Morris ADB p.5). Grazier; held licence for runs centred on Kengal-Hanging Rock Run by 1847 and was in partnership with William Brown* by 1854; sold his half share to Brown's widow in 1858 (Gormly in DA May 21, 1949; and Maish pp.9f). Moved to Bendigo, Victoria.

WALL, James Hope Son of Charles and Jane. Born on May 11, 1861; and baptized on June 16, 1861 (Ang Reg).

WALL, Jane Wife of Charles. Died on August 18, 1873 at the age of forty-seven; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WALL, Lucy Daughter of Charles. Married Henry George Levy at Singleton, New South Wales.

WALL, Mrs Robert Neice of E. Boswell. Lived in Best Street, Wagga Wagga. Died at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital on August 16, 1917 (Da Aug 17, 1917).

WALL, Sarah Second wife of Charles nee Boswell. Mayoress in 1876. Married (2) A. Jacobs*. Died in 1925 (DA Dec 18, 1925).

WALLACE and Co Car dealers, Baylis Street, Wagga Wagga, in the 1920s.

WALLACE, Madame Sewing Mistress, Wagga Wagga Public School, in 1881; clothes caught on fire at the school in June that year but flames were extinguished by Alfred Joshua Bennett* (WWA June 25, 1881).

WALLACE, Bridget Born in Ireland. Roman Catholic. Married. Living in Wagga Wagga. Died at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital on November 3, 1910 at the age of seventy (WWDH Reg).

WALLACE, Mrs Elsie Wife of Frank. Born at Bathurst, New South Wales, on April 24, 1898. Moved to Wagga Wagga in 1920 with her mother, brother and sister and opened Freeman's Cafe in Baylis Street (DA Apr 25, 1988 p.3).

WALLACE, Eric John Born at Ballarat, Victoria; and lived a number of years at Ardlethan, New South Wales, before moving to Wagga Wagga. Enlisted on August 13, 1915 during World War I; sergeant, 13th, 44th and 45th Battalions; awarded Distinguished Conduct Medal and a Military Medal; returned to Australia on April 13, 1919 (AWM Nominal Roll). Died suddenly at Junee, New South Wales, on December 4, 1923 (DA Dec 7, 1923). Brother of: Stanley (Leeton).

WALLACE, Francis Owen ("Frank") Married Elsie in 1923. Died on January 1, 1955 at the age of sixty-six; buried Presbyterian Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WALLACE, H. Purchased allotment 10, Section 1, South Wagga Wagga at the auction of July 31, 1850 (WWBB). Attended meeting to form the Mechanics' Institute on June

21, 1859 and member of the first committee (WWE June 23, 1859). Attended meeting to arrange for pontoon bridge to be built over the Murrumbidgee River and a member of the provisional committee (WWE Sept 10, 1859). Attended the meeting to form a cricket club (WWE Mar 19, 1859; and July 30, 1859). Attended meeting to establish an electric telegraph and subscribed twenty pounds (WWE Mar 12, 1859). Attended a dinner held for William Macleay* in 1859 (WWE June 11, 1859). Contributed ten pounds towards the reward for the person responsible for the incendiarism on Patrick Fennell's property (WWE Feb 19, 1859). Also a founder of the Murrumbidgee Turf Club in 1860 and one of the original directors of the Wagga Wagga Bridge Company in 1862.

WALLACE, Henry Son of Hugh; member of a Scottish family. Employed as a clerk in the office of Messrs Gilchrist, Watt and Co (Cooma area); but afterwards went on to the land and had "Eunonyhareenyha" station, Wagga Wagga (Mitchell **Back to Cooma** p.87). Held an account with the Australian Joint Stock Bank, Wagga Wagga, 1860-61 (Ledger). Also acquired "Dangelong" from his father but transferred it to George King and Company in 1877. Married twice; large family by first wife; no issue, second marriage. Moved to holding nearby known as "Glen Wallace"; lived quietly there until December 1921 when he left the Maneroo after a residence of fifty-five years; and moved to Austimeer. Died on July 8, 1925 at the age of eighty-five. Children: Hugh; Malcolm; and Norman.

WALLACE, Hugh Came from Dumfries, Scotland, in 1841 with wife and two sons, William and Henry. Settled at "Nithsdale" near Braidwood, where his brothers were settled. Squatter; held "Bellowna" and "Wanley Creek" runs (total of about 20,000 acres) in the Maneroo district in 1848; acquired

"Eunonyhareenha" run in the Lachlan District from William Taylor* in 1860 (GG July 23, 1860); mortgaged it to Morehead and Young (GG July 23, 1860) but Morehead and Young transferred "Eunonyhareenyha" and "Cowabee" to Hugh Wallace and George King in 1866 (GG Feb 8, 1866); late Wallace and King transferred both these runs to William Sinclair in 1870 (GG June 17, 1870); also purchased "Coolringdon" run (which included "Coolringdon", "Dangelong" and "Myalla" properties) for his three sons in 1866 (WWE July 21, 1866). Member of the Legislative Council from 1866 (GG 1866 p.1348). Died at "Nithsdale" on June 8, 1868.

WALLACE, Marion Daughter of A., electrical engineer of Melbourne, Victoria. Nurse at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital from c.1919 until 1922. Married William John Blake* at Melbourne c.1922 (DA Dec 22 & 23, 1926).

WALLACE, Samuel Account with the Australian Joint Stock Bank, Wagga Wagga, 1860-61 (Ledger).

WALLACE, Mrs T. Daughter of Walter James Beck. Lived at The Gap in 1930.

WALLACE, Thomas Police constable, Wagga Wagga, in the 1850s (WWBB).

WALLER, G. Owned "Groongal", ridden by J. Thurtle in the famous Ten Mile Race in 1868.

WALLETT, George Born at Beaufort in 1855. Moved to Lambing Flat with his parents at the age of five, during the gold rush. Engaged in mining for a while; later maildriver for Cobb and Co between Junee, Wagga Wagga and Urana and from Murrumburrah to Grenfell; later publican at Prince of Wales Hotel, Grenfell, and Wallacetown Hotel in the Wagga Wagga district 1873-79 (Burch; and Morrison II).

WALPOLE, Miss G. Masseuse, Wagga Wagga District Hospital, 1922-25

(DA Jan 30, 1925; and Morris ADB p.60).

WALSH, A.J. Enlisted during World War I.

WALSH, Agnes Sister at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital in the 1920s (Morris ADB pp.169ff).

WALSH, Angela Daughter of Stanislaus and Ethel Rebecca Irene. Married J. Fitzpatrick; and lived at Epping, Sydney.

WALSH, Belle Daughter of William J. and Elizabeth. Born at Wagga Wagga. Resided at Wagga Wagga until her marriage. Married E.J. Coltman* in 1922; and moved to Sydney (DA Jan 2, 1924).

WALSH, Bridget Mary Wife of William Michael Joseph; daughter of Maria and Michael Comans*. Died on August 29, 1952 at the age of eighty-six; buried Catholic Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WVMC).

WALSH, Charles Son of James and Elizabeth. Born on October 25, 1849; and baptized by Father Magennis at Wagga Wagga on May 3, 1850 (BDM).

WALSH, Cornelius Came to the Wagga Wagga district with his brothers (probably in the 1850s). Publican; first licensee of the Carrington Hotel 1886-87 (Burch). Lived in Orange, New South Wales, in 1927. Brother of: Jeremiah; Patrick Joseph; William; Maurice; James; and Mary Ellen. Son: Joseph Albert.

WALSH, Douglas Son of Maurice. Six foot, three inches in height. Enlisted during World War I; gunner in France (DA May 10, 1918).

WALSH, Douglas Norbet Son of James. Enlisted on March 31, 1916 during World War I; gunner, 5th Field Artillery Brigade; returned to Australia on June 4, 1919 (AWM Nominal Roll; and DA May 10, 1918).

WALSH, Elizabeth Wife of James nee Barker. Married (2) Stamp.

WALSH, Elizabeth Wife of William J. Resided in Wagga Wagga from the 1880s. Died in Sydney on January 11, 1923 at the age of fifty-nine (DA Jan 17, 1923). Children: Mrs Ross (Sydney); Belle; Mrs Frank Clear (Wagga Wagga); Miss C. (Wagga Wagga); William; and Milton.

WALSH, Elsie Mary Wife of John Patrick. Died at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital in September 1924; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Sept 8, 1924).

WALSH, Ethel Rebecca Irene Wife of Stanislaus Patrick ("Stanley") nee Graham. Died in Sydney on June 12, 1944; buried Catholic Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA June 13, 1944).

WALSH, Frank Son of Jeremiah. Enlisted during World War I; served in France; wounded; returned to Sydney and later died of wounds (DA May 10, 1918).

WALSH, George E. Enlisted before the end of January 1915 during World War I.

WALSH, Hannah Daughter of James and Elizabeth. Born on October 28, 1851; and baptized Father Magennis at Wagga Wagga on November 7, 1851 by (BDM).

WALSH, Harry Dennis Proprietor of the Riverina Hotel in 1945.

WALSH, Herbert Son of James and Elizabeth. Born on October 16, 1855; and baptized on November 24, 1855 by the Reverend Maher (BDM).

WALSH, J. Butcher, Baylis Street, Wagga Wagga, in the 1870s and 1880s.

WALSH, J.D. Electrical Engineers Department, Wagga Wagga Post Office (DA Mar 18, 1921).

W

WALSH, J.P. (or J.T.) Son of Mrs M.A. Enlisted during World War I; bombardier; returned to Australia after four years service; listed on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga (DA Sept 23, 1919).

WALSH, Jack Died on October 3, 1971 at the age of seventy; buried Catholic Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WVMC).

WALSH, James Tradesman (carpenter and builder) at Yass, New South Wales, in the early 1840s. Married Elizabeth Barker in 1843 (BDM). Moved to Wagga Wagga; storekeeper and innkeeper; purchased the hotel, run by J.J. ("Ginger") Roberts*, north side, Fitzmaurice Street, in April 1849. Publican licence renewed on April 16, 1850 and he acted as surety for William Brown* (New Ferry Hotel) and Hyam Phillips* (Horse and Jockey). Licence again renewed April 15, 1851 (WWBB). Later that year erected a new two-storey brick building on the opposite side of the road (ten rooms on ground floor and although only an attic, the upper floor contained several large rooms) and on August 28, 1851 transferred the publican licence to this hotel, Wagga Wagga Inn, which was superior to any other building in Wagga Wagga at the time (Gormly, WWE July 19, 1915; Gormly, DA May 21, 1949; and WWBB); held the licence until 1852 (WWBB). Purchased land in Wagga Wagga including: allotment 2, section 5 and allotment 10, section 4, South Wagga Wagga; and allotments 6 and 9, section 5, North Wagga Wagga at the auction sale of July 31, 1850; allotments 6 to 9, section 5, South Wagga Wagga in January 1851; allotments 14 and 15, section 5, North Wagga Wagga in August 1851; and allotments 3 to 7, section 7 on September 3, 1851; also purchased allotment 8, section 7 with John Peter* as trustees for the church (WWBB). South Wagga Wagga Yard known as Walsh's Stockyard on reserve, Fitzmaurice Street, was appointed a Public Pound in June 1850 (SMH June 8, 1850). Built a

punt with sixteen casks in four compartments (SMH Aug 24, 1850). Built Swan Inn, on allotment 10, section 5, North Wagga Wagga; and leased it to Jacob Marks*. Took over the mail contract, Tarcutta-Wagga Wagga once a week in 1851, his sureties being John Peter* and Robert Holt Best* (WWBB). Treasurer, Local Board of Patrons, appointed to build and manage a school in Wagga Wagga; when the Board had problems finding labour to build the school, Walsh decided to build it himself and his tender of one hundred and forty pounds was accepted (SMH Aug 24, 1850; and Swan WW p.45). Left for the gold diggings in the 1850s with Christopher Tidyman*, leaving his wife to conduct the hotel; house flooded in his absence and wife and children only just had time to get to the hotel, unable to save any of the furniture or effects; twenty people stayed on the upper floor of the hotel during the flood (Gormly WWE July 19, 1915). Hotel flooded several times; in 1851 (SMH Sept 6, 1851); in 1852 when both gables of long brick stable or store belonging to Walsh was flooded, fencing washed away and many neighbours took refuge upstairs at the hotel though building was liable to be wrecked by strong current and they had to be rescued by the poundkeeper, Seppings* (Gormly in DA May 21, 1949; SMH July 15, 1852; GH July 17, 1852; and Garland); in 1853 when the flood washed out some of the brick walls of the building and the roof almost collapsed, brick stables behind the hotel were completely destroyed and the single roof floated away down the river (Gormly in DA May 21, 1949). According to Gormly, his wife disliked Wagga Wagga because of the floods and induced him to sell all his property (Gormly WWE July 19, 1915; and Vol 1 p.46). Advertised for sale on May 1, 1852: Wagga Wagga Inn (two storied brick with ten rooms on the ground, nine on upper floor, good well and nine stalled stable of brick, brick kitchen, copper

etc); Swan Inn, North Wagga; four allotments, North Wagga; and eight allotments, South Wagga (GH May 1, 1852); both hotels were purchased by Thomas Fox*. Asked that all claims against him be sent in (GH Mar 19, 1853). Moved to Yass (Gormly DA May 21, 1949). Returned to Wagga Wagga in 1854; opened a wholesale and retail store at South Wagga on July 29, 1854 (GH Aug 12, 1954); registered his wooden store in Fitzmaurice Street as a spirit store in 1855, 1856 and 1857 (WWBB); advertised selling at reduced prices in 1855 (GH Nov 3, 1855); issued an auctioneer's licence in May 1856 (WWBB). Purchased more land: allotment 5 section 35 (Johnston Street, Wollundry Lagoon) on February 28, 1856; allotment 9 section 4 and allotment 11 Section 73 (forty acres) on March 19, 1856; and allotment 13 section 37 and allotments 1, 2 and 20, section 2 (adjacent to the corner of Trail and Gurwood Streets) on March 25, 1857 (WWBB). Chaired public meeting re acquiring a suitable site for a Roman Catholic Church in July 1858 (Walsh JWWDHS 4 p.34); and contributed twenty-nine pounds towards the construction of St Michael's Church. Died in October 1858; buried Catholic Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery. Children: Charles; James; Michael; Hannah; Heber; John Gregory; and Stephen.

WALSH, James Son of James and Elizabeth. Born at Yass, New South Wales, on August 4, 1845 (BDM).

WALSH, James Brother of Cornelius; Patrick Joseph; Jeremiah; Maurice; William; and Mary Ellen. Sons: Douglas N.; and Reginald.

WALSH, James Builder, Baylis Street, Newtown, Wagga Wagga, in the 1870s. Nominated for alderman, east ward, in 1879 (WWE Jan 29, 1879).

WALSH, James Born in Ireland. Roman Catholic. Admitted to the

Wagga Wagga District Hospital in October 1898 at the age of sixty-two (WWDH Reg).

WALSH, James Stanislaus Son of M. of Newcastle. Accomplished musician; and fine pianist. Also a fine athlete and footballer and took an active part in the formation of a Rugby football club and sports club in Wagga Wagga. Accountant for **Newcastle Morning Herald**, the Country Press Association, the **Sun** Office and later the **Daily Advertiser**, Wagga Wagga; returned to Sydney to sell house and bring his family to Wagga Wagga to settle. Died at Artarman (Sydney) from influenza in April 1919 (DA Apr 23 & 24, 1919).

WALSH, James W. Probably the son of Jeremiah. Cordial manufacturer employed by Davoren* at Wagga Wagga and later by J.W. Carpenter at Adelong. Married Louisa Craft* c.1889.

WALSH, Jeremiah Brother of: Maurice; Mary Ellen; James; Cornelius; Patrick Joseph; and William. Married a sister of James Hopkins*. Sons: Frank; James (Adelong); and John J.

WALSH, Jeremiah. D. Licensee, Railway Hotel, Baylis Street, Wagga Wagga, 1874-76 (Burch).

WALSH, John Agent, Remington Sewing Machines, Wagga Wagga, in the 1880s. Member of the Wagga Wagga District Hospital Committee 1881-82 (Morris ADB p.267). Provisional director of proposed company to freeze and slaughter meat in 1881 (DA Oct 10, 1938).

WALSH, John Gregory Son of James and Elizabeth; born c.1847. Resided at Wagga Wagga from childhood. Employed by Lintott* family at "Cunningdroo" for many years; then employed at "Grubben" station; and then in charge of "Kilgowla" property for Lawrence Cox* of Tea Tree Creek for many years. Died on September 3, 1910 at the residence of J. Doolan, Tumberumba Road, Wagga Wagga, at

the age of sixty-three (WWA Sept 6, 1910).

WALSH, John J. Son of Jeremiah. Born at Wagga Wagga c.1864. Died at Campsie on December 30, 1909 at the age of forty-five (WWA Jan 8, 1910).

WALSH, John Patrick Lived in Edward Street, Wagga Wagga, in 1924. Wife: Elsie Mary.

WALSH, Joseph Albert Son of Cornelius. Enlisted on November 18, 1915 during World War I; sergeant, 29th Battalion; killed in action at Polygon Wood, France on 26th or 27th September, 1917 (AWM Nominal Roll; and DA May 10, 1918).

WALSH, Louisa Wife of J.W. nee Craft. Teacher, Wagga Wagga Public School. Died in November 1933 at the age of sixty-five (DA Nov 18, 1933).

WALSH, M. Enlisted during World War I.

WALSH, M.A. Lived in Tarcutta Street, Wagga Wagga, in 1919. Son: J.P.

WALSH, Mary Died on December 13, 1874 at the age of thirty-two; buried Catholic Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WALSH, Mary Native of Scotland. Emigrated to Australia in 1862. Moved to Wagga Wagga in 1870. Married James Baker* (DA Feb 9, 1912).

WALSH, Mary Wife of Patrick Joseph. Died at Best Street, Wagga Wagga, on April 18, 1907 at the age of seventy-one.

WALSH, Mary Ann Wife of Patrick. Born at Collingullie near Wagga Wagga. Proprietor, Junction Inn, Urana Road, three and a half miles from Wagga Wagga, in 1907; and of Collingullie Hotel. Died at Wagga Wagga on December 4, 1944 at the age of seventy-six; buried Catholic Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Dec 5, 1944).

Children: John (Katoomba); Mrs K. Willoughby (Katoomba); Mrs L.L. Hishon (Wagga Wagga); Mrs J. Schadel (Wagga Wagga); and Mrs J. Stearman (Wagga Wagga).

WALSH, Mary Ann Wife of Thomas nee Herrick. Died on October 11, 1924 at the age of fifty-seven; buried Catholic Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Aug 11, 1941; and WWMC).

WALSH, Mary Ellen Sister of Maurice; Patrick Joseph; Cornelius; James; Jeremiah; and William. Married John Murray Arthur* in 1873 (WWA May 12, 1906).

WALSH, Mary Ellen Wife of Patrick nee Kane. Born in Victoria. Lived in the Goulburn Valley district, Victoria; Boree Creek from 1901 and Matong near Wagga Wagga from c.1933. Died at Matong on May 17, 1943 at the age of eighty-five; buried at Grong Grong (DA May 18, 1943). Children: Patrick Joseph (Matong); William James (Matong); Daniel (Wagga Wagga); James (Melbourne); Mary Isabella (Mrs C.J. Smith, Matong); Margaret (Mrs R.A. Smith, Matong); Bridget Josephine (Mrs W. Ledger, Matong); Ellen (Mrs James Ryan); and Catherine (Mrs Leo Myers, Victoria).

WALSH, Maurice Brother of Cornelius; Patrick Joseph; William; James; Jeremiah; and Mary Ellen; Irish parents. Splendid physique; six foot three inches. Resided on a station at Bungerellingong in the 1920s. Son: Douglas.

WALSH, Michael Son of James and Elizabeth; baptized in 1848.

WALSH, Milton Son of William J. and Elizabeth.

WALSH, Mollie Daughter of William. Nurse; trained at St Vincent's Hospital, Sydney; then sister and acting matron at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital. Active service for three years

during World War I; two years transport work and from January 1918 attached to the staff of Randwick Military Hospital; then served in France; and returned to Australia in 1919 and took up duties at the Randwick District Hospital (DA July 30, 1918; May 28, 1919; and Nov 20, 1919); remained in the service of the Defence Department until 1923; selected to move to Victoria to inaugurate Dr Truby King's Plunkett System of child welfare (DA Dec 4, 1925).

WALSH, Patrick Born County Clare, Ireland, c.1848. Arrived in Melbourne, Victoria, on the **Southern Empire** in 1869. Farmer, Goulburn Valley district, Victoria. Then moved to Boree Creek in the Lockhart district, New South Wales, from c.1901. Moved to Matong c.1933. Married Mary Ellen Kane at Echuca in 1882 (L.H. Gilmore p.387). Died c.1925.

WALSH, Patrick Joseph Born in the Hawkesbury district; brother of Cornelius; James; Jeremiah; Mary Ellen; Maurice; and William; Irish parents. Came to the Wagga Wagga district with his brothers (probably in the 1850s). Farmer and grazier and businessman; licensee of the Victoria Hotel at the corner of Hampden Avenue and Marah Street, North Wagga Wagga 1876-78 (Burch); and licensee Doncaster Hotel, Murrumburrah, in 1879. Then moved to Baylis Street, Wagga Wagga. Butcher, Wagga Wagga Wharf Reserve, in the late 1880s but sold to J.J. McGrath* in 1890 (WWA Sept 19, 1889; and Sept 23, 1890). Licensee, Cross Roads Hotel 1905-06. Splendid physique; retiring disposition. Lived at "Minjary", Kincaid Street, Wagga Wagga, in his later years. Died at his residence on May 8, 1918 aged over eighty-five years (DA May 10, 1918). Wife: Mary. Children: Mrs Hedley; Mrs Erler; Miss K.; and William Michael Joseph.

WALSH, S. Enlisted during World War I.

WALSH, Stanislaus Patrick ("Stanley") Younger son of William. Born at Wagga Wagga. Educated by sisters of Mt Erin Convent and then at Christian Brothers School; distinguished himself as an elocutionist and was popular at annual school breakups. Splendid physique; six foot in height. Butchery business, Baylis Street, for many years and owned considerable land. Then dairying business at Whitfield, Tarcutta Road, Wagga Wagga, and later purchased one of the Gobbagumbalin Closer Settlement Farms which he successfully developed for several years. Became a well known dealer in sheep and cattle. Married Ethel Rebecca Irene Graham* at St Michael's Church, Wagga Wagga, in 1909 (WWA Nov 4, 1909). Well known on Wagga Wagga and city racecourses, having at various times owned a number of high class thoroughbreds especially "Meccano", a pony he raced successfully (and was afterwards sold to go to India) and "Cuneate", "Nelsonite" and others; his Wagga Wagga home was named "Meccano" after his successful pony. Trustee, Wagga Brass Band; and member of Riverina Trotting Club Licenced Victuallers Association. Retired from the land and successfully engaged in business; for some time proprietor and licensee of hotel at Tullibigeal and later Union Club Hotel, Wagga Wagga, which he sold when his health began to fail. Died at St Vincent's Hospital, Sydney, in August 1927; buried Catholic Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Aug 8 & 9, 1927). Daughter: Angela ("Angie").

WALSH, Stephen Son of James and Elizabeth. Born on December 24, 1853; and baptized on December 30, 1853 (BDM).

WALSH, Mrs Stephen Daughter of Joshua and Margaret Holland*. Lived in Albury Road in 1927.

W

WALSH, Thomas Resided in Wagga Wagga. Roman Catholic. Died at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital on September 15, 1905 (WWDH Reg).

WALSH, Thomas Born in Victoria. Labourer; engaged in shearing and other work at "Big Springs". Then resided at North Wagga Wagga. Died at his residence in June 1917 at the age of forty-six; buried Catholic Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA June 11 & 12, 1917). Brother of: James; and Mrs McLean (Victoria).

WALSH, Thomas Born Kilflynn, County Kerry, Ireland. Married Mary Ann Herrick at Wagga Wagga. Died in August 1941 at the age of seventy-nine; buried Catholic Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Aug 11, 1941). Children: Robert; Mrs Norman Drummond (Wagga Wagga); Mrs L. Pigram (Burra Creek); and Mrs G. Allan (Melbourne).

WALSH, Thomas F. Enlisted by the end of January 1915 during World War I (DA Feb 11, 1915).

WALSH, Mrs W.T. Widow of Thomas. Died (diphtheria) in Victoria on October 11, 1925 (DA Oct 15, 1925). Daughter: Mrs Alice Patterson.

WALSH, William Born c.1836; brother of Maurice; James; Cornelius; Patrick Joseph; Jeremiah; and Mary Ellen. Grazier at Gorman's Hill, Condobolin district. Married a daughter of Mr Wood of Gorman's Hill. Came to the Wagga Wagga district with his brothers in the 1860s. Butcher and large dealer in cattle for many years. Owned considerable property in Wagga Wagga and district. Closely associated with the commercial life of the town. Purchased land in Fitzmaurice Street from Frederick Anslow Tompson* in 1870 (WWA Mar 5, 1870). Assisted many to safety during the flood of 1870 (WWA May 7, 1870). Alderman, Wagga Wagga Council 1882-85. Sequestered estate in 1890 (WWE Nov 4, 1890). Leg

broken in 1913 (DA Dec 8, 1913). Accident on son, Stan's farm at Gobbagombalin in 1914 (while assisting in horse drafting yard) and fractured his thigh. Died on June 13, 1917 at the age of eighty-one; buried Catholic Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA June 13 & 14, 1917). Children: Mollie; Mrs P. White; Mrs Angela Tynan; William Albert; and Stanislaus Patrick ("Stanley").

WALSH, William Son of William J. and Elizabeth.

WALSH, Mrs William Died on September 19, 1896.

WALSH, William Albert Son of William. Well known as local elocutionist and comedian; and gave services freely at charitable functions (WWA Dec 15, 1900; and DA Feb 24, 1927). First secretary of Rugby Football Club, Wagga Wagga (WWA July 11 & 18, 1889). Married Winifred Agnes Coleman* at St Michael's Church, Wagga Wagga, on October 7, 1898 (WWA Oct 11, 1898). Left Wagga Wagga in 1908 to take up a position with Palings', Sydney; and later a member of the staff of Tooth's Brewery (WWA Apr 25, 1908; and DA Feb 24, 1927). Accountant in Sydney in 1917.

WALSH, William J. Wife: Elizabeth.

WALSH, William Michael Joseph Son of Patrick Joseph. Born at Hartley, New South Wales, in 1865. Solicitor; admitted as a solicitor by full court on March 10, 1891; at Wagga Wagga from c.1892, for many years over Coplands' Store, Fitzmaurice Street, and then erected a set of Chambers in Johnston Street by 1907; entered into partnership with Arthur Mitchell Blair*, a former employee, in 1919 to carry on practice at Johnston Street, Wagga Wagga, and at offices at Tumberumba; retired in 1950 (NSW Dir, 1903; DA Apr 2, 1919; Oct 18, 1927; and Mar 19, 1941). Married Bridget Comans in 1900. Played cricket for the Mechanics'

W

Cricket Club and scored a century in 1892; represented Wagga Wagga and in 1894 scored fifty-four runs in seven innings with a top score of forty not out; trustee of the Wagga Wagga Cricket Association by 1908 (WWA Jan 28, 1908). President of the Wagga Rugby Football Club 1897-1900. President of the Wagga Golf Club 1907-08 (WWA Apr 16, 1908), club champion in 1906 and assisted the secretary, F.C. Thomas*, in 1912. Vice president of the Wagga Rowing Club in 1913 (DA Dec 3, 1913). Member of the Wagga Wagga District Hospital Committee in 1902 (Morris ADB pp.29 & 267). Member of the Wagga Wagga Patriotic Fund Committee during World War I; and agreed to pay one guinea per week of the "Kangaroo" march in 1915 (DA Nov 16, 1915). Vice president of the committee formed to raise funds for a Memorial Gardens (DA May 1, 1925). Candidate for election, Wagga Wagga Municipal Council in 1925 but not elected (DA Nov 27, 1925). President of the Riverine Club about ten years. Member of the Committee of the Murrumbidgee Turf Club. Died on April 19, 1959 at the age of ninety-three; buried Catholic Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Apr 20 & 21, 1959).

WALDRON, O.H. Enlisted during World War I.

WALSTER, William Davison Attended Wagga Wagga High School. Enlisted on July 31, 1915 during World War I; private, 14th Field Artillery Brigade; returned to Australia on April 13, 1919 (AWM Nominal Roll; and DA Sept 4, 1918).

WALTERS, Patrick Born in Victoria. Roman Catholic. Labourer, Wagga Wagga. Single. Died at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital on January 16, 1910 at the age of fifty-five (WWDH Reg).

WALTERS, Mrs R. Daughter of George Bain*. Lived in Wagga Wagga in the 1920s.

WALTON, Arthur Married Valetta Palazzi*.

WALTON, Arthur Harrissmith Native of England. Military education. Migrated to the Cape Colony, South Africa, at the age of about twenty; stayed about ten years, working as a journalist. Arrived in Sydney c.1890. Stayed in Sydney for a while. Moved to Victoria. Then returned to New South Wales. Editor of Tamworth **News** and then editor, **Wagga Wagga Advertiser** from early 1899. Resided Gurwood Street, Wagga Wagga. Died of tuberculosis at his residence in 1900 at the age of forty-one (WWA Jan 13, 1900).

WALTON, Charles S. Native of Gundagai, New South Wales. Enlisted during World War I; gained commission at Duntroon College; lieutenant, 6th Light Horse; served at Gallipoli; returned during the war; never physically fit for laborious work; contracted influenza and then broncho-pneumonia. Died at Coolamon in October 1921 at the age of thirty-two (DA Oct 6, 1921).

WALTON, Emma Florence Wife of Robert; daughter of Thomas Goodwin, a coachman in London, and Elizabeth. Emigrated to Victoria c.1869. Moved to New South Wales in the early 1880s. Died at Wagga Wagga on August 25, 1894.

WALTON, F.R. Enlisted during World War I. Businessman; took over the Wagga Steam Laundry, Gurwood Street, in May 1920 (DA May 13, 1920).

WALTON, Francis Lived in Wagga Wagga in the late 1850s; contributed two pounds to St Michael's Church by 1859.

WALTON, Frank Son of Robert; born c.1891. Enlisted during World War I; corporal; wounded;

three years service including Gallipoli (DA Apr 6, 1918).

WALTON, H.H. Operated an omnibus service, Wagga Wagga to Newtown, in 1878.

WALTON, John George "Jack" Son of Robert. Enlisted on September 1, 1915 during World War I; private, 23rd Battalion; killed in action on September 1, 1918; listed on Soldiers' Memorial and the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga (AWM Nominal Roll; DA Sept 19, 1918; and DA Sept 18, 1922).

WALTON, Robert Married Emma Florence Goodwin at Stawell, Victoria, c.1870. Moved to Wagga Wagga in the early 1880s. Lived in Docker Street, Wagga Wagga. Lived at Haberfield, Sydney, in 1918. Children: Elizabeth; William; Thomas; Alice; Robert; James; John; Florence; and Frank.

WALTON, Robert F. ("Bob") Son of Robert. Enlisted in October 1914 during World War I; corporal; served in Gallipoli and France and returned in 1919 (DA Apr 6, 1918; and Feb 7, 1919).

WALTON, Robert F. ("Bob") Son of R. of Haberfield. Enlisted in the "Kangaroo" contingent on December 1, 1915 during World War I; private, 55th Battalion; incapacitated in 1918; returned to Australia on May 6, 1919 (AWM Nominal Roll; and DA Oct 23, 1918).

WALTON, Scrummy Enlisted in World War I; 2nd Battalion.

WALTON, Thomas Died at Wagga Wagga on May 5, 1884; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery.

WALTON, Valetta Wife of Arthur nee Palazzi. Moved to Newcastle c.1924. Died at Newcastle in September 1929 at the age of twenty-five (DA Sept 23, 1929).

WALTON, W.F. (Walter of William?) Listed on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga.

WALTON, Walter Son of R. of Haberfield. Enlisted during World War I; "Kangaroo" contingent; served at Peronne and Bullecourt; returned to Australia in August 1919; given a reception at Haberfield, Sydney (DA Aug 19, 1919).

WALTON, William ("Will") Son of Robert. Enlisted during World War I; returned home twice wounded (DA Apr 6, 1918).

WARBY Settler at Airs, Campbelltown district. Squatter; followed on Hamilton Hume's track and settled at "Mingay" in a position immediately opposite the junction of the Tumut and Murrumbidgee Rivers (later "Darbalara" station); visited by Charles Sturt in November 1829; and by Dr George Bennett in December 1832 (Swan WW pp.18f; Swan and Carnegie, **In Step With Sturt** pp.27ff; and Tumut Centenary booklet p.20).

WARBY, A.A. Attended Wagga Wagga Primary School. Enlisted during World War I.

WARBY, Adelaide Daughter of James and Mary Ann. Born on August 13, 1843. Died in infancy.

WARBY, Amy Mayo Daughter of James Edward and Sarah. Born at Wagga Wagga on January 28, 1888. Murdered at "Billenbah" station, Narrandera, with her mother, on January 28, 1911; two youths later convicted (DA Jan 30 & 31, 1911; and Apr 7, 1911).

WARBY, Emily Born on November 9, 1884. Died on September 12, 1951; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WARBY, Harriet Anne Daughter of James and Mary Ann. Born at Campbelltown on July 3, 1841. Died in infancy.

WARBY, Henrietta Wife of John Joseph nee Graham. Died on November 4, 1928.

W

WARBY, Henry Albert Son of James Edward and Sarah. Born at Wagga Wagga on July 4, 1869; and died at Wagga Wagga in June 1870.

WARBY, James Son of John and Sarah (both convicts). Born on February 7, 1817; and baptized at Campbelltown on May 6, 1821. Married Mary Ann Brooker* on November 24, 1842 (BDM). Squatter. Died on May 12, 1849 (MW). Children: James Edward; Harriet Anne; John Joseph; Mary Jane; and Adelaide.

WARBY, James Edward Son of James and Mary Ann. Born at Campbelltown on May 7, 1839. Storekeeper at Urana in the early 1860s; and held an account with the Australian Joint Stock Bank, Wagga Wagga, 1860-61 (Ledger). Storekeeper at Victoria House, Wagga Wagga, from 1862 (Gormly E&S p.159). Signed petition for a "proper" Post Office at Wagga Wagga in 1867 (PO). Took over the ownership of steamship named **JHP** (WWA May 22, 1869). Married Sarah Lakeman at Wagga Wagga on December 26, 1865 (MW). Attended dinner held for William Macleay* at the Australian Hotel, Wagga Wagga, in 1859 (WWE June 11, 1859). Served on the jury e.g. Samuel Hawkins* v Arthur W. Tompson* in 1868 (WWA Oct 24, 1868). Rode his own horse, "Cornerstone", in the famous Ten Mile Race in 1868. Moved to "Billenbah" station near Narrandera in the 1870s; and became well known as breeder and judge of sheep. Died on May 11, 1910 (MW). Children: James Edward (born in 1866); Henry Albert (1869); William Lakeman (1870); Arthur Ernest (1872); Sarah Florence (1873); Frederick Charles (1876); Stanley (1878); James Edward (1880); George Allen (1881); Mary Lakeman (1883); Henry Albert (1886); and Amy Mayo (1888).

WARBY, James Edward Son of James Edward and Sarah. Born at Wagga Wagga on October 20, 1866. Died on April 27, 1878.

WARBY, John Joseph Son of James and Mary Ann. Born at Albury, New South Wales, on February 3, 1846. Married Henrietta Graham in 1878. Resided in Wagga Wagga for many years (Gormly E&S p.159). Died at Pennant Hills on May 4, 1924.

WARBY, Marion Widow. Licensee, Hope Inn, Wagga Wagga, in 1853 (Burch).

WARBY, Mary Ann Wife of James nee Brooker. Publican, Bridge Hotel (Gormly E&S p.159). Married (2) Thomas Byrnes* at Wagga Wagga on May 9, 1853 (BDM).

WARBY, Mary Jane Daughter of James and Mary Ann. Born on May 17, 1848. Died at Burwood, Sydney, on August 19, 1934 (MW).

WARBY, Sarah Wife of James Edward nee Lakeman. Murdered at "Billenbah" station, Narrandera, with daughter, Amy, on January 28, 1911 at the age of sixty; two youths later convicted of the crime (DA Jan 30 & 31, 1911; and Apr 7, 1911).

WARBY, Stanley Son of James Edward and Sarah. Born on February 19, 1878. Married Emily Maria Roberts in Sydney on November 1, 1916 (MW). Died at Wagga Wagga on May 29, 1970; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery.

WARD, Miss Matron, Bourke and Yass Hospitals; then took over Nursing Home established at "Westhoe" at corner of Kincaid and Trail Streets, Wagga Wagga, in 1904 (WWA Dec 6, 1904); left Belmore Nursing Home, Kincaid Street, in 1906 to become matron at Penrith Hospital and her sister took charge of Belmore Hospital until Miss Bradford succeeded in May that year (WWA Jan 6, 1906; and May 31, 1906).

WARD, Reverend F.G. Appointed curate at St John's Church of England, Wagga Wagga, in 1909, replacing the Reverend Herbert William Curtis* (WWA Apr 29, 1909). Served overseas during

World War I (letter in DA Aug 21, 1917).

WARD, Hercules F. Attached to Wagga Wagga Lands Board until c.1912 (DA May 9, 1917). Well known footballer (Lake Albert Rugby football team) and cricketer; and a popular baritone. Distinguished himself at Bondi Beach in 1912 when he saved several surfers (DA Jan 22, 1912).

WARD, J. Upholsterer, North Wagga Wagga. Died in August 1911 at the age of seventy-six (DA Aug 29, 1911).

WARD, Phillip Police Constable, Wagga Wagga; appointed in February 1857; arrested Henry Jilly for stealing in January 1858; and John McNamara in July 1858.

WARD, R.H. Enlisted during World War I (DA May 15, 1916).

WARDEN, Agnes Nurse, Wagga Wagga District Hospital, 1899-1902 (Morris ADB p.158; and WWA Sept 18, 1900; Feb 7, 1901; and July 10, 1902).

WARDEN, Elizabeth Nurse, Wagga Wagga District Hospital, 1894-98 (Morris ADB p.158).

WARDROP, R. Temporary manager, Government Savings Bank of New South Wales, opening in the courthouse in rooms formerly occupied as shire offices, in July 1908 (WWA July 16, 1908).

WARMOLL, Bridget Probably the wife of James. Died on December 2, 1894 at the age of forty-two buried Catholic Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WARMOLL, Corrie Son of John. Born at Wagga Wagga. Educated at the Christian Brothers School at Wagga Wagga. After leaving school took a junior position with Messrs Mahon and Headley*, brewers, and raised himself to a responsible position with the firm when it was absorbed by

Tooths Ltd; retained and later promoted to head office in Sydney. Clerk, Wagga Wagga Municipal Council, for three years. Well known in music circles; played cornet in Wagga City Concert Band and solo cornet in a popular orchestra which gave its services to church and charitable functions. Died (pneumonia) in September 1928 at the age of twenty-eight (DA Sept 24, 1928).

WARMOLL, James Butcher, Wagga Wagga, in the 1870s. Died on October 11, 1876 at the age of thirty-one, leaving a widow and four children; buried Catholic Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery; inquest held (WWE Oct 14, 1876; and WWMC). Wife: Bridget.

WARMOLL, James Daniel Lived in Fitzmaurice Street, Wagga Wagga. Died in July 1948 at the age of seventy-five; buried Catholic Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA July 3, 1948). Brother of: Mrs E.L. Clout.

WARMOLL, Robert Harvey Son of Robert and Eliza. Butcher. Married Ettie Henrietta Moxham (Ang Reg).

WARNER, Doreen M. Born at Tamworth, New South Wales. Nurse; completed her training at Tamworth Base Hospital and later at Crown Street Women's Hospital; Deputy Matron at the Wagga Wagga Base Hospital until she resigned in 1971 because of ill health. Prominent Quotarian and bowler; and active member of her church. Died in September 1971 at the age of sixty (DA Sept 17, 1971); and a tree was planted in her memory at Wagga Wagga Botanic Gardens in 1972 (DA Oct 7, 1972).

WARRAN and Clough Hampden Butchery (later M. Tilden).

WARRAN, Ellen Daughter of William and Maria. Married Samuel Marten Smith*. Died in 1884.

- WARRAN, Emma** Daughter of William and Maria. Married John Scott Greenfield*. Hay in November 1915 (DA Nov 27, 1915).
- WARRAN, Emma Jane** Wife of John. Died in December 1944 (DA Dec 14, 1944).

Fruiterer, Wagga Wagga (NSW Dir, 1903); produce merchant at North Wagga Wagga; and hide, skin and tallow merchant at Ganmain where his wife also conducted a fruit shop (WWA Jan 21, 1909). Lived in Ganmain in 1918. Married Emma Jane Sell*. Died in 1946. Sons: Jack; William; Charles; and Thomas ("Mick").
- WARRAN, John William** Wife: Sophia Caroline. Children: Marianna; and Frederick Cattley.
- WARRAN, Maria** Wife of William nee Cole; born Derby, England, c.1836. Died on October 10, 1910 at the age of seventy-four, leaving six (of her sixteen) children, twenty-two grandchildren and six great grandchildren; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Oct 11 & 13, 1910).
- WARRAN, Marianna Haughton Sophia** Daughter of John William and Sophia Caroline. Born on February 17, 1883; and baptized on April 22, 1883 (Ang Reg).
- WARRAN, Phoebe Rachel** Daughter of William and Maria. Born on March 14, 1879; and baptized on April 27, 1879 (Ang Reg). Died in 1880.
- WARRAN, S. (Samuel?)** Butcher; left Wagga Wagga for business in
- WARRAN, Samuel** Son of William and Maria. Lived in North Sydney in 1918.
- WARRAN, Sarah** Daughter of William and Maria. Married Samuel Martin Smith*.
- WARRAN, Walter Eric** Son of Walter Frederick of Yarragundry and Ann Louisa. Born on April 8, 1893; and baptized on July 16, 1893 (Ang Reg).
- WARRAN, William** Born c.1832. Married Maria Cole at the All Saints Church, Derby, England, on August 4, 1856. Brickmaker by trade. Emigrated to South Africa and then to New South Wales in 1867. Came to Wagga Wagga in 1876. Employed in the erection of the railway viaduct across the Murrumbidgee flats at Wagga Wagga in 1880. Grocer, fruiterer, general produce dealer, and wool and skin buyer, Fitzmaurice Street, Wagga Wagga, from 1883; gave up fruiterer and produce section in 1903 and continued on as wool and skin buyer. Died at the residence of his son-in-law, John Greenfield, on June 10, 1918 at the age of eighty-six; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Aug 4, 1906; and June 11, 1918). Children: James; John; Samuel; Emma; Phoebe Rachel; Ellen; and Sarah.
- WARRAN, William** Son of Walter F., a fisherman of Yarragundry, and Hannah. Born on February 6, 1895; and baptized on May 25, 1895 (Ang Reg).
- WARRAN, William Samuel** Son of Samuel and Josephine. Born on March 23, 1900; and baptized on March 27, 1900 (Ang Reg).
- WARREN, Caroline** Daughter of William. Born c.1861. Married George Clifford*.
- WARREN, Charles Frank** Born Devonshire, England. Doctor. Came to Australia as medical officer

on the **Karrahatta**, one of the warships of the British Navy; and decided to stay. Moved to Wagga Wagga; purchased the practice of Dr Long* in 1897 and began practicing at Dr Long's surgery, "Huntley", Gurwood Street, Wagga Wagga; retired in November 1912 and disposed of his practice to Dr. W.W. Martin* (Morris ADB pp.27, 127, 129, 130-32, 135, 159 & 160; WWA May 15, 1897; and Jan 2, 1909). Medical Officer of the Loyal Southern Star Lodge Manchester Unity Independant Order of Oddfellows. Alderman 1901-02 and 1909-11 and urged the introduction of a sewerage system. Presided over the meeting to form a branch of the Australia Party at Wagga Wagga in 1906 and became one of the first vice presidents (WWA July 17, 1906; Apr 10, 1909; and July 5, 1910). Keen sportsman; played cricket, football and tennis; vice president of the Rugby Football club and a vice president of the Wagga Wagga Lawn Tennis Club. Largely due to his efforts that the Wagga Amateur Picnic Race Club was founded and was its first president. Married the daughter of Joseph Wood, a brewer from Newcastle (WWA Nov 24, 1908; Nov 1, 1910; and Apr 3, 1913). Interested in local Army detachment; Major in charge of No. 3 Battery (Wagga Wagga and Young) Australian Field Artillery for a long time but resigned in 1910 because his military duties interfered with his profession (WWA Mar 22, 1910). Left Wagga Wagga in 1912 (WWA Nov 28, 1912). Took a trip around the world and then set up as a ear, throat and nose specialist in Macquarie Street, Sydney. Served during World War I; left Australia in command of 5th Brigade (nearly all Riverina men); lieutenant-colonel, Australian Army Medical Corps; served at the front for several years; returned to Australia on July 22, 1917 (AWM Nominal Roll; DA Nov 5, 1915; Feb 16, 1916; and Apr 13, 1917). Died at Yokohama, Japan, in October 1933 while visiting, leaving a widow, Muriel, and one son John

Thomas Frank ("Jack") and one daughter, Peggy. Warren Place, Mt Austin, Wagga Wagga, was named after him in 1977 (Ellis p.105).

WARREN, Edith Rosalie Daughter of W. Frederick. Married T.J. Swaysland* at the Wagga Wagga Methodist Church on August 23, 1919 (DA Sept 3, 1919). Lived at Oura near Wagga Wagga.

WARREN, Ellen Amelia Married (1) Wall. Married (2) Samuel Davis*. Sister of: J. (Wagga Wagga); R. (Eden); I. (Eden); and Mrs J. Scott (Sydney).

WARREN, Elsie Alma Daughter of Charles Douglas and Rosa; twin sister of Enid Rose. Born on January 14, 1906; and baptized on February 17, 1907 (Ang Reg).

WARREN, Enid Rose Daughter of Charles Douglas and Rosa; twin sister of Elsie Alma. Born on January 14, 1906; and baptized on February 17, 1907 (Ang Reg).

WARREN, Eva Youngest daughter of Walter (W. Frederick?) of Oura Village. Married A. Webb* on December 6, 1919 (DA Dec 16, 1919).

WARREN, Evelyn May Wife of Eric Walter (or Walter Eric) nee Boyton. Died at the Wagga Wagga Base Hospital on April 27, 1960 at the age of forty-five (DA Apr 29, 1960).

WARREN, John Thomas Wood ("Jack") Son of Charles Frank and Muriel. Born on October 10, 1900; and baptized on November 13, 1900 (Ang Reg).

WARREN, Kathleen Wife of Dr Richard B. Lived at Wagga Wagga and later Spit Junction. Died at a private hospital in Mosman, Sydney, in December 1946 (DA Dec 28, 1946). Children: Jan; and Sally.

WARREN, R.D. Dentist; took over the practice of Charles Mathews* at Wagga Wagga in 1929.

WARREN, Dr Richard B. Doctor at Wagga Wagga 1885-87 (Morris ADB p.255; and WWA June 9, 1885; and Apr 7, 1887). Wife: Kathleen Angel.

WARREN, Robert Eldest son of James. Married Alice Mary Clout* in June 1903 (WWA June 30, 1903).

WARREN, W.T.F. Portrait artist and photographic expert, at studio on second floor of the Oddfellows' Hall Building, Fitzmaurice Street, Wagga Wagga, from 1914 (DA June 9, 1914).

WARREN, W. Frederick Born at Chiltern, Victoria. Moved to the Wagga Wagga district in the 1870s; and lived at Oura Village from c.1900. Died on August 15, 1924; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Aug 16, 1924). Children: Edith Rosalie; Mrs A. Webb (Albury); T.W. (Oura); W.E. (Oura); and W.E.S (Oura).

WARREN, Walter Eric Died on December 19, 1976 at the age of eighty-six; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WARREN, William Came to the Wagga Wagga district c.1865; and lived at Gobbagumbalin (DA Apr 21 & 22, 1925). Children: Caroline; and John.

WASLIN, Andrew Enlisted on January 19, 1915 during World War I; private, 14th Light Horse; demobilised on October 27, 1919; listed on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga (AWM Nominal Roll; and DA Feb 11, 1915).

WASLIN, George Enlisted on January 19, 1915 during World War I; private, 7th Light Horse; demobilised on August 9, 1919; listed on Soldiers' Memorial and the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga (AWM Nominal Roll; DA Feb 11, 1915; and DA Sept 18, 1922).

WASLIN, Thomas ("Tom") Enlisted on January 19, 1915 during World War I; private, 7th Light Horse;

returned to Australia on June 27, 1919; listed on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga (AWM Nominal Roll; and DA Feb 11, 1915).

WASLIN, William Pickard Enlisted on January 19, 1915 during World War I; private, 7th Light Horse; killed in action on November 12, 1915; listed on the Soldiers' Memorial and the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga (AWM Nominal Roll; and DA Feb 11, 1915).

WATERS, Bertha Daughter of Frederick Robert and Catherine. Born at Braidwood c.1876. Domestic at Wagga Wagga in 1905. Married George Augustus Smith* at St Mary's Church, North Wagga Wagga, on January 4, 1905 (Ang Reg; and WWA Jan 5, 1905).

WATERS, Bridget Wife of James William; daughter of Patrick O'Meally of Young. Lived in Turvey Park, Wagga Wagga, for twenty-five years. Died at the Wagga Wagga Base Hospital on December 6, 1941 (DA Dec 8, 1941). Children: Joseph (Sydney); William (Wagga Wagga); Charles (Wagga Wagga); Arthur (Wagga Wagga); Fred (Wagga Wagga); Mrs George Gowley (Sydney); Mrs Jack Campbell (Wagga Wagga); and Mrs H. Southwell (Wagga Wagga).

WATERS, Catherine Brown Wife of Frederick (nee Mason?). Born Aberdeen, Scotland; and came to New South Wales in 1861. Spent a number of years in the Braidwood district. Moved to Wagga Wagga in the late 1870s. Lived in William Street, North Wagga Wagga. Died on May 16, 1921 at the age of eighty-three; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA May 17 & 19, 1921).

WATERS, Edward Son of Frederick and Catherine. Attended North Wagga Public School in the 1880s. Played cricket and tennis. Lived in William Street, North Wagga Wagga, in 1961. Daughter: Phyllis.

WATERS, Frederick Native of London, England. Came to New South Wales c.1857. Golddigging, Braidwood diggings. Later publican, Court House Hotel, Braidwood, for five years. Then goldmining again at Little River, eight miles from Braidwood. Moved to North Wagga Wagga in the late 1870s; and had opened a store by 1884. Attended a meeting of North Wagga Wagga residents at the schoolhouse on May 6, 1879 and listed as having three schoolage children and living a quarter of a mile from the school (Morris NWPS p.32). Active part in municipal matters in the north ward; and chaired a meeting of North Wagga residents to consider asking the north ward Alderman, Pratt, to resign on October 15, 1890 (WWA Oct 16, 1890). Participated in sport and dramas. Died on April 17, 1896 at the age of seventy-four (DA Apr 18, 1896). Wife: Catherine Brown. Children: Frederick; Edward; Mrs W. Moore; Bertha; and Mrs Alex Crombie.

WATERS, Frederick Died in September 1920.

WATERS, Frederick Robert Son of Frederick and Catherine. Builder; tender for additions to Wagga Wagga Hospital accepted in 1898 (WWA Sept 24, 1898); tendered for nurses' quarters in 1901 (WWA July 11, 1901). Bricklayer, Wagga Wagga (NSW Dir, 1903); and 1905. Lived at "Luton", Kincaid Street, Wagga Wagga (DA Apr 30, 1918).

WATERS, James Born in New South Wales c.1845. Labourer, Wagga Wagga. Anglican. Single. Died at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital on May 6, 1905 at the age of sixty (WWDH Reg).

WATERS, James William Born in Victoria c.1873. Builder and carpenter, Wagga Wagga, for twenty-two years. Married Bridget O'Meally. Lived in Urana Road, Turvey Park, Wagga Wagga. Died in September 1942 at the age of sixty-nine; buried at Wagga Wagga (DA Sept 9, 1942).

WATERS, L. Enlisted during World War I (DA May 15, 1916).

WATERS, Leslie Infant son of W.J. Died in April 1925 (DA Apr 27, 1925).

WATERS, Phyllis Eldest daughter of Edward. Married Douglas Inglis* at the Presbyterian Church, Wagga Wagga on October 12, 1927 (DA Nov 8, 1927).

WATERS, W.J. Wagga Experiment Farm in 1925. Son: Leslie.

WATERS, William James Plumber. Resided in Wagga Wagga for forty years. Died at the Wagga Wagga Base Hospital in February 1956 at the age of fifty-seven (DA Feb 25, 1956). Brother of: Frederick (Wagga Wagga); and Charles (Sydney).

WATSON, Ada Daughter of Samuel and Sarah. Married Walter William Bevan.

WATSON, Robert Auctioneer, stock and station agent and commission agent; entered into partnership with John Dill* in 1914 (Dill and Watson); and on death of Dill entered into partnership with F. Croaker* but carried on under the original title (firm was later absorbed by New Zealand Loan and Mercantile Agency Ltd). Active interest in cricket, shooting, coursing and picnic race clubs. Died at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital on June 28, 1922 at the age of forty-four; buried Presbyterian Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA June 29, 1922; and July 1, 1922).

WAUGH, J.A. Police Constable; at Junee for three years; then promoted to lock-up keeper at North Wagga Wagga in 1919 (DA Sept 12, 1919); promoted to 3rd class sergeant, Goulburn, in 1921 (DA Mar 15, 1921).

WAY, William Born in New South Wales. Wesleyan. Labourer, Oura. Single. Died at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital on September 18, 1904 at the age of fifty-nine (WWDH Reg).

WEALAND, Ernie Son of R. of Wagga Wagga. Died (typhoid) at Tumberumba, New South Wales, in January 1900 at the age of twenty (WWA Jan 30, 1900).

WEALAND, Janet Director, Wagga Wagga Base Hospital, 1977-81. President of Wagga Wagga Auxiliary, New South Wales Society for Crippled Children. Member of Auxiliary of Kurrajong School for Retarded Children. Member of the Toy Library Fund for Handicapped Persons.

WEATHERALL, Harry Saddler; foreman for Coffey and Cassin*, Wagga Wagga. Died in August 1923 at the age of eighty-five (DA Aug 14, 1923).

WEATHERBY, H. (or E.) Lived in Wagga Wagga. Volunteer for the 2nd Transvaal Contingent during the Boer War (WWA Jan 2 & 20, 1900).

WEAVER, Jessie Born in New South Wales. Anglican. Died at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital on September 20, 1901 (WWDH Reg).

WEBB, A. Enlisted during World War I (DA May 15, 1916).

WEBB, A.F. Teacher, Wagga Wagga High School. Married Eva Warren* on December 6, 1919 (DA Dec 16, 1919).

WEBB, Ada Beatrice ("Cobbie") Wife of Ernest Charles nee Searle. Joined the 2WG Women's Club in 1932; secretary and then general president 1942-55; reported the Club's news twice daily on 2WG for eighteen years, known to listeners as "Cobbie"; during the years she was associated with the Club, over 200,000 pounds were raised for charity (including The Haven). Also a Justice of the Peace; worked for St John's Anglican Church, Wagga Wagga; life member of the Wagga Wagga and District Ambulance; and life member of Sydney Hospital from 1977. Awarded M.B.E. for community service in 1955 and presented with the award at Government House in May 1956. First woman in the Riverina to be given a civic reception. WEBB, J.W. Teacher. Member of the Wagga Wagga Base Hospital Board 1946-47 (Morris ADB p.267).

WEBB, Leo Arthur Enlisted before the end of January 1915 during World War I (DA Feb 11, 1915).

WEBB, Leslie Thomas ("Tom") Attended Wagga Wagga High School; brilliant student. Died at Newcastle at the age of twenty (DA July 19, 1919). Brother of: Mrs W.H. Ellis.

WEBB, Sarah Maud Manager of shop owned by her father, Webb's Boot Shop, 110 Baylis Street, Wagga Wagga, from January 1926 (DA Sept 16 1926; and Oct 4, 1926).

WEBB, W.H. Enlisted during World War I (DA May 15, 1916).

WEBB, William John Saleyards manager for Wagga Wagga City Council 1956-73. Webb Street, Bomen, North Wagga Wagga, was named after him (Ellis p.105).

WEBBER, Alice Daughter of Peter Leonard and Bertha Maud; born c.1908.

WEBBER, Clyde Son of Thomas. Enlisted on November 10, 1915 during World War I; private, 46th Battalion; returned to Australia on December 4, 1918 (AWM Nominal Roll; and DA Aug 9, 1918).

WEBBER, Bertha Maud Wife of Peter Leonard nee Malone. Died at the Cootamundra District Hospital in January 1923 at the age of thirty-three (DA Jan 13, 1923). Daughter: Alice.

WEBBER, Peter Leonard. Married Bertha Maud Malone*. Fetter, Wallendbeen.

WEBBER, J. Employed in the wool business, Wagga Wagga. Enlisted during World War I; served at Gallipoli and France; sergeant (DA Jan 5, 1918).

WEBBER, Thomas Head waiter for Ernest Bellair* for a number of years and then in business in Fitzmaurice Street, Wagga Wagga. Died in Sydney in August 1918 leaving a widow, one daughter and one son, Clyde (DA Aug 9, 1918).

WEBBER, W.J. Wool, skin hide and tallow merchant, Baylis Street, Wagga Wagga from c.1910 (Robertson, 1914).

WEBBER, William James Member of Manchester Unity Independent Order of Oddfellows. Served in the Boer War. Enlisted on May 13, 1915 during World War I; sergeant, 1st Pioneers; served at Gallipoli, Bullecourt, Pozieres and Moquet Farm; wounded by bullet in the right arm; awarded a Military Medal; returned to Australia on May 12, 1918 and to Wagga Wagga by October, 1918; listed on the Memorial Arch,

Wagga Wagga (AWM Nominal Roll; DA Nov 1, 1917; and DA Oct 8, 1918).

WEBER, Sigmund Shepherd, "Eunonyhareenyha", Wagga Wagga district; held an account with the Australian Joint Stock Bank, Wagga Wagga, 1860-61 (Ledger).

WEBSTER, Joseph Brewer, Wooden brewery at the rear of the Royal Hotel at the corner of Baylis and Forsyth Streets 1875-77.

WEBSTER, Thomas John Son of Charles Bryant. Cordial Manufacturer; bought Cootamundra Cordial Works from W.S. Eaton* in July 1877; expanded to Temora in 1881 in soft drinks and in the same year built and conducted the Central Hotel; also second licensee of Coolamon Hotel 1885-86; and later established soft drink works at Aria Park and Ardlethan.

WEBSTER, William John ("Jack") Son of D. of "Garr House", Ballina, north coast of New South Wales. Student at the Wagga Experiment Farm. Enlisted on

February 28, 1916 during World War I; driver, 1st Division Ammunition Column; served on the western front; invalided home on April 8, 1918 (AWM Nominal Roll; and DA May 16, 1919). Married Agnes Cecily Moloney* on June 1, 1919 (DA June 19, 1919).

WEEDON, John Francis Warren ("Jack") Son of Stephen Henry and Mabel Francis. Born in Queensland on August 13, 1889. Employed on the staff of Messrs H.M. Suttor and Co, City Agents. Auctioneer, Sydney and Wagga Wagga. Enlisted during World War I; lieutenant, 19th Battalion; wounded at Pozieres late July 1916; returned to the front in November 1916; left leg shattered by a shell in January 1917 and later amputated; attended by brother, Dr Stephen Hertford; invalided home on May 12, 1918 (AWM Nominal Roll; Bean III p.622; DA Feb 3, 1917; Nov 20, 1917; July 11, 1918; and July 26, 1918). Married Myra Ousby Martell at St James Church, Sydney, on December 19, 1923 (DA Dec 19, 1923).

WEEDON, Josephine Youngest daughter of S.H. Married Gordon Drummond* on August 22, 1927 (DA Aug 23, 1927).

WEEDON, Mabel Francis Wife of Stephen Henry nee Carter. Born Narracoorte, South Australia. Moved to Wagga Wagga c.1911. Died in August 1941 at the age of seventy-five (DA Aug 22, 1941).

WEEDON, Phyllis Wife of Stephen Hertford; elder daughter of Arthur Bragg of "Landgrove", Cootamundra district.

WEEDON, Stephen Henry Engineer. Married Mabel Francis Carter at Roma, Queensland. Living in Wagga Wagga in 1918 (DA July 26, 1918). Died on December 16, 1937. Children: Stephen Hertford; John F.W.; Temple C.; and Mrs Walter Wallace Martin.

WEEDON, Stephen Hertford Son of Stephen Henry (an engineer) and

Mabel Francis. Doctor; matriculated from the University of Sydney. Arrived in Wagga Wagga in 1913 to fill vacancy on staff of Wagga Wagga District Hospital. Enlisted in Australian Army Medical Corps during World War I; spent several weeks at Menangle and then transferred to England, and then Rouen in France in January 1917; returned to England for an appendicitis operation and remained all winter with the 4th Training Battalion at Salisbury Plain; returned to France in June; worked with 2nd Australian General Hospital in France and gained a lot of experience with X-Rays and Pathology; promoted from captain to surgeon major in January 1918 and to senior operating surgeon in March, 1918; contracted influenza and was invalided home on December 24, 1918; listed on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga (AWM Nominal Roll). WEEKS, Vivi Born in London. Presbyterian. Married. Engaged in domestic duties at Walla Walla. Died at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital on November 25, 1909 at the age of twenty-one (WWDH Reg).

WEINGARTH, H.C. Dental assistant; associated with John Cain of Macquarie Street, Sydney, for several years; and appointed on the staff of Dr Alfred Nathan*, Wagga Wagga, in 1917 (DA Sept 5, 1917).

WEIR, David Store at Eurongilly; visited by bushranger, Captain Moonlite* in 1879. Later sold store and took up a large area at Wantiool which he called "Airies". Married Helen Christina Beveridge* at Eurongilly in 1876. Died at Junee in November, 1929 (DA Nov 15, 1929). Children: one son and two deceased.

WEIR, James Mail contractor, Tarcutta-Wagga Wagga, once a week but proved unsatisfactory and was induced to transfer contract to James Walsh* in July 1851 (WWBB). Subscribed one pound towards the widowed and fatherless fund in 1855 (WWBB).

WEISBACK, Francis Wife of John Edward; daughter of W. Waite. Born at Deniliquin, New South Wales. Moved to Wagga Wagga c.1890. Died at Wagga Wagga on July 30, 1943 at the age of seventy-nine; buried Methodist Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA July 31, 1943).

WEISBACK, John Edward Born in Denmark in 1825. Resided in the Wagga Wagga district for over fifty years. Died at his son's residence at Lake Albert, Wagga Wagga, in 1921; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Aug 3 & 4, 1921). Children: Mrs G. Pace (Kincaid Street, Wagga Wagga); John Henry (Lake Albert); and Joseph William (Gregadoo).

W

WEISBACK, Joseph William Died on September 3, 1973 at the age of seventy-nine; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WEISNER, Salome Nurse, Wagga Wagga District Hospital, in 1911 (WWA Apr 6, 1911).

WEISSEL, E.B. ("Ted") Arrived in Cootamundra with the first railway men. Died c.1933 at the age of seventy-two (DA Sept 12, 1942). Wife: Ellen.

WEISSEL, Ellen Wife of E.B. ("Ted"). Died at Cootamundra on September 8, 1942 at the age of eighty (DA Sept 9 & 11, 1942). Children: Eric; and Gladys.

WEISSELL, Eric Son of E.B. ("Ted") and Ellen. Good footballer; as a member of the Cootamundra team 1921-26; Temora 1927-33; and Narrandera 1933-35; largely responsible for the Maher Cup becoming famous as a football trophy, 1921-33; played for the Riverina team against New Zealand in 1926 and against England in 1928, spearheading the Riverina to a nineteen all draw with the English team; when captain-coach of the Temora team he was chosen to play for Australia and in 1929-30 toured England with the Kangaroos and became regarded as one of the best five-eighths in the world; played against England again in Australia in 1932 when the English toured; captained the Southern Districts Team which played the English team in 1936 (DA May 1936); led the Magpies to premiership and winning of Clayton Cup in 1939; returned as non playing coach 1949-50 (DA July 3, 1957; and July 17, 1987).

WELBY, John Police Constable at Wagga Wagga (WWA July 7, 1903).

WELLER, George Robert Born in Dublin, Ireland, of English parents. Moved to Epsom, England, and lived in England until 1844 when he emigrated to Victoria. Farmer; gold digger in 1851; and then established a nursery at

Warrenheap. Moved to New South Wales in 1870 and to Wagga Wagga in 1884. Gardener employed by George Coleman* for many years. Died on February 9, 1902 at the age of eighty-six, leaving one son (WWA Feb 11, 1902).

WELLS, Alice Daughter of Ezekial. Lived at Yathella. Married John Joseph Dennis* (WWA Oct 28, 1909).

WELLS, C.J. Methodist Minister at Wagga Wagga from 1943 (DA Apr 14, 1943).

WELLS, Eliza Alice Wife of Ezekial nee Hurst. Died on December 11, 1936 at the age of fifty-seven; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WELLS, Ernest H. Enlisted before the end of January 1915 during World War I (DA Feb 11, 1915).

WELLS, Ernest Henry Died in August 1948 (DA Aug 9, 1948).

WELLS, Ezekial Native of Ireland. Emigrated to Australia with his father at the age of four. Selected several blocks of land at Eunonyhareenyha 1873-74 including 320 acres in August 1873, in his own name and others in the names of his children, Ezekial George (?), Mary Jane and William James; owned property for many years at Burrowa and Canberra; and came to Yathella c.1908 and sheared on Riverina stations. Lived at "Alice View", Wallacetown. May have married Rose Ann Tolland. Died at the Junee Hospital in November 1928 at the age of seventy-nine; buried Anglican Portion, Old Junee Cemetery (DA Nov 21, 1928). Children: Alice; William (Cowra); George James (Junee); Mrs J.F. Begley (Yathella, Wallacetown); Mrs C. Boulding (Boorowa); Mrs H. Smith (Junee); Mrs A. McKenzie (Chatswood); Mrs Claude Hamilton (Marrar); and Miss P. (Wagga Wagga District Hospital).

W

WELLS, Ezekial George Born on September 26, 1871. Married Eliza Alice Hurst* on May 25, 1900. Died on October 20, 1935 at the age of sixty-four; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC). Daughter: Lillian Maude.

WELLS, George James Son of Ezekial; born at Burrowa. Moved to Junee with his parents in the early 1900s when they selected land when "Gobbagombalin" was thrown open for closer settlement; and was a farmer on his parents' property for many years. Died at Junee in May 1943 at the age of fifty-eight; buried at Old Junee Cemetery (DA May 22, 1943).

WELLS, George Robert Born in Ireland c.1816. Anglican. Gardener, Wagga Wagga. Died a widower at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital on February 9, 1902 at the age of eighty-six (WWDH Reg).

WELLS, James Lived at "Brownlow", Malebo. Died in December 1927 (DA Dec 8 & 9, 1927).

WELLS, Mary Jane Daughter of Ezekial and Rose Ann. Born on April 28, 1873. Married Arthur Hurst* on April 17, 1901.

WELLS, Matt Son of Mrs E., Baylis Street, Wagga Wagga. Enlisted at Junee in August 1914 at the beginning of World War I; served at Gallipoli; wounded at Pozieres; fought at Bullencourt; sergeant, B Company, 3rd Battalion; awarded Belgium Croix de Guerre; returned to Australia on July 7, 1919 (AWM Nominal Roll; and DA Apr 24, 1918).

WELMAN Owned a valuable horse, "Bobby Rand", which was burnt to death at Hoysted's training stables on August 18, 1889 (WWA Aug 20, 1889).

WELMAN, John Cameron Captain in the British Army; later pastoralist, Harden district; at

"Ariah" and "Bungambil" from 1865. Died at the end of 1870. Sons: John; Sydney; Wellesby; and Alfred.

WELMAN, Sydney Son of John Cameron. Retained as manager of the family's properties of "Ariah" and "Bungambil" when they were taken over by the Bank of New South Wales c.1883. Played cricket for the Wagga Wagga Cricket Club in the 1880s and early 1890s. Also played polo. Left "Ariah" in 1909 and took over a hotel at Campbelltown. Died on March 20, 1910 at the age of forty-five (WWA Mar 24, 1910).

WELSH, Mrs Drapery Store, next to store owned by George Forsyth*, Wagga Wagga, in 1858 (Garland p.22).

WELSH, Beaumont ("Tim") Died on June 18, 1941 at the age of sixty-one; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WELSH, Dr H.L. St Vincent. Doctor; practiced at Narrandera. Enlisted during World War I; attained the rank of lieutenant-colonel; awarded a Distinguished Service Order. Doctor at Charleville, Queensland; then Turramurra; then purchased the practice of Dr E.A. Tivey* at Wagga Wagga (DA Mar 1, 1923).

WELSH, Henry Beaumont Lived at Hay and then Cobar, New South Wales. Married Mary Lakeman* in 1873.

WELSH, Mary Wife of Henry Beaumont nee Lakeman. Widowed at an early age and left with four sons, the youngest aged seven. Returned to live at "Taranaki", Wagga Wagga, from c.1932. Died on May 17, 1940 at the age of ninety-six; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA May 18, 1940). Children: Harry Burt (Orange); Gordon (Orange); Norman (Melbourne); and Beaumont (Melbourne).

W

WELSH, Maurice Purchased liquor at hotel owned by William Brown* on Sunday October 20 and Sunday October 27, 1850 (WWBB).

WELSH, W. Born in Ireland. Lutheran. Single. Labourer, Sandy Creek, Wagga Wagga district. Died at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital on November 22, 1902 at the age of sixty-two (WWDH Reg).

WENK, Doris Marion Probably a daughter of W.F. Died on January 23, 1915 at the age of three years, nine months; buried Wesleyan Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WENK, Gladys Mary Daughter of W.F. Died at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital in May 1917 at the age of nine; buried Methodist Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA May 7, 1917).

WENK, Minnie May One of three women nominated for the Wagga Wagga District Hospital Committee in 1925 (DA Feb 13, 1925). Died on December 11, 1963 at the age of eighty-three; buried Church of Christ Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WENK, William Frederick Born in Melbourne, Victoria. Moved to Wagga Wagga c.1912. Engineer; co-founder of the firm, Wenk and Johnston, with Frances Edward ("Frank") Johnston*, engineers and ironfounders, Baylis Street and later Tompson Street, Wagga Wagga (Robertson, 1914; and DA Dec 4, 1939). Lived in Tompson Street in 1917. Lived in Best Street in 1928. Alderman, Wagga Wagga Municipal Council 1927-31; an unsuccessful candidate in 1923 (DA Aug 27, 1923; and Dec 3, 1928). Attended meeting to form the Wagga Wagga Chamber of Commerce in 1936 (DA Sept 18, 1986 p.3). Keen church attender. Member of the Wagga Wagga Bowling Club. Died on January 18, 1948 at the age of sixty-seven; buried Church of Christ Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Jan 19 & 20, 1948; and WWMC). Children: three

daughters, Mrs M. Soloman, and two deceased by 1948.

WENKE, Martin Born Chiltern, Victoria, where his father had a business. Publican, Bourke Street, Melbourne, Victoria. Moved to Wagga Wagga in 1913; acquired the valuable Fitzmaurice Street property, the Pastoral Hotel, together with Trail Street frontage; assisted in its management by his sister. Magnetic personality; bright, generous and popular despite a brusque exterior. Interested in the turf and owned "Eusebius", the Derby winner of 1918, and "Delenda". Moved to Sydney in 1923 after purchasing the fine hotel and business site known as "Dungates" at the corner of Castlereagh and Liverpool Streets. Died in November, 1927 (DA Oct 2, 1913; Oct 17, 1921; June 1, 1923; July 2, 1926; and Nov 30, 1927; and Robertson, 1914).

WENKE, Samuel Died on June 20, 1941 at the age of fifty-one (DA June 25, 1941).

WENKE, Zoe Daughter of Martin. Educated at Mt Erin, Wagga Wagga. Good singer; later well known in light opera and musical comedy and understudy for Gladys Moncrieff in 1921 (DA July 30, 1921; Mar 1, 1922; and Nov 30, 1927).

WENNERBON, F. Attended meeting to form the Wagga Wagga Chamber of Commerce in 1936 (DA Apr 18, 1986).

WENNERBON, Frederick James Born in 1891. Died in 1965 at the age of seventy-four; and buried Presbyterian Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WENNERBON, Ivy Margaret Probably the wife of Frederick James. Born in 1904. Died in 1972 at the age of sixty-eight; and buried Presbyterian Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

W

WENTWORTH-SHIELDS, Reverend W.F. Anglican minister; graduated with a Bachelor of Arts at the University of London in 1890 and Master of Arts at the same university three years later; ordained a deacon by Bishop of Rochester in 1898 and a priest by the same prelate in 1899; curate at St John the Baptist, Plumstead, Kent, England; curate, St George's, Bloomsbury, London; then rector at Cooma, New South Wales, for eighteen months; and then at St Saviour's Cathedral, Goulburn, for twelve months. Rector at St John's Church of England, Wagga Wagga, succeeding Reverend A.C. Mosley* in 1905 (WWA July 4, 1905).

WEST, Christopher Carpenter; summoned John Davidson for assault in 1872 (WWA Apr 10, 1872).

WEST, Elizabeth Wife of Thomas Henry nee Maher. Born County Carlow, Ireland, c.1832. Died at Wagga Wagga on February 2, 1911.

WEST, George A. Publican; Club House Hotel, Kincaid Street, Wagga Wagga, 1897-98 (Burch); disposed of the hotel to Edward Seymour* in 1898 (WWA Aug 18, 1898). Horse dealer, Wagga Wagga (NSW Dir, 1903).

WEST, Henry Married Ivy Ellen Coonan.

WEST, Ivy Ellen Wife of Henry. Died in Melbourne, Victoria, in April 1921 at the age of twenty-eight (DA Apr 28, 1921).

WEST, Ivy Sophia Wife of Stanley Johnston nee Dixon. Died on August 17, 1973; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WEST, J. Dye works, Johnston Street, Wagga Wagga, in 1910 (WWA).

WEST, John Farmer, North Wagga Wagga, and later Kyeamba Creek where he was employed by Darlow. Seems to have died in 1873 a few

months after the tragic death of his wife, Sarah (WWE May 7, 1873).

WEST, S.L. Owner of the horse which won the Wagga Gold Cup in 1896 (DA Apr 30, 1917).

WEST, Reverend Stanley Johnson Born in 1884. Anglican Minister; eight years at Queanbeyan; and arrived in Wagga Wagga in June 1928 (DA June 1, 1928; Oct 29, 1928; Mar 14 & 17, 1931; and Apr 21, 1949). Archdeacon, Wagga Wagga; and Rector at St John's Church, Wagga Wagga 1928-53. Married Miss Ivy Sophia Dixon of Junee on January 8, 1913 (DA Jan 13, 1913). Died on November 12, 1954 at the age of seventy-six; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA; and WWMC). West Parade, Wagga Wagga, was named after him in 1946 (Ellis p.106). Memorial, glass window, St John's Church of England, Wagga Wagga, dedicated in 1958 (DA June 2, 1958).

WEST, T.E. Attended Wagga Wagga Primary School. Enlisted during World War I; listed on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga.

WEST, Thomas Henry Born in Dublin, Ireland, c.1837. Married Elizabeth Maher at Yass, New South Wales, c.1861. Licensee, Club House Hotel, in 1896 (Burch). Died at Wagga Wagga on September 2, 1902. Children: Maria (born in 1863); William E. (1864); Thomas (1867); and Edward (1869).

WESTBY, A.A. Pastoralist at "Pullitop" station with E.W. Westby (NSW Dir, 1903). Provisional director of proposed meat freezing and slaughtering company in 1881 (DA Oct 10, 1928). Captain of the Wagga Wagga Polo team in 1888.

WESTERNDORF, Mrs A. Daughter of George William Birch*. Lived in Wagga Wagga in 1945.

WESTERNDORF, August Labourer, Wagga Wagga, in the early 1860s;

W

held an account with the Australian Joint Stock Bank, Wagga Wagga, 1860-61 (Ledger).

WESTERN DORF, Christian Married Elizabeth Matuschka at Tabor in 1866 and took up land at Jindera. Moved to Wagga Wagga in 1898. Sons: Rudolph Christian; and Otto.

WESTERN DORF, Elizabeth Wife of Christian nee Matuschka.

WESTERN DORF, Ernstine Lydia Died on July 3, 1965 at the age of eighty-five; buried Wesleyan Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WESTERN DORF, Helena Hanna Died at Wagga Wagga in July 1949 at the age of eighty-two (DA July 30, 1949).

WESTERN DORF, John William Grazier, Tarcutta Road, Wagga Wagga (DA Oct 13, 1927).

WESTERN DORF, Otto Son of Christian. Took up land on "Ganmain" station about the turn of the century.

WESTERN DORF, Rudolph Christian F. Son of Christian. Took up land on "Ganmain" station about the turn of the century. Died at Calvary Hospital on January 26, 1958 at the age of eighty-seven; buried Wesleyan Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Jan 27, 1958; and WWMC). Children: Ernest (Currawarna); Aleck (Wagga Wagga); Elsie (Mrs J.H. Bartholomew); and Dorothy (Mrs R.T. Dark, Taree).

WESTON, J.T. Enlisted during World War I (DA May 15, 1916).

WETTEN, Allan Augustus Born in Sydney. Moved to Wagga Wagga in 1911. Signwriter until his retirement c.1948; sons carried on as Messrs Wetten and Son. Member of the South Wagga Bowling Club. Died at the Wagga Wagga Base Hospital on November 18, 1958 at the age of seventy-nine; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga

Wagga Cemetery (DA Nov 19, 1958). Wife: Doreen. Son: Mervyn.

WEYLAND, Gladys Nurse, Wagga Wagga District Hospital; stopped work in protest against the dismissal of Nurse Powell; dismissed and moved to Scone (DA June 6, 1917; and Nov 13, 1917; and Morris ADB pp.42-47).

WHALAN, Emma Jane Wife of James Patrick nee Herrick.

WHALAN, James Patrick Married Emma Jane Herrick* at St Michael's Church, Wagga Wagga (DA Nov 29, 1922). Lived at 104 Best Street, Wagga Wagga, in 1927.

WHARTON, F.E. Son of Mrs M.G. Crouch. Attended Wagga Primary School; and the Christian Brothers High School, Wagga Wagga. Enlisted during World War I; private; wounded in 1918; returned in 1919; listed on the Honour roll of the Christian Brothers High School and on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga (DA Aug 17, 1916; Oct 8, 1918; July 22, 1919; and Dec 16, 1920).

WHARTON, John Born in New South Wales. Anglican. Married. Labourer, Wagga Wagga. Died at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital on April 15, 1905 at the age of fifty-three (WWDH Reg).

WHEATLEY, John Issued a slaughtering licence for a South Wagga Wagga yard on March 10, 1851 (WWBB).

WHEATLEY, Margaret Brother of J. and F. Born at "The Oaks" near Camden, New South Wales, c.1847. Married Edward Seymour* and moved to Wagga Wagga.

WHEATLEY, Thelma Daughter of James Patrick and Ada. Born on August 23, 1912; and baptized on March 3, 1913 (Ang Reg).

WHEATLEY, W.H. Stock and station agent and auctioneer, Wagga Wagga, in the early 1900s; member of firm Wheatley and Sedgley and later Wheatley and Cullen* from

W

c.1911 (DA May 12, 1913; and Robertson, 1914) until that firm was absorbed by Dalgetys' Ltd in the 1920s. Wheatley and Cullen subscribed ten guineas to the Australia Day Fund for the return of the wounded in 1915 during World War I.

WHEELER, Alice Daughter of George. Married Mr Sullivan.

WHEELER, Annie Daughter of George. Married Charles William Fitzgerald*.

WHEELER, Annie Born in western Victoria on March 28, 1883. Lived in Wagga Wagga 1916-17. Married Mr Stevenson, a lorry driver.

WHEELER, Annie Bridget Wife of William. Born County Clare, Ireland. Emigrated to Australia c.1850. Leased the Captain Cook Hotel at Circular Quay, Sydney; then hotel at Beechworth, Victoria; and then Grahamstown. Moved to Wagga Wagga c.1877; took over the Prince of Wales Hotel in Fitzmaurice Street; and then purchased the Royal Hotel, Baylis Street, Newtown, Wagga Wagga, by 1886; licensee of the Royal Hotel 1882-87, 1890-91 and 1895-99 (Burch); retired c.1901 and lived with her son, George. Died at her son's residence on December 19, 1915 at the age of eighty-two; buried Catholic Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Dec 20, 1915). Children: George; William; Mrs W. McAlister (Wagga Wagga); Mrs M. Park (Waverly); and Mrs A. Lamprell (Marrickville).

WHEELER, Charles Probably the son of Annie. Licensee, Royal Hotel, Wagga Wagga, in 1901 (Burch; and NSW Dir, 1903). Married Mary Quinlivan* at St Michael's Church, Wagga Wagga, on May 1, 1900 (WWA May 3, 1900). Daughter: Maggie.

WHEELER, Reverend Charles Methodist Minister at Wagga Wagga. Married Nurse Judd, daughter of W. of Brocklesby, at Albury, New South Wales, on April 6, 1920 (DA Apr 9, 1920).

WHEELER, Eliza Daughter of William and Ann. Died on June 18, 1886 at the age of twenty-five; buried Catholic Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WHEELER, G. Probably the son of George. Enlisted during World War I; private; wounded in the arm in 1917 (DA July 21, 1917).

WHEELER, George Born in England. Anglican. Cook, Murrumburrah. Died at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital on July 28, 1886 at the age of sixty-seven (WWDH Reg).

WHEELER, George Son of Annie. Licensee of the Royal Hotel, Baylis Street, Wagga Wagga, 1892-94 (Burch). Married Sarah E. Tilden*. Lived in Best Street, Wagga Wagga, in 1915. Sons: William J.; and possibly G.

WHEELER, George Born c.1817. Stonemason. Married Mary McSimmonds on November 15, 1858 (Ang Reg).

WHEELER, Mrs George Licenced victualler. Moved to Sydney c.1924. Died in Sydney in September 1944 (DA Sept 8, 1944). Children: William; Annie; Maggie; Alice; Marie; and Mollie.

WHEELER, Gladys Evelyn Daughter of Glendyor Percy and Amy. Born on October 26, 1911; and baptized on August 22, 1912 (Ang Reg).

WHEELER, Glendyor Percy ("Bob") Licensee of the All Nations Hotel, Baylis Street, Wagga Wagga; and at hotel in Simmons Street in 1912. Keen sportsman and supporter of the turf; owned and raced horses. Lived in Murray Street in 1910. Died on February 5, 1915 at the age of twenty-nine, leaving a widow and two young daughters (DA Feb 6, 1915). Wife: Amy. Children: Sylvia Katherine Maud; and Gladys Evelyn.

WHEELER, Maggie Daughter of Charles. Married Peter William ("Willie") McAlister*.

W

WHEELER, Mary Wife of Charles nee Quinlivan. Died in Sydney on February 23, 1914 (DA Feb 25, 1914).

WHEELER, Sylvia Katherine Maud Daughter of Glendyor Percy ("Bob") and Amy. Born on May 8, 1910; and baptized on August 15, 1910 (Ang Reg).

WHEELER, W. Licensee of the Prince of Wales Hotel, Fitzmaurice Street, Wagga Wagga, in 1878.

WHEELER, W. Enlisted during World War I; listed on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga.

WHEELER, William Native of Massachusetts, United States of America. Died on January 17, 1882 at the age of sixty-three; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WMMC).

WHEELER, William James Son of George. Attended the Christian Brothers High School, Wagga Wagga. Member of the Hibernian Australian Catholic Benefit Society. Enlisted on December 1, 1915 during World War I; member of the "Kangaroo" contingent; farewelled at Wagga Wagga before going to the front in 1916; private, 55th (or 58th) Battalion; wounded in 1917; seriously wounded in the right arm and invalided to Australia on December 20, 1917; welcomed home in 1918; listed on the Honour Roll of the Christian Brothers High School and on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga (AWM Nominal Roll; DA Apr 7, 1916; June 13, 1917; Feb 20, 1918; Sept 7, 1918; and Dec 16, 1920).

WHELAN, F. Lived at North Wagga Wagga in the 1890s; complained about Clark's boiling down works in 1894.

WHELAN, J.M. Acquired the Federal Brewery from Messrs Mahon and Headley and, after conducting it for a short time, sold out to Tooth and Co of Sydney; moved to

WHILLANS, Helen Assistant teacher, North Wagga Public School, 1918-22 (Morris NWPS p.42).

WHITE A.E. Attended the Christian Brothers High School, Wagga Wagga. Employed at Miss Smith's Grocery Store, Wagga Wagga. Good cricketer; played for the Newtown Cricket Club and second in the bowling averages 1898-99. Enlisted in the Mayor's Unit in 1917 during World War I; trooper; on final leave at Wagga Wagga in 1917; listed on the Honour Roll of the Christian Brothers High School (DA May 9, 1917; and Dec 16, 1920).

WHITE, A.F.D. Moved to Wagga Wagga on May 16, 1902 to take up the position of secretary of the Murrumbidgee Pastoral and Agricultural Association and was also appointed secretary of the Wagga Wagga District Hospital Committee from November 1902. Also secretary of the Cycling Club and from 1906 the secretary of the Picnics Race Club. Courteous; the "perfect gentleman". Left Wagga Wagga in 1922 to become the Melbourne manager of the firm of Sheckell, White and Co Pty Ltd (DA Nov 12, 1913; Apr 6, 1922; Nov 25, 1922; and Aug 9, 1928; Morris ADB pp.32, 47 & 223; and NSW Dir, 1903). Son: Melville.

WHITE, Alfred Son of J.B. Drowned in the Murrumbidgee River, Wagga Wagga, at the age of nine (WWA Feb 28, 1877).

WHITE, C.A. Music teacher; intended marrying Neil Sutherland (DA July 4, 1924).

WHITE, Clara Wife of John. Born in London, England, and emigrated to Australia at the age of twenty-five. Roman Catholic

W

religion. Died on August 22, 1914 at the age of forty-seven leaving a widower, two sons and three daughters; buried Catholic Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Aug 24, 1914; and WWMC).

WHITE, Douglas A. Born in Geelong, Victoria. Educated at Geelong Grammar School; and the Trinity College, University of Melbourne, graduating from the faculty of civil engineering in 1924. Served five years in the army during World War II. Joined the Department of Main Roads c.1926; and was the Divisional Engineer at Wagga Wagga from c.1946; retired on April 27, 1956 (DA Apr 10, 1956). Wife: Dr Violet.

WHITE, Edna A. Born at Walcha, northern New South Wales, on January 16, 1908. Educated at the New England Girls School, Armidale, New South Wales. Nurse; trained at Tamworth Base Training School and then the Royal North Shore Hospital, Sydney; worked at Grafton Base Hospital, Wagga Wagga Base Hospital, Dubbo and Gundagai Hospitals prior to World War II. Served in the Army for five and a half years during world War II before returning to Gundagai. Then moved to Melbourne, Victoria, and opened the first Nursing Aide Training Centre. Appointed Matron at the Wagga Wagga Base Hospital on January 11, 1954; and remained eighteen years until she resigned in August 1971 (Morris ADB pp.86, 90, 93, 178, 187-193, 235 & 243).

WHITE, Edward Lived in Wagga Wagga in the 1850s. Owned a horse and was a steward at the races at North Wagga Wagga in the 1850s. Contributed five pounds towards the building fund for St Michael's Church by 1859.

WHITE, Frederick Charles Born in 1909. Proprietor of the Riverina Sawmilling Company. Alderman, Wagga Wagga City Council 1953-67; deputy mayor 1960-66. Died on September 11, 1967 at the age of fifty-eight; buried Anglican

Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA; and WWMC). White Avenue, Koorringal, Wagga Wagga, was named after him in 1963 (Ellis p.106).

WHITE, G. Policeman for nearly thirty-nine years; superintendent of the Riverina Police District for two years; retired in February 1963 (DA).

WHITE, George Captain in charge of the Wagga Wagga Fire Brigade from 1922; transferred to Beecroft, Sydney, in 1926 (DA Jan 28, 1922; Feb 23, 1926; and Aug 10, 1926). Son: George.

WHITE, George Son of George; born c.1912. Violinist; awarded commemorative gold medal for being first in the state in the Sydney College of Music in 1924 (DA Jan 30, 1925).

WHITE, Henry Born in England. Anglican. Cook, Wagga Wagga. Widower. Died at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital on December 30, 1901, at the age of seventy-six (WWDH Reg).

WHITE, J. Lived at The Esplanade, Wagga Wagga. Son: Lawrence Adrian.

WHITE, Mrs J. Daughter of Julia and Patrick Corbett*. Lived at Wagga Wagga in 1923.

WHITE, J.B. Blacksmith, coach and buggy-builder at Stidworthy's* opposite the Wesleyan Church in 1874 and later at Gurwood Street, Wagga Wagga, by 1878. Son: Alfred.

WHITE, J.K. Enlisted during World War I (DA May 15, 1916).

WHITE, James Born in the West Indies. Single. Anglican. Labourer, residing at Hanging Rock. Died at the Wagga Wagga Hospital on May 12, 1886 at the age of fifty-two (WWDH Reg).

WHITE, James Born in Scotland. Single. Methodist. Labourer, Wagga Wagga. Died at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital on July

W

20, 1903 at the age of fifty (WWDH Reg).

WHITE, James Enlisted during World War I; listed on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga.

WHITE, John Labourer; hired by William Brown* in 1851 and charged Brown with refusing to supply him with proper provisions (WWBB).

WHITE, John ("Jack") Son of William Peter. Australian Workers' Union organiser; and president of the Wagga Wagga Political Labor League (DA Jan 18, 1916). Married with five children. Volunteered for service during World War I but rejected (DA Aug 17, 1918).

WHITE, John Employed by J.W. Shepherd*, Wagga Wagga, from c.1909. Lived at "Cottage", Gobbagombalin Homestead, Narrandera Road, Wagga Wagga. Wife: Clara.

WHITE, Joseph Enlisted during World War I; listed on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga.

WHITE, Joseph John Died on June 6, 1933 at the age of seventy-two; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WVMC).

WHITE, L.A. Grocery and Ironmongery Store, 136 Baylis Street, Wagga Wagga; sold to J.K. ("Kierie") Moloney* in 1924 (DA Feb 29, 1924).

WHITE, Lawrence Adrian Son of J. Enlisted in Mayor Oates Unit on April 18, 1917 during World War I; driver, Light Horse Field Ambulance and later Australian Camel Field Ambulance; returned to Australia on July 24, 1919; listed on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga (AWM Nominal Roll; and DA Aug 29, 1919).

WHITE, Nicholas Born in England. Presbyterian. Labourer, Junee. Married. Died at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital on May 30, 1903

at the age of seventy-one (WWDH Reg).

WHITE, R. Boot dealer; member of firm, Messrs R. White Ltd, Melbourne, Victoria. Built a two storey structure at the corner of Baylis and Morgan Streets, Wagga Wagga, and two shops alongside (DA Oct 20, 1926).

WHITE, R.J. Enlisted during World War I; private; wounded in 1917 (DA Jun 5, 1917).

WHITE, R.J. Timber merchant, Johnston Street, Wagga Wagga (at the rear of Edmondson's) in 1929.

WHITE, R.T. Manager, Wagga Wagga branch, Government Savings Bank; transferred to Wollongong in 1910 (WWA Apr 12, 1910).

WHITE, Rebecca Agnes Wife of William Alexander. Died in November 1941 at the age of seventy-two (DA Nov 28, 1941).

WHITE, Reginald John Crawford Son of W.A. Born at Kerang, Victoria. Raised in Deniliquin, New South Wales. Enlisted during World War I; 13th and 19th Battalions. Moved to Wagga Wagga on his return from the war. Sawmiller, bridge builder and heavy construction contractor; business later taken over by his sons. Resided at "Wakool", 206 Edward Street. Married Beatrice Ellis of Wagga Wagga. Died on April 18, 1946 at the age of fifty; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Apr 20, 1946; and WVMC). Children: Leslie Thomas (Wagga Wagga); David (A.I.F., Japan); Thomas (Windsor); Reginald (A.I.F.); James; Edward; Robert; Victor (Wagga Wagga); Hilda; Thelma; and Beatrice.

WHITE, Dr Violet Wife of Douglas A. Doctor, Wagga Wagga, from c.1946-56 (Morris ADB pp.142f).

WHITE, W.G. Member of the Fire Brigade. Member of the Wagga Wagga District Hospital Committee (Morris ADB p.267).

W

WHITE, William ("Doughboy") Butcher. Played the fiddle at the launching of new punt in 1859; lost his balance and was thrown violently against the side of the punt, breaking his fiddle, stepped from the punt into a small boat and fell overboard (WWE Aug 20, 1859). Charged with indecent exposure outside the Squatters Hotel in September 1859 and sentenced to three months hard labour at Goulburn Gaol (WWE Oct 1, 1859). Contributed two pounds, one shilling towards the construction of St Michael's Church, Wagga Wagga, by 1859.

WHITE, William Farmer; three acres at North Wagga Wagga in the 1890s; nine horses in 1891; one horse and two cows in 1895.

WHITE, William Died on May 30, 1957 at the age of ninety-three; buried Wesleyan Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WVMC).

WHITE, William Alexander House and bridge builder at Deniliquin, New South Wales, for twenty-five years and three years at Wagga Wagga. Member of Manchester Unity Independant Order of Oddfellows for twenty-five years. Lived in Edward Street, Wagga Wagga. Died in June 1924 at the age of sixty-four; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA June 24 & 25, 1924). Wife: Rebecca Agnes.

WHITE, William Peter Born in England in 1827. Emigrated to Australia at the age of eighteen. Searched for gold in Victoria, New South Wales and Queensland. Then moved to Lower Tarcutta (Bailliere) and managed old Squatters Arms Hotel. Married at Mundarlo c.1859. Died on January 15, 1914 at the age of eighty-five (DA Jan 16, 1914). Children: William (Yabtree); Thomas (Tarcutta); Edward (Tarcutta); John (Wagga Wagga); and Peter (Victoria).

WHITEBY, W. Blacksmith, Wagga Wagga (NSW Dir, 1903).

WHITEHAND, William Clerk, George Forsyth and Co, Wagga Wagga, in the early 1860s; held an account with the Australian Joint Stock Bank, Wagga Wagga, 1860-61 (Ledger). Publican, Royal Hotel, Wagga Wagga 1862-67 (WWE Apr 21, 1866); and later at Albury. Appointed Customs House and General Agent at Albury in 1872 (WWE Apr 13, 1872); and informed on George Wilson* in 1873 (WWE Jan 22, 1873; and WWA Oct 18, 1873). Fined for shooting a female goat and leaving it to die in May 1859 (Swan WW p.75). Signed the petition for a "proper" Post Office at Wagga Wagga in 1867 (PO).

WHITEHEAD, C. or E. Enlisted during World War I (DA May 15, 1916); killed in action; listed on Soldiers' Memorial, Wagga Wagga (DA Sept 18, 1922).

WHITEHEAD, Henry Superintendent of the Methodist Sunday School, Wagga Wagga (1866-73); and conducted the first Wesleyan Choir in Wagga Wagga (Wade p.74).

WHITEHEAD, J. His horse, "Sans Appel", ridden by R. Parkhurst, won the Wagga Gold Cup in 1915 (DA Apr 30, 1917).

WHITEHEAD, Lena Leased the Sportsmans Arms Hotel, Wagga Wagga, in 1893 (brother, Charles Clarke, the licensee); later both charged with deliberately lighting a fire at the hotel with the intent to defraud (WWA June 29, 1893).

WHITEHEAD, Nancy Daughter of G.H. of Berry Jerry. Married Herbert Lindsay Wilson*.

WHITEHEAD, Roy Ernest Died on February 14, 1961 at the age of sixty-nine; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WVMC).

WHITFORD Served with third New South Wales Mounted Rifles in South Africa during the Boer War; and spent thirteen weeks in

W

hospital with enteric fever; returned to Wagga Wagga in 1902 (WWA July 5, 1902).

WHITFORD, Alec Son of George and Margaret. Enlisted during World War I; and listed on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga (DA May 15, 1916).

WHITFORD, Daisy Daughter of George and Margaret. Teacher; transferred from Jamberoo on the south coast to Wagga Wagga Primary School in 1916 (DA Jan 29, 1916). Married J.H. Cameron* at St Andrew's Church, Wagga Wagga, on May 23, 1917 (DA June 4, 1917).

WHITFORD, George Baker, member of firm, Richardson and Whitford (with Frederick Goodman Richardson*), Fitzmaurice Street, Wagga Wagga, in 1919 and 1920s. Married Margaret Cameron*. Lived in Fitzmaurice Street, Wagga Wagga, in 1916.

WHITFORD, George Ewan Second son of George. Enlisted on July 27, 1915 during World War I; gunner-private, Australian Motor Transport Company; sent to Egypt and then France; shell shocked at Bullecourt; returned to Australia on April 5, 1919; listed on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga (DA Oct 25, 1915; May 15, 1916; and May 17, 1919). Seems to have married Eileen Clout (DA Apr 5, 1923). Lived at North Wagga Wagga in 1942.

WHITFORD, Margaret Wife of George. Died on December 15, 1942 at the age of eighty-six; buried Presbyterian Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Dec 16, 1942). Children: Alec; Daisy; George Ewan; Mrs F.G. Richardson; Mrs Andrew Richmond; and Mrs Clyde Cook.

WHITICKER, Elizabeth Daughter of Richard and Mary Ann. Born at "Jellingroo" on April 30, 1874. Died at Mundarlo on May 7, 1874.

WHITICKER, Esther Daughter of Richard and Mary Ann. Born on

June 31, 1869. Married Jame Derrick.

WHITICKER, Francis Daughter of Richard and Mary Ann. Born at Mundarlo near Wagga Wagga on January 18, 1883. Died on July 1, 1884.

WHITICKER, George Son of Richard and Mary Ann. Born at "Jellingroo" on October 9, 1866. Married (1) Emily Fuller* on April 17, 1889. Married (2) Eva Arantz on April 16, 1900. Died on February 2, 1922.

WHITICKER, Jane Daughter of Richard and Mary Ann. Born at Buckingbong on July 15, 1855. Married Irvine Crain* on January 17, 1881.

WHITICKER, John Son of Richard and Mary Ann. Born at "Jellingroo" on April 29, 1875. Married Ellen Kate Geoghan in 1899. Children: Frances Valentine; Kathleen; Alison ("Clare"); Kenneth; Aileen; and Ellen Clare ("Nell").

WHITICKER, Martha Daughter of Richard and Mary Ann. Born at "Yabtree" on July 12, 1861. Married George W. Dennis* on April 25, 1881.

WHITICKER, Mary Ann Wife of Richard nee Clark. Died on May 23, 1919.

WHITICKER, Mary Ann Daughter of Richard. Born at "Jellingroo" on October 26, 1863. Married James Dennis* on June 8, 1888.

WHITICKER, Priscilla First wife of William nee Clarke. Died in 1917.

WHITICKER, R. Enlisted during World War I (DA May 15, 1916).

WHITTACKER, Richard Son of George and Elizabeth nee Sugden. Born at Sutton Forest on November 4, 1834. Married Mary Ann Clark* at Berrima on March 16, 1854. Squatter, "Yabtree", Tarcutta, with Richard Frederick Horsley*

W

(Horsley and Whittaker), in the early 1860s (Horsley JWWDHS No.5, 1982 p.51). Held an account with the Australian Joint Stock Bank, Wagga Wagga, 1860-61 (Ledger). Later grazier, "Jellingroo", Tarcutta district (Bailliere). Died at "Jellingroo", Tumblong, on October 2, 1912. Children: Sarah Ann; Jane; Martha; Mary Ann; Rosanna; George; Esther; Richard Henry; Elizabeth; John; William; Sylvia; and Francis.

WHITICKER, Richard Henry Son of Richard and Mary Ann. Born on January 21, 1872. Married Amelia M. Fuller* on May 1, 1895. Seems to have died on August 6, 1908.

WHITICKER, Rosanna Daughter of Richard and Mary Ann. Born at Mundarlo on August 19, 1865. Died on January 5, 1866.

WHITICKER, Sarah Ann Daughter of Richard and Mary Ann. Born at Buckingbong on July 15, 1855. Married John Hardwick* on June 21, 1875.

WHITICKER, Susan Priscilla Wife of William nee Worldon. Died in Sydney in June 1942 (DA June 13, 1942).

WHITICKER, Sylvia Daughter of Richard and Mary Ann. Born at "Jellingroo" on July 23, 1880. Married Henry Diamond* on August 28, 1901.

WHITICKER, William Son of Richard and Mary Ann. Born on June 5, 1877. Grazier at "Jellingroo" station, Tumblong. Married (1) Priscilla J. Clarke on October 22, 1899. Married (2) Susan Priscilla Worldon? Died in April 1939 at the age of sixty-one (DA Apr 10, 1939). Children (1): three sons and five daughters. Children (2): Leo; and Joan.

WHITING, Ernest Parents lived at Mt Adrah. Enlisted on August 9, 1915 during World War I; private, 3rd Battalion; returned to Australia on January 10, 1919 (AWM Nominal Roll). Married Helen

Amelia Thompson* in November 1919 (DA Nov 17, 1919).

WHITING, Harry Hasson ("Tim") Employed in Hairdressing Salon, owned by Mark Mongan*, Wagga Wagga, for a number of years. Died on February 14, 1939 at the age of fifty-seven; buried Catholic Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Feb 15, 1939; and WWMC).

WHITING, Henry George Member of Manchester Unity Independant Order of Oddfellows. Enlisted on September 11, 1917 during World War I; private, 1st Pioneers; returned to Australia on September 25, 1919 (AWM Nominal Roll; and DA Nov 1, 1917).

WHITING, J.H. ("Bill") Employed by the Murrumbidgee Turf Club; beginning as a junior under J.F. DeGroot in 1927; later ranger at Racecourse. Served in the A.I.F. during World War II. Then ranger, Murrumbidgee Turf Club; and secretary from 1946. Died in February 1956 (DA Feb 21, 1956).

WHITLOCK Brothers Purchased Messrs Fitzgerald Brothers Hampden Butchery in January 1920 (DA Jan 24, 1920).

WHITLOCK, Amy Violet Daughter of C. and A. Married Allan George Fraser in October 1919 (DA Oct 20, 1919).

WHITLOCK, H. Enlisted during World War I; private; on final leave in 1915 (DA Oct 18, 1915; and May 15, 1916).

WHITLOCK, John Engineer; proprietor, Wagga Foundry, Kincaid Street, Wagga Wagga (WWA Apr 12, 1906); sold business to Albert Taylor* in 1907.

WHITLOCK, R.W. Enlisted during World War I; listed on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga.

WHITLOCK, Roderick Son of C. and A. Married Miss Beryl Flanagan, daughter of W.E. Died at Punchbowl in November 1947 at the

W

age of forty-eight, leaving two sons and four daughters (DA Dec 2, 1947). Brother of Harry (Wagga Wagga); Bert (Muswellbrook); Mrs Hamilton; and Amy Violet.

WHITESIDE, C. Enlisted during World War I (DA May 15, 1916).

WHITTLE, Elizabeth Wife of William. Native of Lemington, England. Came to Wagga Wagga in the 1870s. Lived in Peter Street in her latter years. Died in 1906 at the age of seventy-nine; buried Wesleyan Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWA Dec 4, 1906).

WHITTLE, William Blacksmith; arrived in Wagga Wagga at the end of 1863. Member of the Sons of Temperance in the 1870s; and one of the earliest pioneers of the Methodist Church at Wagga Wagga, attending the first Methodist service at Wagga Wagga on April 10, 1864. Died in February 1911 (WWA Mar 1, 1910).

WHITTY, J.C. Squatter at "Blowrang", Tumut River and Billabong Creek in the 1840s and 1850s; dispute over land with Thomas H. Bardwell* in 1849 (GG July 4, 1849).

WHYTE, F.H. Wagga Wagga Pastures Protection District Stock Inspector in 1925 (DA July 8, 1925).

WHYTE, Jean de Chantell Infant daughter of Peter James. Died at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital in October 1924; buried Catholic Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Oct 4, 1924).

WHYTE, Mary Daughter of Peter. Born at Jamberoo c.1863. Married James Turner* at Wagga Wagga and resided there for many years.

WHYTE, P.J. (Peter James?) Son of Mrs Whyte of the Cross Roads. Enlisted during World War I; private; served in France; wounded on September 29, 1917; listed on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga (DA July 5, 1917; and Nov 1917).

WHYTE, Peter Moved to Collingullie near Wagga Wagga in 1877. Children: Mary; John (Beckom); Peter (Cross Roads, Wagga Wagga); Patrick (West Wyalong); Joseph (Rockhampton); and Timothy (Temora).

WHYTE, Peter Son of Peter. Born at Burrawong in March 1871 and moved to Collingullie with parents in 1877 and lived there all his life. Keen judge of good thoroughbreds; owned and trained own horses, his chief success being a horse named "Opal". Married Mary Josephine Dobman, grandneice of James Gormly*. Died (pneumonia) at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital on November 15, 1929 at the age of fifty-eight; buried old Catholic Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Nov 18, 1929). Children: William; Norman; Victor; Oliver; Frank; and Burspie (all of Collingullie); Peter James (Henty); Mrs L. Mulloy; Mrs M. Mullins; and Miss Nano.

WHYTE, Peter James Son of Peter. Lived in Urana Road, Wagga Wagga, in 1924. Daughter: Jean de Chantell.

WHYTE, William Joseph Married Annie Maud Meyers* at Wagga Wagga on March 19, 1926. Died on June 8, 1971 at the age of seventy-one; buried Catholic Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC). Children: Joan Francis; Lola Mary; Peter John; Stanley James; Kathleen Ann; Terence William; Allan David; and Warren Geoffrey.

WICKHAM, Henry P ("Harry") Businessman, mercer; member of the firm, Wickham and Scribner, Men's Wear Specialists, School of Arts corner, Fitzmaurice Street, Wagga Wagga. Sold business to Anstice and Mackay in 1923 (DA Sept 26, 1923; and Robertson, 1914). Also conducted mercery businesses at Tamworth, Glen Innes and Wollongong, New South Wales. Associated with the Wagga Wagga Eisteddfod Society and secretary for many years. Married

W

Lilian Hawkes* at the Methodist Church, Wagga Wagga, in 1902 (WWA Nov 20, 1902).

WICKHAM, Lilian ("Lily") Wife of Harry nee Hawkes. Lived at Stanmore, Sydney, for many years; then Fox Street, Wagga Wagga; and then Strathfield, Sydney, from 1923. Died in Sydney in August 1929 at the age of fifty-four (DA Aug 7, 1929).

WIELAND, Anna Christina Younger daughter of George C. and Christiana. Married Martin Ruschen*.

WIELAND, Christian Stepson of John. Resided at Berry Jerry and then in the Coolamon district for fifty years. Died at Wagga Wagga in July 1939 at the age of sixty-one; buried at Coolamon (DA July 5, 1939). Brother of: George (Cowabbie); Frederick (June); and John (Sydney).

WIELAND, Christian Albert Peter ("Johnny") Son of George C. and Christiana. Died c.1963 at the age of ninety-four (DA Feb 22, 1986 p.15).

WIELAND, Christiana Wife of George nee Halbisich. Purchased the fifty-seven acre block on Albury Road adjoining that owned by her brother, John, on one side and by Winnell's on the other. Died on October 14, 1878 at the age of forty-one leaving a son and two young daughters (DA Feb 22, 1986 p.15; and WVMC).

WIELAND, Freidrick Herman Lived at North Wagga Wagga. Died tragically on June 30, 1913; buried Methodist Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA July 1, 2, & 3, 1913).

WIELAND, Frederick William Farmer, North Wagga Wagga; selected twenty acres, one rood (Portion 253) in 1866 (WWE Mar 17, 1866); held 125 acres, four horses and twenty-one cattle at North Wagga Wagga in 1895. Bachelor. Died on August 15, 1897 at the age of sixty-nine as a

result of injuries received when he fell from the tree he was pruning; his only known relatives being the two nephews who resided with him for many years; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWA Aug 17, 1897).

WIELAND, George C. Married Christiana Halbisich* in 1857. Farmer at Uranquinty for fifty-eight years. Died at his daughter's residence at Coolamon on August 3, 1916 at the age of eighty-eight; buried Anglican Portion, Coolamon Cemetery (DA Aug 4 & 15, 1916). Children: Matilda; Anna Christina; and Christian Albert Peter ("Johnny").

WIELAND, George Peter Born at Lake Albert, Wagga Wagga, c.1884. Farmer and grazier at Walleroobie. Died in April 1960 at the age of seventy-six (DA Apr 29, 1960).

WIELAND, Herman Farmer, Wagga Wagga district (NSW Dir, 1903).

WIELAND, Matilda Daughter of George C. and Christiana. Born c.1867. Married William Ruschen* in 1886.

WIELAND, Theresa Wife of John. Native of Camden. Moved to Lake Albert, Wagga Wagga, at the age of eleven. Died in May 1918 at the age of fifty-six; buried at Coolamon (DA May 24, 1918). Children: George (Harefield); John (Harefield); Frederick (Harefield); Michael (Wagga Wagga); Mrs George Leary (Coolamon); Ruby (Coolamon); and Mrs John Sherrington (Narrandera).

WIESENER, H. Enlisted during World War I; listed on the Soldiers' Memorial and the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga (DA Sept 18, 1922).

WIESNER, C. J. ("Joe") Son of Johann Gotlieb. Blacksmith; learnt the trade in South Australia; and was a blacksmith at Walla Walla, 1880-89. Then a

butcher from c.1892. Then took up sharefarming at "Brae Springs" in 1894 although retained his interest in the butchery. Purchased a farm near Wagga Wagga in 1905 (Walla Walla booklet).

WIESNER, Regina Daughter of William of Uranquinty. Married A.J. Deed of "Mimosa", Temora, at Uranquinty in October 1917 (DA Oct 20, 1917).

WIESNER, William Lived at "Stoneleigh", Wagga Wagga, for many years; and later moved to Albury. Died on December 27, 1926 at the age of seventy-three leaving ten daughters and one son (DA Feb 22, 1927).

WIESNER, William Clarence Son of William of Sandy Creek. Lived at Uranquinty. Attended Wagga Wagga High School. Enlisted on August 4, 1916 during World War I; private, 18th Battalion; listed as missing in 1917; and later as killed in action on May 3, 1917; memorial service held (AWM Nominal Roll; DA June 8, 1917; July 17, 1917; Aug 4, 1917; and Sept 4, 1918).

WIDGER, Charles Died at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital on April 17, 1905 at the age of sixty (WWDH Reg).

WIGG, John Gayford Born in Victoria. Married Edith Annie Donnelly in Wodonga. Moved to Albury; and then to Wagga Wagga in the 1930s. Butcher, opposite Capitol Theatre, Gurwood Street. President of the Wagga Wagga Master Butchers' Association. Lived at 94 Kincaid Street, Wagga Wagga. Died on November 2, 1943 at the age of seventy-one; buried Catholic Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Nov 3, 1943).

WILCOX, Mrs Milliner next to Maples, Fitzmaurice Street, Wagga Wagga, from 1922 (DA Aug 5, 1922).

WILD, A. Enlisted during World War I; listed on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga.

WILD, Alfred Norman Lived at Gilgandra, New South Wales. Married Olive Bertha Angel* on April 11, 1925 (DA Mar 17, 1925).

WILD, Ann Daughter of William. Died on May 4, 1869 at the age of twenty-two; buried Methodist Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WILD, Arthur Francis Son of Frederick Arthur and Christina. Born on January 24, 1914; and baptized on October 11, 1914 (Ang Reg).

WILD, Arthur George Son of John Joseph and Eva; born at Wagga Wagga. Married Vera Alice Beeson*. Seems to have married Lottie Pennock. Lived at "Arlington", Edward Street, Wagga Wagga. Employed by Paul Blameys' Co, Wagga Wagga, for thirteen years (DA Feb 5, 1924). Later moved to Sydney. Died on September 25, 1944 at the age of forty-eight; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Sept 27 & 28, 1944).

WILD, Aubrey Thomas Son of George Alfred. Died at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital on March 1, 1926 at the age of twenty-five; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Mar 2 & 3, 1926).

WILD, Constance May ("Connie") Daughter of George Alfred. Lived at Lake Albert, Wagga Wagga. Died at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital on September 16, 1926 at the age of thirty-four; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Sept 18 & 20, 1926; and WWMC).

WILD, Doris Mary Daughter of John and Sarah Jane. Born on April 25, 1904; and baptized on May 4, 1904 (Ang Reg).

WILD, Eliza Died on October 15, 1903 at the age of seventy-six; buried Methodist Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

W

WILD, Elizabeth Probably the wife of Stanley Morgan. Lived at "Tywong", Ladysmith, near Wagga Wagga. Died in September 1957 at the age of seventy-two (DA Sept 30, 1957).

WILD, Emma Wife of George. Died on January 15, 1910 at the age of seventy-eight; buried Methodist Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWA Jan 18, 1910).

WILD, Ernest Lived at Lake Albert, Wagga Wagga, in 1910. Wife: Elizabeth Jane. Son Lesley Ernest.

WILD, Eva Wife of John Joseph nee Cox. Lived at Lake Albert and moved into Wagga Wagga to live after the death of her husband; lived in Best Street, Wagga Wagga, during World War I. Died on October 30, 1942 at the age of seventy-six; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Oct 31, 1942). Sons: John Sidney; Arthur George; and Walter William. Sister of: W. F. Stone*.

WILD, Frank Born at Wagga Wagga. Hairdresser, Baylis Street, Wagga Wagga. Member of the South Wagga Bowling Club and of Manchester Unity Independent Order of Oddfellows. Lived at 64 Murray Street, Wagga Wagga. Died at the Wagga Wagga Base Hospital in April 1956 at the age of sixty; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Apr 6, 1956).

WILD, Frederick Influenza in 1919 (DA June 14, 1919).

WILD, Frederick Arthur Carpenter. Married Christina Middleton. Son: Arthur Francis.

WILD, George Native of Wolverhampton, Staffordshire, England. Emigrated to New South Wales in the early 1850s. Farmer, Wagga Wagga. Purchased Lot 2 Section 35, Wagga Wagga on February 28, 1856 (WWBB). Died at the residence of his son, John, on March 25, 1902 at the age of seventy-four leaving three sons,

three daughters, forty-two grandchildren and one great grandchild; buried Wesleyan Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWA Mar 27, 1902). Wife: Emma. Children: Sarah (Wagga Wagga); Mrs J. Monks (Gregadoo); Selina Ann (Lake Albert); John (Lake Albert); George (Cross Roads); William (formerly Wagga Wagga).

WILD, George Born in Wagga Wagga. Married Rose Cooper of Tarcutta. Grazier, "Avondale", Tarcutta. Died in April 1944 at the age of sixty-six (DA Apr 18, 1944). Children: William (Alfredtown); Stanley (Tarcutta); and Mrs R. Bennett (Bethungra).

WILD, George Alfred Son of George. Born in Johnson Street, Wagga Wagga, c.1857. Lived at Gundagai Road, Oura; and "Airlie", Lake Albert. Married a daughter of Morgan Power* (possibly named Eliza Jane). Oldest native of the municipality of Wagga Wagga in 1927 (DA Oct 18 & 19, 1927). Children: Aubrey Thomas; Stanly Morgan; George Arnold; Roy A.; Ralph; John Joseph; Hilda Maud; Rita Gertrude; Constance; Doris and Elsie (latter two daughters married Walker Taylor and R.E. Taylor).

WILD, George Arnold (or George Allen) Son of George Alfred. Enlisted in the Mayor's Unit on April 21, 1917 during World War I; private, 1st Machine Gun Battery; returned to Australia on May 15, 1919 and to Wagga Wagga on July 5, 1919 (AWM Nominal Roll; DA June 18, 1919; and DA July 12, 1919). Lived at Boree Creek in 1926. Lived at Tumbarumba in 1944.

WILD, Hilda Maud Daughter of George Alfred. Lived at Lake Albert, Wagga Wagga, in 1926. Died in December 1940 at the age of fifty-six (DA Dec 9, 1940).

WILD, Ina Daughter of William and Louisa ("Ruby"). Born in May 1890. Married Mr Stratford.

W

Celebrated her 100th birthday in May 1990 (DA May 26, 1990 p.11).

WILD, J. Farmer, Wagga Wagga district (NSW Dir, 1903).

WILD, J. Member of the Lake Albert Tug'of'war team which was defeated by the Irish team in 1892; weighed eleven stone, eight pound (DA Jan 10, 1987 p.27).

WILD, J.M. Cabman, Wagga Wagga; left in 1918 after twenty-five years in business (DA Feb 27, 1912; and Nov 1, 1918).

WILD, John Born in England. Anglican. Labourer, Wagga Wagga. Married. Died at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital on July 16, 1905 at the age of seventy-five (WWDH Reg).

WILD, John Lived at Mundarlo. Wife: Sarah Jane. Daughter: Doris May.

WILD, John Joseph Son of George Alfred and Eliza Jane. Born on May 21, 1907; and baptized on December 17, 1907 (Ang Reg). Lived at Lake Albert, Wagga Wagga, in 1926. Farmer, Wagga Wagga district (NSW Dir, 1903). Married Eva Cox*. Died on March 11, 1905 at the age of thirty-nine; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WILD, John Sidney ("Sidney") Son of John and Eva. Attended Wagga Wagga Primary School and Wagga Wagga High School. Member of the Half Holiday Tennis Club and Manchester Unity Independant Order of Oddfellows. Employed in joinery department of Messrs Charles Hardy* and Co, Baylis Street, Wagga Wagga. Enlisted on September 23, 1915 during World War I; trooper, machine gun section, 7th Light Horse (or 2nd Light Horse); involved in desert fighting for eighteen months including the battles at Romani and El Arish; then ill in 3rd Stationery Hospital at Tel-el-Keber in 1917; wounded in Palestine in 1918; influenza in 1919; returned to Australia on

March 16, 1919; listed on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga (AWM Nominal Roll; DA Sept 24, 1915; Mar 16, 1916; May 26, 1917; June 2, 1917; Nov 1, 1917; Aug 6, 1918; Sept 4, 1918; Oct 3, 1918; letter, DA Mar 22, 1919; Apr 18, 1919; and Apr 28, 1919). Secretary of the Wagga Wagga branch of the R.S.S.I. League in 1919 and then treasurer (DA Nov 25, 1919; and Jan 17, 1921). Solicitor; entered articles on his return from active service; worked in the office of J.C. Sheekey; passed final solicitors examination in 1925; and left to take over the management of Sheekey's new office at Henty (DA Mar 11, 1925; and May 9, 1925). Married Jean Low, daughter of William of Albury, at St David's Church, Albury, on January 11, 1922 (DA Feb 3, 1922). Lived in Henty in 1942/44.

WILD, Joseph Born at Gundagai, New South Wales. Member of Manchester Unity Independant Order of Oddfellows. Died in January 1947 at the age of seventy-one (DA Jan 24, 1947). Brother of Mrs E. Bailey (Wagga Wagga); Mrs C. Maguire (Wagga Wagga); and Mrs Beeche (Narrandera). Children: Alfred (Wagga Wagga); and Raymond Joseph (Tarcutta).

WILD, Lesley Ernest Son of Ernest and Elizabeth Jane. Born on December 27, 1909; and baptized on March 30, 1910 (Ang Reg).

WILD, Louisa (Ruby) Wife of William nee Lockett. Lived at "Airlie", Lake Albert, Wagga Wagga (later the site of the club house of the Wagga Wagga Country Club). Moved to Sydney in 1917. Died on July 11, 1944 at the age of eighty-two; buried Anglican Portion, Waverley Cemetery (DA July 28, 1944).

WILD, Mary Margaret Died on September 27, 1983 at the age of seventy-five; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

W

WILD, Olive Bertha Wife of Alfred Norman nee Angel. Died on April 21, 1975.

WILD, Ralph Son of George Alfred. Lived at Lake Albert, Wagga Wagga, in 1944. Prisoner of War in 1944.

WILD, Rita Gertrude Daughter of George Alfred and Eliza Jane. Born on March 22, 1904; and baptized on June 13, 1904 (Ang Reg). Died in April 1919 at the age of fifteen (DA May 1 & 2, 1919).

WILD, Roy Arnold Son of George Alfred. Enlisted on November 22, 1915 during World War I; member of the "Kangaroo" contingent; private, 55th Battalion; served in France; at Pozieres; wounded in 1917; gassed in 1918; returned to Australia on June 2, 1919; listed on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga (DA Sept 10, 1917; Apr 3, 1918; May 16, 1918; June 18, 1919). Lived at Boree Creek in 1926. Lived in Sydney in 1944. Died on April 27, 1968 at the age of seventy-three; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WILD, Sarah Daughter of George and Emma. Married Thomas Conrad Seckold*.

WILD, Selina Anne Daughter of George. Born at Wagga Wagga c.1854. Married (1) William Graham. Married (2) Christopher Isaac Annison*.

WILD, Stanley Morgan Son of George Alfred. Born at Lake Albert c.1879. Farmer, "Tywong", Kyeamba Road, Ladysmith. Married a daughter of James and Matilda Rose*. Died on June 16, 1944; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA June 17, 1944). Children: Stanley (A.I.F.); Ray (Mrs Sprouster); and Mrs Johnston.

WILD, Thomas Labourer, Wagga Wagga, in the early 1860s; held an account with the Australian

Joint Stock Bank, Wagga Wagga, 1860-61 (Ledger).

WILD, Thomas James Son of John. Born at "Jellingroo" near Gundagai. Married Miss May Brown, daughter of J. of Adelong. Died at Tarcutta in December 1926 at the age of fifty-four (DA Dec 13 & 14, 1926). Children: Allen; Charles; Vernon; Leslie; and Jean. Brother of: John; William; Joseph; George; and Mrs E. Bailey (Forsyth Street, Wagga Wagga).

WILD, Vera Alice Wife of Arthur G. nee Beeson. Died on July 4, 1926 at the age of twenty-seven; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA July 5, 1926).

WILD, Walter William Son of J. and Eva of Best Street, Wagga Wagga. Attended Wagga Wagga High School. Employed by Charles Hardy* and Co, Wagga Wagga. Enlisted in 1917 in Mayor Oates' Unit during World War I; trooper, 7th Light Horse Regiment; badly wounded in the leg near Jericho in July 1918; returned to Australia on January 15, 1919 and transferred to Randwick Military Hospital; and remained in hospital until 1922, the lower part of his leg being amputated in May 1921; listed on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga (AWM Nominal Roll; DA May 26, 1917; Sept 4, 1918; Feb 22, 1919; Apr 18, 1919; May 28, 1921; and Apr 8, 1922). Secretary of the R.S.S.I.L.A. in 1923 (DA Jan 13, 1923). Lived in Wagga Wagga in 1942/44.

WILD, William Native of Wolverhampton, England. Died on March 1, 1879 at the age of fifty-four; buried Methodist Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery.

WILD, William Son of George. Born in Johnston Street, Wagga Wagga, in 1859. Employed by D. Copland* and Co, Wagga Wagga, for twenty years. Then resigned c.1903 and moved to "Airlie", Lake Albert. Engaged in breeding poultry, sheep and cattle. Married Louisa (Ruby) Lockett*.

W

Died (pneumonia) at the Belmore Private Hospital, Wagga Wagga, on October 26, 1908, leaving a widow and four daughters, the youngest six years of age; buried Methodist Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWA Oct 27, 1908). Daughter: Ina.

WILDE, Ann Arrived in Sydney on the **Mountaineer** on September 7, 1832 as an assisted emigrant (List of Assisted Emigrants 1832-33 AONSW 4/4824). Married John Smith* of Kyemaba.

WILDMAN, George Publican, Farmers Home Hotel, in 1869; and Royal Hotel from September 1869 until 1870 (Burch; WWA Sept 15, 1869; Oct 30, 1869; Dec 11, 1869; and June 15, 1870); cordial manufacturer with William Seymour Eaton*; and brewer; established one brewery in Johnston Street and then purchased the Wagga Wagga Brewery in Newtown from Mathew Callaghan* in 1874 and thereby secured the whole of the local trade (Morris **The Brewing Industry in Wagga** p.6; Morris NWWDHS No.247 June/July 1987; WWA July 2, 1879; and WWA Feb 7, 1882). Alderman 1878-79. One of applicants for aid to provisional school at North Wagga Wagga on March 29, 1879 (Morris NWPS p.29). Member of the Wagga Wagga District Hospital Committee in 1879 (Morris ADB p.267). Died in December 1879 (WWA Dec 20, 1879); and his business was purchased by his former partner, William Seymour Eaton*.

WILES, Henry Methodist Minister at Wagga Wagga in the late 1860s. Subscribed one guinea towards the new school building in 1869.

WILEY, Evelyn Margaret ("Madame Wiley") Wife of Farley Lester. Ladies hairdresser; proprietress of Na-Groma Beauty Salon, Gurwood Street, Wagga Wagga, for fourteen years. Keen supporter of Wagga Wagga Base Hospital and of the Wagga Wagga Eisteddfod Society. Died in March 1939 at the age of forty-three; buried Catholic Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA

Mar 14, 1939). Daughters: Maureen; and Vesta Evelyn.

WILKINS, Emily Wife of John Henry ("Harry") formerly Gray nee Beattie. Children: Mrs Pyke (Coolamon); Mrs Oscar Gormly; and Mrs Summers (Bimerah).

WILKINS, John Henry ("Harry") Came to Wagga Wagga c.1866. Employed by David Copland* and Co from January 1880 until March 1909; for many years as the manager of the Ironmongery Department; resigned in 1909 to start his own agency business (WWA June 16, 1908; Dec 3, 1908; Mar 20, 1909; and Mar 23, 1909). Member of many committees. Member of the Wagga Wagga District Hospital Committee 1899-1918; vice president for many years; president, 1914-18 (Morris ADB pp.42-47, 210, 211 and 267). President of the School of Arts Society. Leader of the Sons of Temperance movement for many years. Past District Grand Master of Manchester Unity. Mainstay of the Church of Christ in Wagga Wagga. During World War I subscribed to the Australia Day Fund for the return of the wounded. Member of the finance sub-committee of the Reinforcement Referendum Committee (which supported conscription) in 1917. Keen sportsman. Excellent cricketer in his early years, noted for his "free hitting"; represented the Wagga Wagga District 22 against the English XI in 1885; and secretary of the Wagga Wagga Cricket Association in the 1890s. Also a president of the Half Holiday Tennis Club; vice president of the Wagga Wagga Football Association; and in his later years prominent on the bowling green. Favoured the construction of a town baths for Wagga Wagga (WWA Nov 16, 1897). Married (1) Fleming. Married (2) Mrs Emily Gray nee Beattie*. Left Wagga Wagga in 1918 to live in Sydney (DA Sept 24, 1919). Died on September 9, 1920 (DA Sept 11, 1920). Daughter: Hope.

W

WILKINSON Resided at Marrah Lodge, North Wagga Wagga. Member of the committee formed to establish a public school at North Wagga Wagga in 1871 (WWA Nov 8, 1871); and conducted Sunday School at the schoolhouse at North Wagga Wagga in the early 1870s (WWE July 26, 1873). Member of the finance committee of St John's Church, Wagga Wagga. Initiated a meeting to form the Agricultural and Horticultural Society which was established on September 14, 1871 (DA Oct 10, 1938). Died in June 1877 at the age of seventy-three (WWA June 23, 1877).

WILKINSON, Ann Marie Died at North Wagga Wagga on September 13, 1866 at the age of seventeen years and eight months (WWE Sept 22, 1866).

WILKINSON, C.S. Government geologist. Closely connected with St John's Church while residing in Wagga Wagga. Died in August 1891 (WWA Aug 29, 1891).

WILKINSON, Charles John Son of J. Managing law clerk for his father. Married Ethel Isobel Cox* c.1917. Died in Albury, New South Wales, in January 1927 at the age of forty-four (DA Jan 17, 1927).

WILKINSON, Elizabeth Georgina Died on November 28, 1977 at the age of ninety-eight; buried at Humula, New South Wales.

WILKINSON, Ethel Isobel Wife of Charles John nee Cox. Lived in Albury, New South Wales. Died at Welwyn Private Hospital, Wagga Wagga, in January 1928 at the age of forty-five (DA Jan 28, 1928).

WILKINSON, H. Enlisted during World War I; apparently killed in action; listed on Soldiers' Memorial, Wagga Wagga (DA Sept 18, 1922).

WILKINSON, Ida Beatrice Daughter of T.H. Married Austin M. Donnelly* at St Joseph's Church, East Maitland, in 1908 (WWA Apr 30, 1908).

WILKINSON, Robert Bliss Emigrated from England to Port Phillip during the goldrushes in 1852 with James Smith Lavender* who later married his sister. Pastoralist; with James Smith Lavender, purchased several pastoral holdings in the Riverina including the "Marrah" and "Temora" stations in the Wagga Wagga district in 1863. Stock and station agent; entered into a partnership with George Forsyth* by April 1869 (George Forsyth and Co); then took his brother-in-law, James Smith Lavender, into the partnership; Wilkinson, Hann and Company by 1871; Wilkinson, Hann, Minchin and Co by 1873; Wilkinson, Minchin and Lavender by 1878; Wilkinson, Graves, Minchin and Lavender by 1879; Wilkinson, Graves and Lavender by 1881; and Wilkinson and Lavender by 1885. Also opened branches at Hay and Sydney managing each in turn. Assumed sole control of the business on the death of Lavender, supervising its formation into a company. Member of the Wagga Wagga Hospital Committee 1869-70 (Morris ADB p.267); the railway extension committee; and the finance committee, St John's Anglican Church, Wagga Wagga (WWA Mar 31, 1869). Donated provisions to those stranded at the mill at North Wagga Wagga during the flood of 1870 (WWA May 4, 1870). Entered politics in 1880; returned as the member for Balranald in the Legislative Assembly in 1880 and held this seat for fourteen years. Trustee of Graziers' Association for some years; and a member of the Australian Sheep Breeders' Association. Moved to Sydney in 1880; and retired in 1927. Died at Strathfield in April 1928 at the age of ninety-one (DA Apr 30, 1928). Children: two married daughters; and one son, J.C. (probably John Charles).

WILKINSON, T.H. Episcopalian Minister; appointed to live at Wagga Wagga and preach at Albury, Gundagai, Tumut and Wagga Wagga,

in 1851 (SMH Mar 1, 1851; and GH June 4, 1851).

WILKINSON, T.H. Son of Thomas. Police Magistrate at Mudgee and at Wagga Wagga from 1903 (WWA Jan 6, 1903). Member of the Wagga Wagga District Hospital Committee 1903-07 (Morris ADB p.267). President of the Wagga Golf Club 1903-06. Chaired a meeting held in 1905 to re-form the Wagga Swimming Club; and chaired the meeting held to agitate for baths at Wagga Wagga in September 1906. Left Wagga Wagga in 1907 to take up the duties of Police Magistrate at East Maitland (WWA Aug 15, 1907); lived at "Ruperra", East Maitland; promoted to the position of stipendiary magistrate at Newcastle in 1909 (WWA June 3, 1909). Died before 1937.

WILKINSON, Mrs T.H. Died on January 14, 1937 (DA Jan 30, 1937). Children: Ida Beatrice (Chatswood); Mrs F. Rand (Roseville); Miss K. (Chatswood); Miss M. (Chatswood); Gordon (Batlow); Jack (Tumut); Tom (Bellingen); and Clive (Sydney).

WILKINSON, Thomas Born in Liverpool, New South Wales, in 1824. Pastoralist, Yallowin, on west bank of the Tumut River, twenty miles south of Tumut, from 1840 (Thomas Wilkinson "A Record of Olden Days", JWWDHS No.3, 1970 pp.3-13). Died in July 1904 at the age of eighty-seven (WWA July 7 & 12, 1904). Children: eight sons including T.H.; and two daughters. Yallowin Hut, the two roomed slab hut with shingle roof at the Wagga Wagga Historical Society Museum, came from the property, "Hillview", part of the original "Yallowin"; first erected in 1880; and given by the owners to the Society whose members dismantled it in 1967 and brought it to Wagga Wagga.

WILKINSON, Vic Employed by the Department of Lands for forty-two years; began as a cadet in 1948; district surveyor at Wagga Wagga from 1969; appointed Regional

Director in 1986; retired in 1990 (DA July 13, 1990 p.5).

WILKSCH, Herman Oscar Musical agency business at Wagga Wagga in 1913; appeared in court on October 1, 1913 (DA Oct 2, 1913).

WILLANS, Eileen Left Wagga Wagga in 1909 to marry Simpson of "Nowranie" station, Urana (WWA June 26, 1909).

WILLANS, Frederica E.M. Wife of William (nee Minchin?). Died on February 4, 1876; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery.

WILLANS, Ivy (or Amy) Elizabeth Wife of Oby Andy. Member of the first Ladies' Advisory Committee of the Wagga Wagga District Hospital (DA Mar 6, 1912).

WILLANS, John Fleming Only son of William; born c.1856. Solicitor; served articles with his father at Wagga Wagga and admitted as a solicitor in June 1880; then set up in practice at Narrandera. Married Eleanor Blunt, daughter of a railway contractor (Gammage p.131). Alderman, Narrandera Council for many years; and mayor for a while. Secretary of the Narrandera Turf Club and the Pastoral Association. Died in May 1904.

WILLANS, Mrs John Fleming (Eleanor?) Died in July 1902 (WWA July 8, 1902).

WILLANS, Lawrence Oby Son of O.B. Entered Wagga Wagga branch of Bank of Australasia under P.H. Bradhurst*; promoted to head office in Sydney after five years and then to Bellingen. Enthusiastic tennis player. Enlisted on November 20, 1915 during World War I; gunner, corporal, 10th Field Artillery Brigade; killed in action in France on June 14, 1917 (DA July 9, 1917).

WILLANS, Lorna Daughter of Oby Andy and Ivy Elizabeth. Born on

W

February 7, 1900; and baptized on March 21, 1900 (Ang Reg).

WILLANS, Oby Andy Crown Land Agent, Wagga Wagga, in the late 1890s; clerk in charge of Lands Office, Wagga Wagga (NSW Dir, 1903; and WWA Aug 4, 1903). Keen tennis player; represented Wagga Wagga against Cootamundra in 1898 (WWA Oct 1, 1898); against Junee in 1904; and at Country Week in Sydney in the early 1900s; Secretary of the Wagga Wagga Lawn Tennis Club 1902-08 and vice president for many years. Member of the School of Arts Society. Vice president of the Choral Society (DA Dec 6, 1911). Member of the Wagga Wagga District Hospital Committee 1903-12 (Morris ADB p.267). Left Wagga Wagga in 1912 to take up duties at the Lands Office at Tumut (DA July 1, 1912). Wife: Ivy (or Amy?) Elizabeth. Children: Lorna; and Richard Andrew.

WILLANS, Richard Andrew Son of Oby Andy and Ivy Elizabeth. Born on January 13, 1909; and baptized on February 15, 1909 (Ang Reg).

WILLANS, William Son of William, an attorney at law. Born at Dublin, Ireland, on April 24, 1824. Legal training in Ireland. Married Fredericka Elizabeth Molesworth, half sister of Stapleton Minchin*, in 1856. Emigrated to New South Wales with wife and infant son in 1858. Solicitor; first appeared in Wagga Wagga court on December 14, 1860; then Wagga Wagga's first resident solicitor from 1862; in partnership with Louis A. Windeyer* (Willans and Windeyer) from 1869 until 1773; later joined by son, John Fleming (Willans and Son, Wagga Wagga and Narrandera). Excitable and troublesome; suspended from practicing before a Wagga Wagga Bench for six months in 1869 "for language used in open court reflecting upon the character of the bench" (WWE Oct 27, 1869; WWA Oct 27 & 30, 1869; Nov 20, 1859; and Dec 11 & 15, 1869). Brought charges against the magistrates

of the district in 1870 (WWA Nov 30, 1870). Refused to pay toll when crossing the Company Bridge one Sunday in 1870, claiming he was going to church whereas he was actually returning from "Wantabadgery" station. One of the founders of the Free Punt Association (as a protest against the toll) in 1871 (DA Oct 3, 1968). Subscribed ten shillings for the relief of Mrs John Holloway* in 1869 (WWA Apr 21, 1869). Tried to horsewhip the editor of the **Wagga Wagga Advertiser**, Harold Stephen, for referring to him as "Mr Willans, Solicitor and Gentleman, by Act of Parliament" (Swan in DA Oct 3, 1968; and Swan WW p.129). Built home, "Hillside", on eighty acres suburban farm land, in the 1860s; later held by the Copland family (later Willans Hill). Account with the Australian Joint Stock Bank, Wagga Wagga, 1860-61 (Ledger). Member of the railway extension committee; and of the finance committee, St John's Anglican Church (WWA Mar 31, 1869). Member of the Wagga Wagga Hospital Committee 1865-66 (Morris ADB p.267). Moved to Tumbarumba for health reasons in 1886 and the partnership with his son was dissolved, his son then practicing on his own account at Narrandera. Devoted a lot of energy and spare time to Tumbarumba Show. Died at Tumbarumba on May 21, 1900 at the age of seventy-six (WWA May 24, 1900). Willans Hill named after him.

WILLIAMS and Curran Saddlery, Fitzmaurice Street, Wagga Wagga, from c.1895.

WILLIAMS, Morton and Tailors, Gurwood Street, Wagga Wagga, in 1897.

WILLIAMS, Adeline Margaret Daughter of W. of Malebo. Born on March 13, 1871. Married Andrew Patrick Lysaught* at Wagga Wagga on June 10, 1891.

W

WILLIAMS, Albert Harold Died in February 1958 at the age of seventy-one (DA Feb 26, 1958).

WILLIAMS, Alf Francis Son of Walter Hascott and Florence Elizabeth. Born on April 27, 1903; and baptized on August 19, 1903 (Ang Reg).

WILLIAMS, Ann Died on June 24, 1918 at the age of thirty-three; buried Presbyterian Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WILLIAMS, Annie Nurse at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital in 1913 (DA Jan 9, 1913).

WILLIAMS, Arthur George Mark Enlisted on August 17, 1915 during World War I; private, 10th Battalion; returned to Australia on February 15, 1917 (AWM Nominal Roll). Died in Sydney in 1917 (DA Dec 5, 1917).

WILLIAMS, Arthur Gilby ("Art") Third son of Henry Johnston (Williams). Apprentice, **Daily Advertiser**; printer in 1894. Later had hairdressing saloon and tobacconist shop, Australian Hotel building, Fitzmaurice Street, Wagga Wagga, in the 1890s and early 1900s (WWA and NSW Dir, 1903); when these premises were being remodelled, moved to Gurwood Street. Moved to Goulburn in 1916. Married Janie Hills of Wagga Wagga. Athletic; played football for the Federal Football Club; and engaged in footracing contests. Died in Sydney in December 1942 (DA Dec 16, 1942). Children: Thelma; Belle; Doreen; and Harry.

WILLIAMS, Beatrice Florence Wife of G.J. Died at 25 Peter Street, Wagga Wagga, on December 12, 1927; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Dec 13 & 14, 1927).

WILLIAMS, Bertram James ("Boof") Born at Echuca, Victoria. Moved to Wagga Wagga in 1908. Contract chaff cutter. Member of Manchester Unity Independant Order of Oddfellows. Enlisted on

March 3, 1917 during World War I; gunner; 10th Field Artillery Brigade; 110th Howitzer Battalion; returned to Australia on June 19, 1919 (AWM Nominal Roll; DA May 15, 1916; Nov 1, 1917; Nov 8, 1918; and July 29, 1919); wife lived in Docker Street, Wagga Wagga, during the war. Contractor. Then joined staff of the Wagga Wagga City Council till he retired c.1948. Died at the Wagga Wagga Base Hospital on February 11, 1959 at the age of seventy-eight, leaving a wife and daughter; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Feb 12, 1959; and WWMC). Wife: Jessie. Daughter: Joan (Mrs Bernie Scollard).

WILLIAMS, Doreen Muriel Daughter of Walter Hascott and Florence Elizabeth. Born on November 24, 1911; and baptized on July 7, 1912 (Ang Reg).

WILLIAMS, Miss E.H. Storekeeper; millinery and costume specialist, Baylis Street, Wagga Wagga 1917-1920s.

WILLIAMS, Edgar Harriden Son of Godfrey and Mary Ann. Born on June 14, 1902; and baptized on September 5, 1903 (Ang Reg).

WILLIAMS, Elizabeth Wife of Henry nee Jenkins. Died on August 17, 1865.

WILLIAMS, Ellen Resident of Wall Street, North Wagga Wagga, for many years. Died on August 28, 1921 at the age of fifty-eight; buried Catholic Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Aug 29 & 31, 1921). Sons: William; and Arthur. Brother: C. Strangman.

WILLIAMS, Ernest Aply Enlisted during World War I; lieutenant, 5th Battalion; returned to Australia on May 1, 1919 and came to Wagga Wagga on June 24, 1919 to visit his sisters (AWM Nominal Roll; DA Nov 19, 1917; and DA June 25, 1919). Brother of: Ruby; Frank; Ted; and Mrs J.L. Bush.

W

WILLIAMS, Ernest Phineas Son of Henry Johnston and Victoria Bertha. Born at Wagga Wagga c.1865. Employed on the staff of the **Wagga Wagga Advertiser** for many years; learned trade as printer and became highly skilled. Moved to Melbourne, Victoria, in the late 1890s and worked at the Melbourne **Age**. Prominent footballer, Wagga Wagga; one of the leading players of the Mechanics' Club and later one of the foundation members of the Federal Club. Died in Melbourne on May 4, 1923 at the age of fifty-eight (DA May 7, 1923). Children: Vigar; Ernest; and Victoria.

WILLIAMS, Eugene Grace Child of John Johnson and Mary Louisa. Born on August 5, 1905; and baptized on October 10, 1905 (Ang Reg).

WILLIAMS, Fanny Wife of Alfred Edward of New Zealand. Lived in Wagga Wagga for many years after the death of her husband. Died at the residence of her son-in-law, P. O'Donnell, East Street, North Wagga Wagga, on June 30, 1923 at the age of seventy-three; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA July 2, 1923). Children: Mrs P. O'Donnell; and Mrs C. Kennedy.

WILLIAMS, Fanny Iris Daughter of Walter and Florence Elizabeth. Born on June 29, 1913; and baptized on September 15, 1913 (Ang Reg).

WILLIAMS, Florence Cottage, William Street, North Wagga Wagga, next to St Mary's Church of England, was destroyed by fire in 1920 (DA June 4, 1920).

WILLIAMS, Florence Elizabeth Wife of Walter Hascott.

WILLIAMS, Frank Enlisted during World War I; private; died in action, leaving a widow and two young children (DA Nov 19, 1917). Brother of: Ernest; Ted; Ruby; and Mrs J.L. Bush.

WILLIAMS, Frank William Died in 1960 at the age of seventy-nine; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WILLIAMS, Frederick Charles Labourer. Lived at Ladysmith near Wagga Wagga 1908-09. Wife: Louisa. Children: Veronica Pearl; Gertrude Alice; Gladys Matilda; Stanley Charles; and Sydney Thomas.

WILLIAMS, Mrs G. Daughter of J.W. and Emma Harriden*. Lived in Kincaid Street, Wagga Wagga.

WILLIAMS, G.L. Anglican minister; made a deacon in 1912 at St George's Church, Beckenham, England; and ordained to priesthood by Bishop Barlow at St Saviour's Catholic Church, Goulburn, in 1913. Curate at St John's Church, Wagga Wagga from 1913; appointed to take charge of the South Wagga Church and district to south of town in 1914 (DA Nov 10, 1913; and Mar 10, 1914); transferred to Adelong on December 3, 1914 (DA Nov 26, 1914; and Dec 3, 1914).

WILLIAMS, George Born at Daylesford. Single. Methodist. Hairdresser, Wagga Wagga. Died at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital on November 25, 1909 at the age of forty-seven (WWDH Reg).

WILLIAMS, George Frederick Enlisted shortly after the outbreak of World War I on December 29, 1914; served throughout the Gallipoli campaign; private; later quarter master sergeant, 21st Battalion; killed in action in France on August 23, 1916 (DA Sept 22, 1916; and WWE Sept 23, 1916). Brother of: Misses E.H. and R.

WILLIAMS, George Henry Married Annie Kisby. Died in May 1946 (DA May 28, 1946).

WILLIAMS, George William Died on February 15, 1964; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

W

WILLIAMS, Gertrude Alice
Daughter of Frederick Charles and Alice. Born on May 24, 1909 (Ang Reg).

WILLIAMS, Gladys Matilda
Daughter of Frederick Charles and Alice. Born on October 8, 1910; and baptized on December 2, 1910 (Ang Reg).

WILLIAMS, Godfrey Edward ("Dodd")
Son of Henry Johnston and Victoria Bertha. Painting contractor. One of the leading footballers at Wagga Wagga in the late 1890s; member of the Federal Football Club; played football against Junee and Albury; vice president of the Federal Football Club; and secretary-treasurer of the Federal Cricket Club. Married Mary Ann Lucy ("Lucy") Harriden*. Died on February 19, 1918 at the age of forty-eight, leaving a widow and three sons (DA Feb 20 & 21, 1918).

WILLIAMS, H.C. Son of A. Attended Wagga Wagga Primary School and Wagga Wagga High School. Enlisted during World War I; sergeant; returned in 1919; listed on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga (DA Sept 4, 1918; and Aug 1919).

WILLIAMS, H.E. Acting Postmaster at Wagga Wagga 1912-13; appointed officer in charge of the Armidale Office in 1913 (DA Oct 4, 1913). Son: Horace V.

WILLIAMS, Henry Born c.1803. Married Elizabeth Jenkins* at Berrima, New South Wales, in 1833. Superintendant at "Tooyoo" for John Jenkins* in 1843 (AONSW Reel 2748 X811). Children: John Henry; Henry; Eliza; Francis; Thomas; George; James; Mary Anne; Ridley; Charlotte; Robert; and Rebecca.

WILLIAMS, Henry Publican; licensee Junee Hotel 1865-66; Prince of Wales, Wagga Wagga 1868-71 (Burch); Black Swan Hotel 1871-72 (WWA Sept 6, 1871; and Nov 8, 1871). Subscribed ten shillings for the relief of Mrs

John Holloway* in 1869 (WWA Apr 21, 1869). Member of committee formed to establish a school at North Wagga Wagga in 1879-80.

WILLIAMS, Henry James Born in London, England, in 1840 and came to Sydney c.1864. Chemist; associated for a few years with the well known firm of Sydney Chemists, A.J. Watts and Co; and then, in 1870, accepted the position of dispensing assistant to Doctors Morgan and Robinson in Gurwood Street, Wagga Wagga. Purchased the chemist business formerly conducted by H.C. Rose* (the oldest established pharmacy in Wagga Wagga) in November 1874 (WWA Nov 21, 1874) and continued until 1915 when his son, Leslie Bridgewater, took over (H.J. Williams and Son); premises remodelled in 1928 (DA July 10, 1928). Active adherent of St John's Church of England, Wagga Wagga. Served on the jury in 1876. Member of the Wagga Wagga Hospital Committee in 1876 (Morris ADB p.267). Died on November 5, 1924 at the age of eighty-four (DA Nov 7, 1924). Children: Leslie Bridgewater; and Mrs S.H. Storey (Bega).

WILLIAMS, Henry Johnston ("Harry") Married Victoria Bertha Hann*. Died on February 29, 1892 at the age of fifty-four; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WVMC).

WILLIAMS, Henry Johnston ("Harry") Son of Godfrey Edward ("Dodd") and Mary Ann Lucy. Born on May 10, 1900; and baptized on May 25, 1901 (Ang Reg).

WILLIAMS, Henry Vigar ("Harry" or "Vigar") Only son of Henry Vigar Hann. Educated at the Christian Brothers High School, Wagga Wagga. Employed by W.R. Eyles and later Coplands and Co, Wagga Wagga. Then moved to Sydney and was employed at McDowels. Married Beatrice Mary Herrick* at St Charles Church, Ryde, Sydney, on March 31, 1923 (DA Apr 28, 1923). Tragic death in Sydney (fell from

W

an electric train) in 1946 (DA May 3, 1946).

WILLIAMS, Henry Vigar Hann ("Harry") Son of Henry Johnston ("Harry") and Victoria Bertha. Tailor, employed by Hugh Oates* for thirty-five years. Lived at 79 Beckwith Street, Wagga Wagga. Member of Manchester Unity Independant Order of Oddfellows. Died in July 1944 at the age of eighty-one (DA July 17, 1944). Children: Harry Vigar (Sydney); and Mrs J. McAuliffe (Melbourne).

WILLIAMS, Horace Vivien Son of H.E. Enlisted on February 23, 1915 during World War I; private, 19th Battalion; wounded in France in 1917; returned to Australia on July 22, 1917 (AWM Nominal Roll; and DA May 12, 1917).

WILLIAMS, Irene Alice Died on August 12, 1946; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WILLIAMS, J. Publican, Prince of Wales Hotel, Wagga Wagga, in 1912.

WILLIAMS, J. Grandson of Henry Johnston (Williams). Employed on the staff of the **Wagga Wagga Advertiser**, at first with clerical and sporting side of activities and by 1928 conducting the turf columns (DA Oct 10, 1928).

WILLIAMS, James Drowned after being washed off the Company Bridge, Wagga Wagga, during a flood in 1872 (WWA July 13, 1872).

WILLIAMS, James Bricklayer by trade. Came to Wagga Wagga in 1868. Builder and contractor at Wagga Wagga; member of the firm, Williams and Bruce, with William Duncan Bruce* and George Bruce*; completed new brick residence for Uranquinty School 1899-1900; additions to the School of Arts in 1902, Pennycook's house, Johnston Street, Hawkins house, Trail Street and Robertson's house, Kincaid Street; court

house in 1904; bankrupt in 1906 (WWA Feb 27, 1906). Member of the Salvation Army (Wagga Wagga branch) for twenty-eight years; sergeant-major of the corps for seventeen years. Died at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital on June 29, 1913 at the age of sixty-nine (DA July 1, 1913). Children: James (Mosman); Sophia (Wagga Wagga); and Joyce (New Zealand).

WILLIAMS, Jessie Wife of Bertram James. Died on November 21, 1968; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WILLIAMS, John Born in England. Labourer, Junee. Anglican. Single. Died at the Wagga Wagga Hospital on December 17, 1881 at the age of fifty-six (WWDH Reg).

WILLIAMS, John A. Enlisted during World War I; private, 24th Battalion; listed on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga. Accidentally killed on September 16, 1934 at the age of forty-five; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery; headstone established by "fond mother and sister, Bodmin, Cornwell, England" (WWMC).

WILLIAMS, Joseph Frank Labourer, Tumbarumba. Widower. Anglican. Died at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital on June 8, 1903 (WWDH Reg).

WILLIAMS, Miss L. Telephone assistant with the Wagga Wagga Post Office from 1914; left to get married in 1918 (DA July 2, 1918).

WILLIAMS, Leslie Bridgewater Son of Henry James. Born at Wagga Wagga and lived there all his life. Chemist; took over his father's business in Fitzmaurice Street in 1915. Married Gertrude McClean in Sydney on September 30, 1914 (DA Oct 28, 1914). Died on September 11, 1947 (DA Sept 12, 1947). Daughters: Dulcie (Mrs A. Bernie); and Doreen.

W

WILLIAMS, Mary Died in 1966 at the age of eighty-one; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WILLIAMS, Mary Ann Lucy ("Lucy") Wife of Godfrey Edward ("Dodd") nee Harriden. Died on January 17, 1943 at the age of seventy-three; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Jan 18, 1943). Children: Harry Johnston ("Jack", Wagga Wagga); Godfrey Roy (Cootamundra); and Edgar Harriden ("Ted", Cootamundra).

WILLIAMS, R. Enlisted during World War I; private, A Company, 3rd Battalion, in 1915 (DA June 10, 1915).

WILLIAMS, R.S. Drover. Lived in Crampton Street, Wagga Wagga, in 1917. Son: Richard.

WILLIAMS, Richard Cook. Resided at Wall Street, North Wagga Wagga, for many years. Drowned in the lagoon at Wagga Wagga at the age of fifty-seven, after falling in while lighting his pipe; found with pipe still clutched in his hand; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA May 15 & 16, 1918).

WILLIAMS, Richard ("Dickie") Son of R.S. Drowned in the Murrumbidgee River at the age of eight, after wandering into dangerous area during a swimming lesson in December 1917 (DA Dec 4, 1917).

WILLIAMS, Richard H. Came to New South Wales from Yorkshire c.1910. Joined the **Wagga Wagga Advertiser**. Moved to Broken Hill in 1913 (DA Mar 27, 1913); but returned to Wagga Wagga in 1918 and again joined the literary staff of the **Advertiser** (DA Oct 10, 1928).

WILLIAMS, Richard Stanley Licensee, Star Hotel, Wagga Wagga, in 1895 (Burch).

WILLIAMS, Robert Arrived in New South Wales in 1883. Licensee, Junction Hotel, Hillas Creek,

above Lower Tarcutta, 1885-94 (Burch). Moved into Wagga Wagga c.1896 after purchasing a property on the Tarcutta Road, about one and a half miles from Wagga Wagga. Left for Sydney c.1907. Died in Sydney on September 28, 1913, leaving a widow but no family (DA Oct 6, 1913).

WILLIAMS, Sarah Jane Wife of Henry James. Native of Great Birkhamstead, Yorkshire, England. Resided in Fitzmaurice Street, Wagga Wagga. Died on April 15, 1918 at the age of seventy-one; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Apr 16, 1918).

WILLIAMS, Sophia Daughter of James. Married Peter Glennie of Rutherglen at the Salvation Army Barracks in October 1899 (WWA Oct 5, 1899).

WILLIAMS, Stanley Charles Son of Frederick Charles and Louisa. Born on June 17, 1912; and baptized on December 19, 1912 (Ang Reg).

WILLIAMS, Stella Lillie Olive Daughter of Edward John and Emma Susannah. Born on February 8, 1904; and baptized on March 10, 1904 (Ang Reg).

WILLIAMS, Sydney Thomas Son of Frederick Charles and Louisa. Born on November 4, 1914; and baptized on December 23, 1914 (Ang Reg).

WILLIAMS, Terence Lived in Wagga Wagga in the late 1850s. Contributed one pound towards St Michael's Church, Wagga Wagga, by 1859.

WILLIAMS, Thelma Daughter of Arthur Gilby and Jane. Born on June 11, 1894; and baptized on September 5, 1894 (Ang Reg).

WILLIAMS, Thomas ("Tom") Served in the New South Wales Mounted Infantry during the Boer War 1899-1900; shot through the back of the neck; and mentioned in despatches for conspicuous

bravery (WWA May 31, 1900; and Morris NWWDHS No.244 Dec 1986/Jan 1987).

WILLIAMS, Thomas ("Tom") Tailor shop, corner of Gurwood and Fitzmaurice Streets, Wagga Wagga, in 1906 (Illustrated, SR Apr 8, 1988 p.24).

WILLIAMS, Veronica Pearl Daughter of Frederick Charles and Louisa. Born on September 13, 1907; and baptized on January 10, 1908 (Ang Reg).

WILLIAMS, Vera Marjory Wife of W. nee Dodwell. Died on December 10, 1943 at the age of thirty-five; buried Presbyterian Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Dec 11, 1943). Children: Judith; Rex; and Robert.

WILLIAMS, Victoria Bertha Wife of Harry Johnston. Resided Kincaid Street, Wagga Wagga. Died on June 3, 1919 at the age of seventy-eight; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA June 4 & 5, 1919). Children: Ernest Phineas; Godfrey Edward; Harry Vigar (Wagga Wagga); Arthur G. (Goulburn); Ferdinand B. (Lake Bogga, Victoria); William A. (Ballan, Victoria); C. Albert (Victoria); Frank A. (Wagga Wagga); Mrs S.H. Melvin (Parramatta); Mrs G. Bridle (Sydney); and Violet (Wagga Wagga).

WILLIAMS, Violet Daughter of Henry Johnston and Victoria Bertha. Member of St John's Church of England Choir; and of the Half Holiday Tennis Club. Married Percy A. Mills of Goulburn at St John's Church, Wagga Wagga, in September 1911 (DA Sept 20, 1911).

WILLIAMS, Mrs W. Died at the All Nations Hotel, Wagga Wagga, in 1906, at the age of seventy (WWA Dec 27, 1906).

WILLIAMS, Walter Hascott Carpenter, North Wagga Wagga. Wife: Florence Elizabeth.

Children: Alfred Francis; Doreen Muriel; and Fanny Iris.

WILLIAMS, William Labourer; employed by Tompson and Armitage at "Eunonyhareenyha" station in 1850; charged with disobedience of orders by the superintendant, Duncan Menzies*, and sentenced by the Wagga Wagga Bench to two months in Goulburn Gaol (WWBB).

WILLIAMS, William Farmer, residing at North Wagga Wagga; bucket and windlass washed away in the flood of 1870 and allegedly stolen (WWE Jan 10, 1872).

WILLIAMS, William Licensee, Malebo Inn, 1874-81 (Burch).

WILLIAMS, William Cook for J.M. Ronald* at "Eunonyhareenyha" in 1875 (WWE Apr 10, 1875).

WILLIAMS, William Pioneer miner, Adelong Crossing. Died in 1902 at the age of 102 years, five months.

WILLIAMS, William Farmer at Ladysmith near Wagga Wagga in 1908. Wife: Mary Ann. Children: Adelaide (born on April 11, 1893), Mary Ann (February 12, 1898) and George (August 26, 1895) were all baptized on April 9, 1908 (Ang Reg).

WILLIAMS, William Born at Omeo. Lived at Oura. Died at the Wagga Wagga Base Hospital in August 1958 at the age of ninety (DA Aug 6, 1958). Children: Stephen (Oura); Frederick (Oura); Emily (Mrs L. Everett, Galore); and Nancy (Mrs A. Cox, Melbourne). Stepsons: Thomas McGill; and Samuel Snow.

WILLIAMS, William Alf Son of William and Selina. Born on February 4, 1880; and baptized on June 27, 1880 (Ang Reg).

WILLIAMS, William Henry Squatter; came from a family based in Gundaroo near Yass, New South Wales, and had family links to both Goulburn and Sydney.

W

Acquired "Little Billabong" run c.1855. Publican at "Little Billabong" (Bailliere; Grenville; and Winston Gregson pp.158 & 160).

WILLIAMS, William John Died on August 2, 1926 at the age of fifty-nine, after accidentally slipping into the lagoon; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Aug 3, 1926).

WILLIAMSON Police Constable, Wagga Wagga, in 1882.

WILLIAMSON, Miss Teacher at South Wagga Public School; transferred to Moss Vale in 1915 (DA May 10, 1915).

WILLIAMSON, Aimee Violet ("Tootles") Younger daughter of J.C. Married Wallace Horsley* (DA Mar 29, 1927).

WILLIAMSON, Cecil Fourth son of John Thomas. Married Jessie Laughland at Tweed Heads (DA June 15, 1922).

WILLIAMSON, Cecilia Wife of John Thomas nee Large. Daughter of Dr Large*. Left Wagga Wagga in 1914 (DA May 26, 1914); and lived in Grafton. Died on June 14, 1932 at the age of eighty-four; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WILLIAMSON, E.H. Licensee, Union Club Hotel, Junee, in 1894 (Burch).

WILLIAMSON, Ethel Mary Eldest daughter of John Thomas. Teacher; passed pupil teacher exam in 1900 (WWA Oct 20, 1900); teacher at Soumara School in Marrar district in August 1901 (Armstrong pp.101 & 136); assistant teacher at North Wagga Public School in 1911 but resigned to get married on May 31, 1911 (Morris NWPS p.40). Resided at "Aratula", Peter Street, Wagga Wagga. Married Robert McIntyre McCrae* at her residence on June 7, 1911 (DA June 9, 1911).

WILLIAMSON, Gertrude ("Gertie") Daughter of John Thomas. Teacher; left in 1906 to marry Mr Boylson of the Armidale Lands Office on Boxing Day, 1906 (WWA Dec 15, 1906; Dec 22, 1906; and Dec 27, 1906).

WILLIAMSON, H. Superintendant for James M. Thorne* at "Kindandra" and "Gobbagombalin" in the early 1840s (AONSW 4/2485.1; and Reel 2748 X811).

WILLIAMSON, J.C. Deceased by 1927. Daughter: Aimee Violet.

WILLIAMSON, John Thomas Native of Auckland, New Zealand. Son of a wealthy public man (superintendent of the Auckland province for many years under the old system of provincial government). Educated at Nelson College, New Zealand, and worked in his father's office on leaving school. Emigrated to New South Wales in 1876 and was engaged by Auber G. Jones* as his private secretary and on the staff of the **Wagga Wagga Advertiser**. Later went into the newspaper business on his own account, starting the **Wagga Evening Star** but this proved an unsuccessful venture and he lost the whole of his capital. Then established a flourishing stock and station agency (NSW Dir, 1903); land agent, general commission agent, Bellairs Buildings, Gurwood Street and a machine agency business and did well as a produce merchant. Then share farmer on a large scale just when a series of bad seasons set in and lost heavily. Married Mrs Cecilia Jenkins nee Large* in the 1870s. Secretary of the Murrumbidgee Turf Club. Joint secretary of the Farmers and Settlers' Association. Vice president of St John's Young Men's Club. Member of the executive committee for the opening ceremony, Hampden Bridge. Chaired the meeting held to form a Rugby Football Club in 1889 (WWA July 11, 1889). Alderman, Wagga Wagga Borough Council 1895-99; chairman of the works

committee but resigned when the mayor overruled the works committee (WWA June 19, 1897; and Sept 18, 1897). Member of the Wagga Wagga Hospital Committee 1894-96 (Morris ADB p.267). Died as the result of a buggy accident at the corner of Baylis and Tompson Streets, Wagga Wagga, on November 27, 1905 at the age of fifty-six, leaving a widow, five sons and three daughters (WWA Nov 28, 1905; and DA Oct 10, 1928). Children in 1959: Percy William; Arthur Osborne (Sydney); Cicil Wrixton (Sydney); Norman Barre (Melbourne); Lilian Annie (Mrs K.W.A. Stewart, Melbourne); Stanley John (deceased); Ethel Mary (Mrs R. Macrea, deceased); and Gertrude (Mrs G.A. Boylson, deceased).

WILLIAMSON, Lilian Annie
Youngest daughter of John Thomas. Married Willoughby Keith Ainslie Stuart at Grafton, northern New South Wales, on January 26, 1921 (DA Feb 9, 1921).

WILLIAMSON, Lorna Married C.J.B. Helm* at Junee in September 1913; given away by Charles McKinnon (DA Sept 2, 1913). Sister of: Mrs A. McKinnon.

WILLIAMSON, Percy William Sixth child of John Thomas and Cecilia. Born at his home in Kincaid Street, Wagga Wagga, on November 11, 1887. Educated at Gurwood Street Public School. Business career began at the age of fourteen with Heath and Irvine, stock and station agents. At the age of nineteen started on his own account, later taking J.A. ("Jack") Harrison* as a partner (auctioneers, stock and station agents), Fitzmaurice Street, Wagga Wagga, from 1910; the firm specialised in land and stock sales and financing large and small estates (Robertson, 1914) with Williamson handling the stock side of the business and Harrison the land agency side (DA Mar 22, 1923). When this partnership dissolved he was joined by Jim Bouffler. His stock and station agency was purchased

by Dalgety and Co in 1923 but he remained as joint manager (Riverina manager) with R.O. Hore* (DA Jan 9, 1923); retired from this position in 1953. Married a daughter of John Booty* (possibly Lilian Jane). Initial chairman of the Wagga Stock Agents Association and in the position for fifteen years. Member of the executive of the New South Wales Country Stock and Station Agents Association for over twenty years; and member of the council which was set up c.1944 by an Act of Parliament to control stock and station agents' operations. Williamson and Harrison subscribed ten guineas to the Australia Day Fund for the return of the wounded in 1915 during World War I (DA July 24, 1915); and subscribed to the "Kangaroo" march in 1915 (DA Nov 16, 1915). Member of the Wagga Golf Club committee (DA Apr 10, 1915); and became the Wagga Golf champion only fourteen weeks after taking up golf and won more championships later. Also a foundation member of the Country Golf Club. Played tennis and Australian Rules football and cricket (for the Newtown Cricket Club in 1911). Club champion at the Wagga City Bowling Club seven times. Champion billiard player. Excellent field shot. Member of the Murrumbidgee Turf Club for forty-four years and had two terms of five years as chairman. Raced horses successfully and had a big part in the administration of the Wagga Amateur Picnic Race Club, being on the committee for over forty years. Member of the Wagga Wagga branch committee of the Riverina New State Movement (DA July 9, 1921). Member of the Riverine Club for forty-five years and chairman from c.1949. Died on September 20, 1959 at the age of seventy-two, leaving a widow, two sons and one daughter; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Sept 21, 1959). Children: Reginald John (Sydney); Arthur William (Sydney); and Mrs R.G. Wright (Wagga Wagga).

W

WILLIAMSON, R. Enlisted during World War I; listed on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga (DA May 15, 1916).

WILLIAMSON, Stanley Eldest son of John Thomas. Prominent footballer, Wagga Wagga district. Died at Waterfall in April 1919 at the age of thirty-one (DA Apr 22, 1919).

WILLIAMSON, William Lived in Wagga Wagga in the early 1860s; held an account with the Australian Joint Stock Bank, Wagga Wagga, 1860-61 (Ledger).

WILLIS, Florence Hyman Eldest daughter of E.B. Married Harold William Mooney* in Sydney on September 20, 1917 (DA Oct 6, 1917).

WILLIS, G. Rode the horse which won the Wagga Gold cup in 1912 (DA Apr 30, 1917).

WILLIS, Henry Selected forty acres at "Eunonyhareenyha" in 1872 (WWE June 29, 1872).

WILLIS, Mrs J. Daughter of William Henry Henneker*. Lived in Bolton Street, Wagga Wagga, in 1928.

WILLIS, John Boundary rider for Thomas Wardle Hammond* at "June" station (later "Wyoming") in the 1860s (DA Mar 31, 1922).

WILLIS, Leonard Employed at the Wagga Wagga branch, Government Savings Bank; later transferred to Corowa. Married Lynda (or Linda) Angel* on September 4, 1915 (DA Sept 11, 1915).

WILLIS, Linda Wife of Leonard nee Angel. Died in childbirth at the Corowa Hospital on July 25, 1916 at the age of twenty-five; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA July 26, 1916).

WILLIS, Mabel Possibly the wife of Walter Richard. Died on January 9, 1957 at the age of seventy-four; buried Church of

Christ Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WILLIS, S.F. Enlisted during World War I; listed on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga.

WILLIS, W.E. Enlisted during World War I; listed on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga.

WILLIS, Walter Richard Died on December 20, 1966 at the age of seventy-three; buried Church of Christ Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WILLISON, Robert Youngest son of T. Married Louie Collins* at St John's Church of England, Wagga Wagga, on December 28, 1921 (DA Jan 10, 1922).

WILLISON, T. Children: Robert; Rita; and Mona.

WILLISON, Thomas Died on December 7, 1949 at the age of eighty-one; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WILLOUGHBY, G.T. Postal Assistant, Wagga Wagga Post Office, in 1901, receiving one hundred and seventy pounds per annum (PO).

WILLOUGHBY, K. Company manager, residing in Fitzmaurice Street, Wagga Wagga. Defeated in Wagga Wagga Council elections of 1928 (DA Dec 3, 1928).

WILSHIRE, C. Transferred from June to the Wagga Wagga branch of the Bank of New South Wales in 1910 (WWA Sept 13, 1910).

WILSHIRE, John Enlisted on October 27, 1916 during World War I; private, 1st Battalion; killed in action between October 2 and October 5, 1917; listed on the Gap Roll of Honour (AWM Nominal Roll).

WILSON Came to Wagga Wagga with Richard S. Heydon* in the 1850s and worked as a wheelwright, Gurwood Street, Wagga Wagga.

W

Later married. Died as a result of illness (Edney pp.57f).

WILSON and Winchester
Contractors employed to complete improvements to the Oddfellows' Hall, Wagga Wagga, in 1908 (WWA Oct 13, 1908).

WILSON, A.J. Son of E.J. Enlisted on April 10, 1915 during World War I; driver, 20th Battalion, transport section; served in Egypt and Palestine; returned to Australia on March 9, 1919 and to Wagga Wagga in May, 1919; listed on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga (AWM Nominal Roll; and DA May 21, 1919).

WILSON, Albert John Died on October 26, 1961 at the age of sixty; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WILSON, Alma Bird Son of J.W. of Narrandera. Lived at Gregadoo, Wagga Wagga. Married a daughter of F. Baker of Gregadoo. Died in April 1918 at the age of thirty-three, leaving a widow and three children, the oldest four and the youngest fourteen months; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Apr 25, 1918).

WILSON, Barbara Ellen Daughter of John. Born Wolverhampton, England. Emigrated to New South Wales c.1865. Lived most of her life at Bomen and Wagga Wagga. Married John Parkhurst*.

WILSON, Ben Allotment, Toole's Creek Soldier Settlement, in 1918 (DA Dec 11, 1918); member of Toole's Creek Soldier Settlement Committee in 1919 (DA Apr 4, 1919).

WILSON, C.O. Married Rita Lavinia Campbell*.

WILSON, Charles Nicolas Died on August 21, 1892 at the age of sixty-six; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WILSON, Clarence E. ("Clarrie") Son of E.J. Enlisted on September

2, 1914 during World War I; private, 4th Battalion; returned to Australia on February 3, 1915; apparently died of wounds; listed on Soldiers' Memorial, Wagga Wagga (AWM Nominal Roll; and DA Sept 18, 1922).

WILSON, Claude Alfred Son of George Paterson and Fanny. Lived at "Compton", Big Springs, in the 1920s. Died at the home of his sister, Mrs Hugh Bullivant, in Melbourne, Victoria, at the age of seventy-two (DA Oct 25, 1958).

WILSON, Colin Campbell Youngest son of James (E.J.?). Enlisted on June 14, 1916 during World War I at the age of seventeen; private, 20th Battalion; two years active service at Gallipoli and in France; awarded Military Medal; returned to Australia on June 19, 1919 and to Wagga Wagga in August, 1919; listed on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga (AWM Nominal Roll; DA Nov 19, 1918; and DA Aug 18, 1919).

WILSON, E. James Lived in Urana Road, Wagga Wagga. Children: A.J.; Ernest ("Barney"); Colin C.; Clarence E. "Clarrie"; and step-son, O. Moore.

WILSON, Edgar William Fourth son of George Paterson and Fanny. Born Compton House, Norwood, England, in 1876. Educated at Geelong Scotch College and Toorak College. Engaged in station work on "Big Springs" station. Then in 1910 leased from his father (and later purchased) 4000 acres of the Gregadoo portion of the station in partnership with B.I. Hutchinson. Later sold portion to Alex McVean; and then bought Hutchinson's portion. Resided at the homestead on Gregadoo. Good cricketer (for Wollundry Cricket Club and Wagga Wagga), footballer and tennis player, winning the doubles with Charles Hardy* in 1899; and a foundation member of the Wagga Country Golf Club and president 1936-37. Member of the Wagga Amateur Picnic Race Club, the Murrumbidgee Turf Club and the Riverine Club, Wagga Wagga.

W

Died suddenly in Tasmania while holidaying with friends on April 11, 1941 at the age of sixty-four; buried Presbyterian Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Apr 14, 17, 18 & 28, 1941; and Jeffrey **Pioneers of Australia**). Two trees planted as a memorial to him at the front of Gregadoo Hall (DA Aug 18, 1942).

WILSON, Edward Henry ("Teddy") Sixth son of George Paterson and Fanny. Born at Wagga Wagga on August 7, 1884. Farmer and grazier at "Big Springs" with his family. Distinguished athlete; played football and polo; and was noted for his horsemanship. Secretary of the Wagga Polo Club and organised many tournaments. Enlisted in the 8th Light Horse on October 16, 1914; trained in Melbourne, Victoria; left Australia about March 1915; and then trained in Egypt; served at Gallipoli; promoted to lieutenant on August 7, 1915 and first called on to exercise command in the Lone Pine charges; mentioned in the despatches of General Sir Ian Hamilton; became ill and sent to Alexandria and then England; studied aviation while convalescing and hoped to transfer to the Flying Corp; but rejoined unit in Egypt; then contracted pneumonia and died at the Ismailia Hospital, Egypt, on March 18, 1916 at the age of thirty-one; listed on Soldiers' Memorial and the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga (AWM Nominal Roll; DA Oct 25, 1915; illustrated, Nov 18, 1915; Feb 3, 1916; Mar 21, 1916; and Sept 18, 1922).

WILSON, Edward Hughes Born at Albury, New South Wales. Pioneer farmer, Humula district; settled in the Downfalls District in 1880; selected land at "Fernsdale" where he resided until his death. Died of bronchitis in June 1929 at the age of seventy-five leaving a widow, five sons and two daughters (DA June 24, 1929). Children: E.B. (Queensland); R.V. (Humula); Archibald A, (Humula); Bertie J. (Manly); Alan

("Fernsdale"); Mrs Thomas Hutchinson (Lake Albert); Mrs Ernest Hannister (Humula); William (deceased); Leslie George (deceased); and Mrs Elleson (deceased).

WILSON, Eliza Wife of Charles Nicolas. Came to Wagga Wagga with her husband and young family in the late 1800s; her husband was badly injured when a team driven by her family bolted and caused the waggon to capsize and died a few days after their arrival. Died on October 20, 1901 at the age of seventy-six, leaving two sons and two daughters; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Oct 22, 1901; and WWMC).

WILSON, Eliza Jean Wife of George. Died on June 14, 1936 at the age of sixty-nine; buried Presbyterian Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WILSON, Elizabeth Born Long Sutton, Lincolnshire, England, in 1846. Came to Wagga Wagga in October 1853 at the age of seven with her parents who were contracted to William Brown* for two years at forty pounds a year. Cared for the children of Henry Moxham*, Brown's son-in-law; and accompanied Mrs Moxham to Sydney to purchase furniture for the Black Swan Hotel in 1860 (DA Oct 18, 1927). Bridesmaid for Tom Castro* and Mary Ann Bryant*. Married Mr Palmer (DA Oct 18, 1927). Sister of: John William.

WILSON, Elizabeth Wife of J. nee Kilpatrick; aunt of Mathew Kilpatrick* M.L.A.

WILSON, Ernest ("Barney") Son of E.J. (James). Enlisted during World War I; killed in action; listed on Soldiers Memorial, Wagga Wagga (DA May 21, 1919; and Sept 18, 1922).

WILSON, Ernest Married Margaret Tousell on November 9, 1910.

WILSON, Ernest Charles Foster son of Henry George and Mary Ann

W

Smith. Born at Ladysmith c.1890. Married Violet May Abbey. Died at Wagga Wagga on December 27, 1965; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC). Children: Edna; Lila; Joyce; Doreen; Bruce; Alan; Roy; and Lorna.

WILSON, Ernest James Third son of George Paterson. Born at Compton House, Gypsy Hill, Surrey, England, on July 19, 1875 while his parents were holidaying in England. Prominent athlete; played football and cricket (for Wollundry Club); and an excellent horseman. Seriously injured when he fell off his horse named "Moonlight" during an amateur hunters' steeplechase at the Show Meeting of the Murrumbidgee Turf Club; and died a few days later on September 6, 1897 (WWA Sept 7 & 9, 1897).

WILSON, Fanny Wife of George Paterson; second daughter of Captain S.J. Lindsay of "Glencoe" station, Mount Gambia, South Australia. Lived at the "Pomingalarna" station for the first few years of her married life and at "Big Springs". Good horsewoman. Died at the homestead at "Big Springs" on May 16, 1926, at the age of seventy-seven; buried Presbyterian Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA May 17 & 19, 1926).

WILSON, Fanny E. Daughter of George Paterson and Fanny. Born at St Kilda, Melbourne, Victoria, on July 18, 1878. Played tennis and represented Wagga Wagga against Cootamundra (WWA Oct 1, 1898). Married Hugh E. Bullivant* at the Australian Church in Melbourne on June 4, 1908 (WWA June 13, 1908).

WILSON, G. Enlisted during World War I; private; wounded in 1918 (DA Nov 19, 1918).

WILSON, George Storekeeper, Wagga Wagga, in 1859 (GH Jan 12, 1859).

WILSON, George Businessman; employed by D. Copland* and Co,

Wagga Wagga, in the ironmongery department for fifteen years. Left for Sydney in 1917 (DA May 17, 1917). Married Emily Johnston at St John's Church, Wagga Wagga, in 1906 (WWA June 7, 1906).

WILSON, George Died on April 30, 1933 at the age of sixty-seven; buried Presbyterian Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC). Wife: Eliza Jean.

WILSON, George Purchased "Big Springs" station with George Paterson Wilson (unrelated); and bought out his partner in 1872; employed Mr Stiles* as manager of the station. Buggy and effects seized by the locker at the bonded store, Green, for the non-payment of customs duty, after he and his wife and child had travelled on the coach from Melbourne (WWE Jan 22, 1873; Feb 9, 1873; Feb 19, 1873; and Feb 22, 1873; WWA Jan 22, 1873; and Oct 8, 1873).

WILSON, George Paterson Born at Renton, on the banks of Leven Water, Scotland, on November 14, 1840. Came to Geelong, Victoria, on **Tasmania** in 1858 and settled near Ballarat, Victoria. Followed mercantile pursuits at Ararat and later took over as manager of "Wanga Lake" station for eighteen months. Then engaged in gold digging in New Zealand. Then returned to Geelong and took up mercantile pursuits with the firm of Wilson and Crosby. Married Fanny Lindsay in 1870. Came from Victoria to the Wagga Wagga district in the 1860s and purchased O'Brien's Creek, south east of Wagga Wagga (later known as "Big Springs" station) with another (unrelated) George Wilson (Garland p.13; Gormly E&S p.90; Swan p.101; and George Wilson); partnership with George Wilson was dissolved in 1872 and George Paterson sold his share to George (Brady **Australia Unlimited**; and George Wilson). Holidayed in England for three years; then purchased "Pomingalarna" station from Dr Morrison of Scotch College, Melbourne, and lived on

the station until it was sold to Messrs Mackay* and Copland*. Left the district in 1882 and dinner held in his honour at the Freemasons' Hall (WWA May 6, 1882). Again purchased "Big Springs" station (then 25,000 acres and 35,000 sheep) in 1886 (WWA Dec 11, 1886). Raised high class sheep and the estate became known for its wool in Commonwealth markets. Claimed one hundred pounds damages and awarded thirty pounds for the trespass of a selector named Miller in 1890 (WWA Nov 15, 1890). Used machines for shearing in 1900 (WWA Nov 3, 1900). Prominently identified with the progress of Wagga Wagga and District and its many institutions. Member of the Murrumbidgee, Lachlan horse, cattle and sheep stealing prevention association in 1869. Senior magistrate of the Wagga Wagga district. President of the Murrumbidgee Pastoral and Agricultural Association and later made a life member as a tribute to his distinguished service. Life member of the Murrumbidgee Turf Club. Keen interest in the Wagga Picnic Racing Club and the Wagga Bowling Club. Patron of the Lake Albert Rugby Football Club (WWA Mar 24, 1910; and Robertson, 1914). Director of the Murrumbidgee and Co-operative Milling Company (WWA May 23, 1893). Provisional director of a proposed company for freezing and slaughtering meat in 1881 (DA Oct 10, 1938). Spoke at a public meeting in favour of chilling works in 1894 (WWA May 5, 1894). Member of the Federal Capital League in 1900-01. One of the first members of Kyeamba Shire Council. Member of the Wagga Wagga Hospital Committee 1879 and 1890-91 and Life Member (Morris ADB p.267). Subscribed twenty pounds to the Australia Day Fund for the return of the wounded in 1915 during World War I. Died at the Hoberne Private Hospital, Wagga Wagga, on July 1, 1923 at the age of eighty-two; buried Presbyterian Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA

July 2 & 4, 1923; and Jeffrey). Children: George Paterson; Edgar William; Norman Edward McKirdy; Claude Alfred; Edward Henry ("Teddy"); Ernest James; Herbert Lindsay; Fanny E.; and a daughter who died in infancy.

WILSON, George Paterson Eldest son of George Paterson and Fanny. Born on January 9, 1872. Grazier, "Big Springs", Wagga Wagga district. Good cricketer for Wollundry Cricket Club and scored a century in the 1896-97 season; represented Wagga Wagga against Tumut in 1897. President of the Murrumbidgee Pastoral and Agricultural Association 1915-16. Member of the Patriotic Fund Committee during World War I; and subscribed ten pounds to the Australia Day Fund for the return of the wounded in 1915. Broke his leg in a riding fall in 1902 and was a patient at the "Bungalow" Private hospital, Wagga Wagga (WWA Sept 6, 1902). Sold well known property, "Oura", to Messrs Monahan and Carey of Victoria (DA May 30, 1921). Died on July 5, 1952; buried Presbyterian Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WILSON, Herbert Lindsay Fifth son of George Paterson and Fanny. Grazier at "Mundowey" and "Kywong". Enthusiastic member of the Murrumbidgee Pastoral Association and the Picnic Race Club. Successful trainer and rider and keen polo player and footballer. Married Nancy Whitehead*. Died in Melbourne, Victoria, on November 20, 1919 at the age of thirty-seven, leaving a widow and a three year old daughter; buried Presbyterian Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Nov 21, 22 & 24, 1919).

WILSON, Hilda Maude Wife of Raymond George. Lived at Book near Wagga Wagga. Died on January 9, 1970 at the age of sixty-eight; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC). Children: Gwen; and Clive.

W

WILSON, J. Born Glasgow, Scotland. Came to Victoria with his parents. Married Elizabeth Kilpatrick. Farmer, Moorooopa, Victoria and then in New South Wales between Finlay and Berrigan and later in the Lockhart district. Died in March 1925 at the age of seventy-three; buried Presbyterian Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Mar 30, 1925). Children: Thomas; John; Mathew; and James.

WILSON, J.W. Lived at Narrandera, New South Wales. Children: Alma Bird; Ernest C.; George A.

WILSON, James Superintendant for Thomas Small* at "Yanco" station, Lachlan District, in 1840 (AONSW 4/2485.1).

WILSON, James A. Enlisted before the end of January 1915 during World War I; farewelled at the Methodist School Hall in 1915 (DA Feb 11, 1915; and Oct 1, 1915).

WILSON, James Alexander Son of J. of "Westella", Culcairn, New South Wales. Married Edwyna Dorothy ("Wyn") Crouch* (DA Jan 9, 1920).

WILSON, James Alexander Born in Singleton, New South Wales, c.1869. Educated at Sydney Grammar School. Resided in the Wagga Wagga district for seventy-two years. Died at the Wagga Wagga Base Hospital in May 1956 at the age of eighty-seven; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA May 15, 1956).

WILSON, John Police Constable, Wagga Wagga, in 1854 (WWBB).

WILSON, John Bricklayer and plasterer, St Michael's Church, Wagga Wagga, in 1859; lived in a tent on church ground; contributed three guineas to the church's building fund.

WILSON, John Born at Wagga Wagga. Left for Narrandera in 1884. Died at the Narrandera District Hospital in April 1929

at the age of seventy-five; buried Anglican Portion, Narrandera Cemetery (DA May 2, 1929). Wife: died c.1902. Children: John (Narrandera); William (Widgiewa); George (Ladysmith); Charles (Wagga Wagga); Walter (Conoble); and three daughters.

WILSON, John William Born at North Wagga Wagga c.1853; brother of Elizabeth. Lived at Corobinella in 1927 at the age of seventy-three (DA Oct 18, 1927).

WILSON, John William Born c.1823. Emigrated to Australia c.1853. Came to the Wagga Wagga district c.1875. Died in May 1906 at the age of eighty-three (WWA May 5, 1906).

WILSON, Joseph William Son of Mrs H. Of Weerite, Victoria. Enlisted during World War I; member of the 10th Field Ambulance. Bridge Carpenter, Railway Department. Lived at 39 Wall Street, North Wagga Wagga. Died on November 25, 1947 at the age of fifty-three; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Nov 26 & 28, 1947). Wife: Amy Constance. Children: Claude (North Wagga Wagga); Frank (North Wagga Wagga); Keith (Sydney); Mrs C. Russell (North Wagga Wagga); and Miss Rayie (North Wagga Wagga). Brother of Douglas (Weerite); Clem (Victoria); Wesley (Camperdown); Leonard (Trangie); Owen (Shepparton); Lindsay (Weerite); Lester (Warnambool); and four sisters.

WILSON, Laura Delicia Daughter of Thomas. Born at Humula. Married James Ernest Parkhurst*.

WILSON, Minnie Alexer Georgina Isabel Daughter of Hector. Born at Pomingalarna c.1880. Married Charles Edwin Boswell*.

WILSON, Nancy Wife of Herbert Lindsay nee Whitehead.

WILSON, Norman Edward McKirdy Second son of George Paterson and

Fanny. Educated at Alma Road Grammar School, Melbourne, and at Toorak College. Good cricketer (for the Wollundry Club); and footballer (for Mechanics' Football Club) in the 1890s. Splendid horseman; bred and raced his own horses in many amateur events including the high jumps and steeplechase events at the Murrumbidgee Pastoral and Agricultural Shows. Saw service in the Boer War; returned on the **Drayton Grange**. Passenger on the steamer, **Darius** which left Sydney for Calcutta in August 1899; the ship broke a propellor when about nine hundred miles from Padang, Sumatra; he was one of two who volunteered to help man the lifeboats to make for one of the ports in Sumatra to obtain assistance (WWA Oct 3, 1899; DA Oct 10, 1928; and Apr 1, 1929). Landholder and station manager at "Quat Quatta", Corowa, in 1926. Inherited part of the "Big Springs" station. Married Phyllis Mary Ward of Brighton, Melbourne, in 1914 (DA Feb 27, 1914). Died (pneumonia) at the "Welwyn" Private Hospital, Wagga Wagga, in March 1929 at the age of fifty-five (DA Apr 1, 1929). Sons: Norman Paterson; and Edward Henry.

WILSON, Peter Born in Scotland. Presbyterian. Farmer, Arajoel. Single. Died at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital in April 1901 at the age of sixty (WWDH Reg).

WILSON, R.A. Attended Wagga Wagga Primary School. Enlisted during World War I; and listed on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga.

WILSON, Rita Lavinia. Wife of C.O. nee Campbell. Died on July 6, 1982 at the age of seventy-eight; buried Presbyterian Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WILSON, Robert Publican; licensee of Tarcutta Inn, Tarcutta Creek, Port Phillip Road 1846-49 (Pub Lic Reel 215).

WILSON, Robert Andrew Died on July 31, 1959 at the age of sixty-six; buried Presbyterian Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WILSON, Thomas Married "Siss" Cheney*. Lived in Broad Street, Wagga Wagga, in 1926.

WILSON, Thomas Resided in Wagga Wagga for fifty years; and was well known at "Kyeamba" station for a number of years. Died at the Parramatta District Hospital on October 9, 1924; buried Presbyterian Portion, Rookwood Cemetery (DA Oct 15, 1924). Children: Sidney (Albury); Norman (Wagga Wagga); Mrs A.F. Gaebel (North Sydney); Mrs S. Miller (Moss Vale); Laura Delicia (Wagga Wagga); Mrs G. Gill (Holbrook); Mrs Klemke (Albury); Cecily (Melbourne); and Heather (Granville). Brother of: J. (Queensland); Edward (Wagga Wagga); and Henry (Narrandera).

WILSON, W. Good cricketer at Wagga Wagga in the 1890s; wicketkeeper and a batsman of no mean capabilities; scored many centuries including a fine innings of 119 against Paddington at the Wagga Wagga Association Ground in 1904 (WWA Apr 2, 1904). Also played football. Left for Wyalong in 1894 (WWA Mar 22, 1894) but returned by 1897.

WILSON, W. Painter, Wagga Wagga (NSW Dir, 1903).

WILSON, William Carpenter at North Wagga Wagga in the early 1850s; charged with drunkenness and riotous behaviour in 1851 (WWBB).

WILTON, Charles Edward Son of E.G. Resided at Wagga Wagga as a boy. Died in July 1929 (DA Aug 1, 1929).

WILTON, E.G. First manager of the **Wagga Wagga Advertiser** from 1868. Subscribed one guinea towards a new school building in 1869. Member of St John's Church of England finance committee.

W

Stranded at the Albion Hotel with his son and two others during the flood of 1870 (WWA May 7, 1870). Left to take over the **Hill End Observer** in 1870s but this venture failed (WWA Oct 10, 1874).

WILTON, F. Enlisted during World War I; listed on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga.

WINCHESTER, Charles Son of John and Sophia. Born in Baylis Street, Wagga Wagga, on May 4, 1886 (Birth Certificate provided by Nancy Patterson).

WINCHESTER, Herbert Son of John and Sophia. Born on April 13, 1891; and baptized on July 27, 1891 (Ang Reg).

WINCHESTER, J. Painter and signwriter, Wagga Wagga, in 1902; house and shop front damaged by fire in 1902.

WINCHESTER, John Son of Robert and Ann. Born in Scotland c.1846. Joiner and carpenter at Wagga Wagga. Married Sophie Helen Steward* at Pomingalarna on August 28, 1873. Died (pneumonia and exhaustion) on September 30, 1890 at the age of forty-four; buried Presbyterian Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (Death Certificate provided by Nancy Patterson). Children: John (born c.1874); Katie Ann (1876); Sophia Ellen (1878); Robert (1881-87); William (1883); Curtis Charles (1886); and Herbert (1891).

WINCHESTER, Katharine Ann Daughter of John and Sophia. Born at Wagga Wagga on June 9, 1876. Married Edward Levings on May 20, 1898 at West Wyalong (Birth Certificate provided by Nancy Patterson).

WINCHESTER, Robert Stewart Son of John and Sophia. Born in 1881. Drowned in a dam off Forsyth Street, Newtown, Wagga Wagga on December 19, 1887 at the age of six; inquest held at T.H. Cummin's Terminus Hotel on December 19 (WWA Dec 20, 1887).

WINCHESTER, Sophia Wife of John nee Steward. Married (2) John Anthony Sekler. No issue. Died (broncho pneumonia and eudocarditis) at the Leeton District Hospital on October 11, 1934; buried Methodist Portion, Leeton Cemetery (Death Certificate provided by Nancy Patterson).

WINDERIDGE, Florence Second daughter of J.W. Married Douglas Bowler in 1923 (DA Apr 12, 1923).

WINDERIDGE, J.W. Son of Colonel Windbridge of the Prince of Wales Light Horse (formerly sergeant major of 28th regiment which came to Sydney in 1836) who later joined the Victorian Police Department and was in charge of the first escort of gold from Mt Alexander to Melbourne in the early 1850s. Served in the Light Horse for a number of years. As a youth served time under Stuart Murray, Engineer in Chief for Water Supply, Victoria; passed examinations as surveyor and moved to New South Wales; entered the Lands Department, Sydney, in 1879; remained there eighteen years; then from 1897 worked at Maitland, Hay and Orange. Moved to Wagga Wagga in 1908 and succeeded Joe Ferris* as draftsman in charge at Wagga Wagga Lands Office (WWA Aug 15, 1908). Golf and bowls enthusiast; three times champion of the Wagga Golf Club, president in 1912 (DA Oct 18, 1912) and captain for many years. Also played in Old Buffers Cricket Matches to raise funds for the Wagga Wagga District Hospital (DA Oct 18, 1912; Mar 25, 1915; May 25, 1915; and July 17, 1915). Retired after thirty-eight years in public service in 1917 and left for Melbourne (DA Jan 18, 1917). Daughter: Florence.

WINDEYER, Ada Ann Wife of Walter Orton. Died at Neutral Bay, Sydney, on September 19, 1915 (DA Sept 22, 1915).

W

WINDEYER, E. Lived at Junee, New South Wales. Served in the New South Wales Mounted Contingent in South Africa during the Boer War (WWA Dec 21, 1899; Jan 2, 1900; and Jan 20, 1900).

WINDEYER, Ella M. Wife of John. Died at Raymond Terrace, New South Wales, in June 1914 at the age of sixty-seven (DA June 24, 1914).

WINDEYER, H. Son of William. Attended Agricultural College at Wagga Wagga. Farmer, with Douglas Hammond, at property known as the "Five Waterholes" at Old Junee from 1898 ((WWA Feb 15, 1898).

WINDEYER, John Pastoralist; associated with brother, Walter Orton, in the ownership of "Wantabadgery" station. Wife: Ella M.

WINDEYER, Louis A. Resided in Wagga Wagga in 1870; swam from the Court House to Mrs Large's school to check that Mrs Large and the young ladies were safe and well during the flood of 1870 (WWA May 4, 1870). Member of the Wagga Wagga Hospital Committee 1870-72 (Morris ADB p.267).

WINDEYER, Walter Orton Son of John of Raymond Terrace; member of well known legal family which had its main pastoral interests on the Lower Hunter River. Born in Sydney c.1833. Pastoralist, "Wantabadgery", from the 1850s until it passed to C.F.J. McDonald* in 1879. First president of the Murrumbidgee Pastoral Association, 1865-68 and then served on the committee for many years (Baylis JRAHS X111 pp.299f). Member of the Murrumbidgee and Lachlan horse, cattle and sheep stealing prevention association 1869/1872. One of the founders of the Free Punt Association (DA Oct 3, 1968). Member of the Wagga Wagga Hospital Committee 1866-72 (Morris ADB p.267). Magistrate and occasionally sat on the Wagga Wagga Bench (WWA Dec 15, 1869). Twice Married. Died on March 3,

1879 at the age of forty-six, leaving a widow and three children (WWA Mar 5, 1879; and WWE Mar 5, 1879). Wife: Ada Ann.

WINDSOR, A.G. Telegraphist at the Wagga Wagga Post Office; left for Sydney in January 1919 (DA Jan 25, 1919).

WINDSOR, George Born on April 21, 1884. Married Olive Rogers* on October 11, 1922. Died on April 20, 1962 (MW). Children: George Deacon; John David; Margaret Pamela; Geoffrey William; and Phillip Francis.

WINDSOR, Olive Wife of George nee Rogers. Died on October 22, 1975.

WINGROVE, C.M. Killed in action during World War I; listed on the Honour Board of the Wagga Experiment Farm (DA Jan 1, 1919).

WINKLEY, Harry Ernest Awarded Leaving Certificate at the Wagga Wagga High School (DA Jan 27, 1919).

WINNELL, Amy Elizabeth Daughter of Samuel Henry and Ann. Born on May 11, 1892. Married Percy Sherwin.

WINNELL, Ann ("Nancy") Daughter of Thomas and Eliza. Married Walter Stearman in 1882.

WINNELL, Anna Wife of Samuel Henry nee McFarland. Died at Wagga Wagga on May 10, 1923 at the age of seventy-seven; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WINNELL, Annabelle Daughter of Samuel Henry and Ann. Born on January 12, 1878. Married (1) Thomas George Montgomery*. Married (2) Andrew John Hamilton*.

WINNELL, Annabella Daughter of Thomas and Isabella. Born on April 28, 1877. May have died on August 13, 1965.

WINNELL, Beatrice Daughter of Joseph and Catherine. Married W.G. Honey* on November 27, 1907 (WWA Dec 24, 1907).

WINNELL, Catherine ("Kate") Wife of Joseph nee Lynch. Died on September 26, 1912 at the age of sixty-five (DA Sept 27, 1912). Children: Beatrice; John; Thomas; James; Samuel; Daniel; Frank; Joseph; Sarah Elizabeth; and Mary Jane.

WINNELL, Charles Edward Son of Samuel Joseph and Ethel Ada. Born on May 14, 1903; and baptized on August 3, 1903 (Ang Reg).

WINNELL, Daphne Jean Daughter of Joseph. Died on April 5, 1923 at the age of seven months; buried Anglican Portion, Uranquinty Cemetery (DA Apr 4 & 7, 1925).

WINNELL, E.A. Wife of S. Lived at Uranquinty for over forty years. Died at Hillston in October 1948 at the age of sixty-one; buried at Uranquinty. Children: Charles (Uranquinty); John (Spring Hill); Edward (Hillston); Mrs R. Davis (Wagga Wagga); Mrs W.H. Lee (Harden); Mrs E.J. Eastman (Maryborough); Mrs L.H. Jenkins (Matong); and Muriel.

WINNELL, Emily May Daughter of Samuel Henry and Ann. Born on May 17, 1879. Married George Brill.

WINNELL, Francis ("Fanny") Daughter of Thomas and Eliza. Employed as a shepherdess on Deepwater station (L.H. Gilmore p.391). Married Gottlieb Halbisch* on June 22, 1859.

WINNELL, Grace Philamana Daughter of Thomas and Mary Ann. Born on July 4, 1900; and baptized on August 3, 1900 (Ang Reg).

WINNELL, Irene May Daughter of Samuel. Married Otto Salan*.

WINNELL, Isabella Wife of Thomas nee McFarland. Died in September 1894; buried at Ganmain.

WINNELL, Isabel Mary Irene Daughter of Samuel Henry and Ann. Born on February 19, 1899. Married Ossie Palmer.

WINNELL, James Lived in Uranquinty in 1903. Wife: Margaret. Son: Thomas Joseph.

WINNELL, James Herbert Son of Thomas and Isabella. Born on September 7, 1881. Married Muriel Danes. Died on May 2, 1965.

WINNELL, Jessie Isabel Daughter of Thomas and Isabella. Born on March 3, 1886. Married Arthur Bartlett. Died on August 28, 1973.

WINNELL, John Andrew Son of Thomas and Isabella. Born on December 7, 1879. May have died on November 4, 1955.

WINNELL, John Herbert Son of Samuel Henry and Ann. Born on July 11, 1882. Married Margaret Amelia ("Maud") Winnell*. Died on June 11, 1954; buried at Ganmain.

WINNELL, Joseph Son of Thomas and Eliza. Born on January 4, 1842. Lived at Uranquinty (DA Oct 18, 1927). Married Catherine ("Kate") Lynch. Children: Samuel; John; James; Frank; Daniel; Joseph; Beatrice; and Sarah Elizabeth.

WINNELL, Samuel Henry Son of Thomas and Eliza. Born on February 23, 1850. Farmer. Married Anna McFarland* at Wagga Wagga on April 12, 1877 (Ang Reg). Lived at "The Retreat", Narrandera Road. Died on March 27, 1930; buried at Ganmain (DA Mar 28, 1930). WINNELL, Sarah Rebecca Daughter of Samuel Henry and Ann. Born at Wagga Wagga on September 27, 1889. Lived in the area all her life. Married Frederick Hamblin*.

WINNELL, Thomas Came from Somerset, England. Married Elizabeth Mitcham. Emigrated to Australia with his wife in 1857. Settled in the Wagga Wagga area c.1865. Children: Lucy; Mary; Francia; Joseph; Sara; John; Elizabeth; Thomas; Samuel; and Ann ("Nancy").

WINNELL, Thomas Son of Thomas and Eliza; born in 1849. Married Isabella McFarland* on May 13,

1875. Farmer, Kockibitoo. Hand amputated after an accident while feeding a chaffcutter in April 1915 (DA Apr 28, 1915). Died at Ganmain on June 27, 1919 at the age of sixty-nine. Children: Thomas; Annabella; Sarah; John Andrew; James Herbert; Robert; Margaret Amelia; and Jessie Isabel.

WINNELL, Thomas Lived at "Berembed", owned by John Lupton. Account with the Australian Joint Stock Bank, Wagga Wagga, 1860-61 (Ledger).

WINNELL, Thomas Son of Thomas and Isabella. Born on March 27, 1876. Married Julia Bench. Lived in Ganmain near Wagga Wagga. Died on June 15, 1950. Daughter: Betty.

WINNELL, Thomas Son of Joseph of Uranquinty. Moved to Yanco c.1909. Died (pneumonia) on October 23, 1924 at the age of fifty-three; buried Anglican Portion, Narrandera Cemetery (DA Nov 13, 1924).

WINNELL, Thomas Timber getter in 1900. Wife: Mary Ann. Children: Grace Philamana; and Thomas Rollo.

WINNELL, Thomas Edgar Son of Samuel Henry and Ann. Born on September 28, 1896; and baptized on September 23, 1898 (Ang Reg). Married Ethel Jean Francis Bean.

WINNELL, Thomas James Lived at Leeton and later 28 Loch Street, Ganmain. Died at Wagga Wagga on May 4, 1989 at the age of seventy-five (DA May 5, 1989). Wife: Ada. Children: Carl (deceased); and Carmel (Mrs Crocker, Coolamon).

WINNELL, Thomas Joseph Son of James and Margaret. Born on June 6, 1903; and baptized on August 3, 1903 (Ang Reg).

WINNELL, Thomas Rollo Son of Thomas and Mary Ann. Born on October 5, 1903; and baptized on November 14, 1903 (Ang Reg).

WINSLETT, Phyllis Domestic, Wagga Wagga District Hospital; stopped work in protest against the dismissal of Nurse Clara Jane Powell* in 1917 (DA June 6, 1917).

WINTER, J. Wardsman at the Wagga Wagga Hospital in 1883.

WINTERBOTTOM, A. Daughter of James Thomas. Nurse; sister, New Zealand, in 1920.

WINTERBOTTOM, Miss (Alice?) Active worker for the Girls' Friendly Society and in all departments of Anglican Church; left Wagga Wagga for the Church of England Mission in New Guinea in 1910 (WWA Apr 21, 1910; and Sept 8, 1913).

WINTERBOTTOM, C.T. Born Padiham, Lancashire, England, on November 11, 1876. Orchardist, Mangrove Mountain, New South Wales. Enlisted during World War I; lieutenant, 54th Battalion (Bean V p.555).

WINTERBOTTOM, E.C.S. Lived at Oura Village near Wagga Wagga. Died in the Melbourne Hospital, Victoria, after a brief illness (the result of a fall from a bicycle three years earlier) at the age of thirty-seven, leaving a widow and four young children (DA May 1, 1918).

WINTERBOTTOM, E.T.J. (Thomas J.?) Listed on the Gap Roll of Honour for World War I.

WINTERBOTTOM, Frances Mary Ann Wife of James Thomas. Lived at Malebo and later Lower Tarcutta. Wrote to the Wagga Wagga Council complaining of the bad state of Narrandera Road in 1918 (DA July 19, 1918). Died at Gosford, New South Wales, on November 13, 1947 aged in her eighties; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Nov 14, 1947). Children: William (Gosford); Thomas (deceased); Sister Winterbottom (Gosford); Mrs J.F.

Podmore (Tarcutta); Mrs W.H. Glasson (Tarcutta); and Dawn.

WINTERBOTTOM, James Thomas Farmer and resident of the Wagga Wagga district from c.1905. Lived at "Alma", Narrandera Road. Manager of the Soldier Settlements, Tarcutta, and wrote to the Repatriation Local Committee, suggesting an appeal be made to farmers for donations of old equipment to the returned soldiers (DA July 6, 1918). Director, Wagga Wagga Co-operative Dairy and Freezing Company (WWA Sept 27, 1910; and Oct 28, 1913). Mason. Member of the Gobbagumbalin Bush Fire Brigade. Died on July 23, 1920 at the age of fifty-four; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA July 24 & 26, 1920). Children: William; Thomas J.; Violet; Sarah; Susan; and A. Brother: E.C.S.

WINTERBOTTOM, Jean Passed junior theory examination, Sydney College of Music, with Honours, in 1921 (DA June 25, 1921).

WINTERBOTTOM, Keith Enlisted on April 7, 1916 during World War I; private, 59th Battalion; died of wounds on December 12, 1916; listed on the Soldiers' Memorial, Wagga Wagga (AWM Nominal Roll; and DA Sept 18, 1922). Brother of: Mrs H.R. Nutt; and Miss W.

WINTERBOTTOM, Sarah Daughter of James Thomas. Nurse; lived at "Alma", Narrandera Road, in 1920.

WINTERBOTTOM, Susan Third daughter of James Thomas. Married James F. Podmore of Tarcutta at St John's Church, Wagga Wagga, on September 3, 1919 (DA Sept 13, 1919).

WINTERBOTTOM, Thomas J. Employee of Cairns hydro electric scheme (formerly of Wagga Wagga). Died in September 1933 (DA Sept 5, 1933).

WINTERBOTTOM, Thomas James Son of James Thomas. Enlisted in 1916 during World War I (DA Jan 17,

1917); smith at the Australian Veterinary Hospital; returned to Australia on **Prinz Ludwig** in 1919; listed on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga (DA Aug 12, 1919).

WINTERBOTTOM, Violet Daughter of James Thomas. Lived at "Alma", Narrandera Road, in 1920. Married William Henry Glasson at St Mark's Church, Tarcutta, on November 29, 1922 (DA Dec 8, 1922).

WINTERBOTTOM, William Sheridan Son of James Thomas; born c.1894. Enlisted on September 21, 1916 during World War I; left Australia in November 1916; served in France; 37th and 38th Battalions; wounded in 1917; returned to Australia on May 12, 1919; listed on the Gap Roll of Honour and on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga (AWM Nominal Roll; DA Jan 17, 1917; Nov 21, 1917; Dec 18, 1917; June 25, 1918; and June 18, 1919).

WINTERS, James Licensee, Junction Hotel, Coolamon, in 1887 (Burch).

WINTERS, Robert Licensee, Union Club Hotel, Junee, in 1893 (Burch).

WIRTH, Alfred ("Will") Enlisted on December 20, 1915 during World War I; private, 28th Battalion; invalided home on August 8, 1916 (AWM Nominal Roll).

WIRTH, John Died on May 16, 1955 at the age of sixty-eight; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WISCOMBE, Warren James ("Jim") Good Rugby League footballer; played for South Wagga Juniors in the 1940s; secretary of the Wagga Rugby League 1966-86; secretary of the Magpies 1967-75, president 1977 and life member of Magpies and Wagga Rugby League. Also a life member of the Wagga Wagga Leagues Club, a director for seventeen years and vice president 1984-86. Died in

W

Melbourne, Victoria, in April 1986 (DA Apr 29, 1986).

WISE, David Lamb Probably the son of F.M. and Mary. Proprietor, Travellers Rest Hotel, Cross Roads, in 1910; and the Cross Roads Hotel, Collingullie, in 1921. Married Sarah Ann Leaver*. Died on August 11, 1953 at the age of seventy-nine.

WISE, F.M. Married Mary Lamb. Spent a few years in Victoria and kept a hotel at Ballarat. Then after a few years in England and Scotland, returned to Australia, moving to Wagga Wagga in 1870. Died leaving a widow and four children. Sons: William P.; and David (born in Wagga Wagga in 1874).

WISE, Mary Wife of F.M. nee Lamb. Born at Falkirk, Scotland. Married (2) Samuel Taylor* (DA June 23, 1927).

WISE, Matt Licensee, Royal Hotel, Urana; and the Golden Fleece Hotel, Wagga Wagga, in 1915.

WISE, Sarah Ann Wife of David Lamb nee Leaver. Lived at Collingullie near Wagga Wagga. Died in March 1956 at the age of seventy-seven; buried Catholic Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Mar 13, 1956). Children: John (Collingullie); Tim (Wagga Wagga); and three daughters.

WISE, William P. Son of F.M. and Mary. Lived at "Falkirk Farm", Collingullie, near Wagga Wagga, in the 1920s.

WISEMAN, Blanche Mabel ("Bee") Matron, Wagga Wagga District Hospital 1907-11 (Morris ADB pp.34, 69, 157, 161, 162 & 241). Married George Whiteman Bellair*.

WISEMAN, E.G. Employee of the Commercial Bank, Wagga Wagga, until c.1906 and later at Haberfield; then promoted and transferred to the Oxford Street branch in 1921 (DA June 27, 1921). Married Dora Headley* on

September 6, 1906 at St John's Church of England, Wagga Wagga (WWA Sept 8, 1906). Infant daughter died (influenza) in July 1919 (DA July 7, 1919).

WISEMAN, William ("Bill") Enlisted during World War I; prisoner-of-war; returned in 1945. Purchased "Springfield", North Wagga Wagga; but decided it was not large enough and sold it in 1946 to Thomas and Tessie Thomas (SR Oct 18, 1985). Wife: Dorothy.

WISHART, Andrew Born at the Cross Roads near Wagga Wagga. Died at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital on August 30, 1910 at the age of eight months (WWDH Reg).

WISHART, Richard Washington Born in Scotland. Emigrated to Australia at the age of seventeen. Lived in Victoria. Then moved to Wagga Wagga from c.1916. At Oura Road via Wagga Wagga, in later years. Died in November 1956 at the age of eighty-four; buried Presbyterian Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Nov 21, 1956). Children: Richard; James; Aubrey; Alex; and six daughters.

WITHERS, Ernie Delivered newspapers for Towzells and later Lewingtons from 1948 per bicycle and then motor bike. Retired in 1987 (DA Sept 22, 1987).

WITHERS, Ernest John Born at Currawarna near Wagga Wagga on October 6, 1884. Married Myrtle Evelyn Blanche Angel* on June 8, 1907. Died at Orange, New South Wales, on May 8, 1936. Children: Dorothy; Raymond; Joan; Olive; Frederick; and Clarrie.

WITHERS, Mrs H. Daughter of Martin Ryan. Lived at Coolamon.

WITHERS, Henry Selected forty acres, parish of Eunonyhareenyha, in 1873 (WWA Dec 6, 1873).

WITHERS, Henry Son of Henry. Born at Wagga Wagga. Licensee,

W

Houlaghans Hotel, 1896-98 (Burch). Later a farmer at "Hill Vale" between Marrar and Coolamon. Married a daughter of C. Spiller. Died (pneumonic influenza) on June 26, 1919 at the age of forty-nine; buried Catholic Portion, Coolamon Cemetery (DA June 27, 1919).

WITHERS, Mrs James Daughter of Martin Ryan. Lived in Wagga Wagga.

WITHERS, John Born in New South Wales. Labourer, Eunonyhareenyha; apprehended by the Chief Constable on suspicion of having been involved in a robbery of a dwelling house on August 7, 1849; escaped from the lock up on August 21 but recaptured in September (WWBB).

WITHERS, Myrtle Evelyn Blanche Wife of Ernest John nee Angel.

WITHERS, W.J.S. ("Samuel") Enlisted during World War I; private, 13th Battalion; listed on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga. Lived at 37 Kincaid Street, Wagga Wagga. Died on June 4, 1947 at the age of forty-nine; buried Catholic Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA June 7, 1947).

WOLFE Ledger keeper at the Wagga Wagga branch, Union Bank; and succeeded Eric Layh* as teller in 1916 (DA Feb 18, 1916).

WOLFFE, William Wheat buyer, Uranquinty. Member of Independant Order of Oddfellows Lodge. Died in 1915 at the age of forty-three; buried Catholic Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Jan 4, 1915).

WOLSELEY, Frederick York Born County Dublin, Ireland, in 1837. Arrived in New South Wales the age of seventeen. Jackeroo on Riverina stations; and later a Riverina station owner. Invented machine for shearing sheep.

WOOD, Albert Edward Son of Joseph and Isabella. Lived at Nyngan in 1912. Married Janet

Alexandria Victoria May McDonald of Mullengundgery in 1912. Lived in Narromine in 1919; and in Sydney in 1922.

WOOD, Alfred James Son of Joseph and Isabella. Lived in Western Australia in 1919 and 1922.

WOOD, Charles W. Son of Joseph and Isabella. Lived at Tumbarumba, New South Wales, in 1919; and at Humula in 1922.

WOOD, Edward Proprietor, Royal Hotel, North Wagga Wagga Railway Terminus (Bomen) in 1878-79 (Burch; and WWE Jan 11, 1879).

WOOD, Elizabeth Eudora Daughter of Joseph and Isabella. Married Percy Horace Forster* at St John's Church of England, Wagga Wagga, on January 10, 1912.

WOOD, Francis Frederick Son of Joseph and Isabella. Lived in Wagga Wagga in 1919; and in Tumut in 1922.

WOOD, Miss G. Student at the North Wagga Terminus School in 1880.

WOOD, George Clerk for Henry B. Fitzhardinge* and George Coleman*, solicitors, Wagga Wagga, in the 1890s. Good footballer; member of the Mechanics' Australian Rules Football Team; captain, Wagga Wagga Football Team, in the early 1890s; and secretary of the Wagga Wagga Football Association. Later managing clerk for Griffith Evans* at West Wyalong. Died as a result of injuries received in a motor accident at West Wyalong some years before 1941 (DA Feb 5, 1941).

WOOD, George Licensee, White Horse Hotel, Baylis Street, Wagga Wagga, 1883-84; and Golden Age Hotel 1885-87 (Burch). Fire at the Golden Age Hotel in 1886 (WWA Apr 15, 1886).

WOOD, George Thomas Son of Joseph and Isabella. Lived in Queensland in 1919 and in 1922.

W

WOOD, Herbert Joseph Son of Joseph and Isabella. Lived in Nyngan in 1919 and in 1922.

WOOD, Isabella Wife of Joseph; born at Bong Bong. Resided in Wagga Wagga district for forty-two years; and at "Rosevale" subdivision at the corner of Fernleigh and Glenfield Roads near the showground at the time of her death. Died on October 1, 1919 at the age of seventy-four, leaving a widower, six sons and two daughters; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Oct 2 & 3, 1919).

WOOD, J.J. Enlisted during World War I (DA May 15, 1916).

WOOD, John Thomas Manager, "Grong Grong" station, for twelve years. Then commission agent in partnership with J.D. Norman* for some time at the Victorian Chambers, opposite the Court House, Wagga Wagga (Norman and Wood). Later proprietor, Commercial Hotel, Narrandera. Died (dropsy) at Narrandera on April 12, 1911 leaving widow and five children, the youngest less than two years old (DA Apr 13, 1911).

WOOD, Joseph Teamster; and once held up by the bushranger, Ben Hall. Grazier and farmer at Yarragundry and in the Nyngan district. Lived at "Rosevale", Yarragundry, near Wagga Wagga; then at Foxborough Hall; and later at "Nara", Fernleigh Road, Wagga Wagga. Died in Sydney on February 23, 1922 at the age of seventy-nine; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Feb 24 & 28, 1922). Children: Robert John; Charles W.; Alfred James; George Thomas; Herbert Joseph; Albert Edward; Francis Frederick; Mrs Edward Ellis; and Elizabeth Eudora.

WOOD, Mrs Joseph Native of Newcastle; daughter of James Hannell who represented Newcastle in the Legislative Assembly for many years and was the first

mayor of Newcastle. Widowed in c.1908. Died in October 1910 at the age of sixty-nine (WWA Nov 1, 1910). Children: Keith; and Mrs C.F. Warren.

WOOD, Joseph Herbert Died on March 3, 1948 at the age of seventy-one; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WOOD. R.B. Worked in the office of Messrs Fitzhardinge and Coleman, Wagga Wagga. Secretary of the Murrumbidgee Pastoral Association 1882-85 (WWA Sept 14, 1882). Died suddenly in April 1887 (WWA Apr 14, 1887).

WOOD, Robert John Son of Joseph and Isabella; born c.1874. Died on January 2, 1892 at the age of eighteen (WWMC).

WOOD, Thomas Born Yorkshire, England, on December 30, 1886. Served during World War I and had been gassed. Moved to Australia for the sake of his health in 1922. Lived at Malvern and then moved to Wagga Wagga in 1932. Head gardener for City of Wagga Wagga 1932-52. Died on October 19, 1963 at the age of seventy-seven. Son: Thomas ("Tom").

WOOD, Thomas ("Tom") Youngest child of Thomas and Mary. Born Lancashire, England, on August 22, 1918. Emigrated to Australia with his parents at the age of three. Employed by the Wagga Wagga City Council's Parks and Gardens Department for forty-two years; in charge of upgrading of Bolton Park; saw the construction and development of McPherson Oval, North Wagga Wagga, Gissing Oval, Harris Park, French Field, Ashmont Oval, Henwood Park, Kessler Park, Jubilee Park, the Botanic Gardens, Civic Theatre Gardens and Rawlings Park. Retired as superintendent on his 65th birthday on August 24, 1983. Made a Fellow of the Royal Australian Institute of Parks and Garden in 1961 and was the first person to win the Institute's Award of Merit in 1973. Tom Wood

WOODBRIIDGE, Alfred Born at Campbelltown, New South Wales. Lived at Lower Tarcutta for thirty-five years. Died at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital in August 1922 at the age of sixty-seven; buried Anglican Portion, Lower Tarcutta Cemetery (DA Aug 23 & 25, 1922). Children: Arthur; Frederick; Alfred; William; Mrs James Byrne (Wyalong); and Mrs John Spicer (Tumut).

WOODBRIIDGE, Alfred Enlisted by the end of January 1915 during World War I (DA Feb 11, 1915).

WOODBRIIDGE, Henry ("Harry") Son of Thomas. Born in Bonnie Doon, Victoria. . Educated in Victoria. Coachbuilder; apprenticeship in Victoria; and then went into business with his brother, Charles, at Euroa in the 1890s. Moved to Wagga Wagga to work for James Atherton. Then went into business on his own account at the corner of Morrow Street and Baylis Street (later the site of the Great Southern Motors). Then purchased land at the corner of Baylis Street and Tompson Street and went into business with his brother, John. Proprietor, Murrumbidgee Coach Factory (1900) and Byrne and Woodbridge (1902). Later blacksmith and veterinary at "Kerebin", Tompson Street, Wagga Wagga. Married Mary Jane McCrudden*. No family. Keen interest in sport especially horse racing. Veterinary surgeon to the Murrumbidgee Turf Club for many years. Died on January 6, 1931 at the age of sixty-five; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWA Feb 15, 1900;

DA Jan 7 & 8, 1931; and NSW Dir 1903).

WOODBRIIDGE, John Blacksmith, Wagga Wagga (NSW Dir, 1903).

WOODBRIIDGE, John Lived at Lower Tarcutta. Died at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital in January 1922 (DA Jan 4, 1922).

WOODBRIIDGE, Mary Jane Wife of Henry ("Harry") nee McCrudden. Lived at "Kerebin", 41 Tompson Street, Wagga Wagga. Died on November 3, 1927; buried Catholic Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Nov 4, 1927).

WOODBRIIDGE, Nancy Eileen Infant daughter of Alfred of Lower Tarcutta. Died on October 10, 1922; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Oct 11, 1922).

WOODEN Motor Trading Company, Baylis Street, Wagga Wagga, in 1926.

WOODEN, Benjamin Died at Marrar near Wagga Wagga on September 22, 1916; buried Presbyterian Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WOODEN, Margaret Wife of Benjamin. Resided at 26 Darlow Street, Wagga Wagga. Died at her residence on June 2, 1928 at the age of forty-eight; buried Presbyterian Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA June 4 & 5, 1928). Children: Leonard; Carl; Minnie; Lyla; Marjory; Mrs W. G. Rapley; and Mrs E.M. McGrath.

WOODFIELD, Hubert Manufacturing jeweller, The Newtown Jeweller, next to Huthwaites, Wagga Wagga, in the 1920s. Wife: Lalo.

WOODFIELD, Lalo Wife of Hubert. Resided in Wagga Wagga 1924-25. Died at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital in 1925; buried at Rookwood Cemetery (DA Mar 2, 1925).

W

WOODGATE, James Farmer, Tarcutta district, in 1872 (Grenville PO Dir).

WOODGATE, R. Enlisted during World War I (DA May 15, 1916).

WOODGER, W.J. Enlisted during World War I (DA May 15, 1916).

WOODHOUSE, G. President of the Wagga Wagga Lawn Tennis Club 1927-28 and then vice president 1929-30.

WOODHOUSE, George Son of Mrs M.A. of "Fairfield", Carabost. Lived on the land at Book Book. Enlisted early in 1917 during World War I; gunner; returned to Australia in 1919; listed on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga (DA July 25, 1919).

WOODHOUSE, George Died on August 10, 1968 at the age of seventy-six; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WOODHOUSE, Joseph Richard Died on December 9, 1913 at the age of forty-eight; buried at Humula.

WOODHOUSE, Mary Ann Died on July 1, 1955 at the age of eighty-seven; buried at Humula.

WOODHOUSE, Reverend Herbert When Methodist minister, New South Wales; attached to the Wagga Wagga Circuit; transferred to Queanbeyan in 1917 (DA Apr 5, 1917); and later to Glen Innes. Married Elsie King* at the Methodist Church, Wagga Wagga, in 1918 (DA July 11, 1918).

WOODLANDS, Alfred William Eldest son of Thomas; native of Wauchope, New South Wales. Teacher, Nowra district for several years and Downside Public School 1905-23. Member of the Masonic Lodge. Died on February 18, 1923 at the age of forty-five; buried Methodist Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Feb 19 & 20, 1923). Children: Alan; and Dorothy.

WOODLANDS, Alan Son of Alfred W. Attended Wagga Wagga High School in 1923.

WOODLANDS, Gordon Son of Thomas. Resided in Wagga Wagga c.1909. Employed by British General Electrical Company in 1923.

WOODLANDS, Harold Leslie Son of Thomas. Enlisted on November 3, 1916 during World War I; corporal, 1st Pioneer Battalion; served in France for twelve months; killed in action on April 26, 1918 (AWM Nominal Roll; and DA May 2, 1918).

WOODS, A.J. Born at Wagga Wagga. Resided in Tumbarumba, New South Wales. Enlisted in 1914 during World War I; wounded (left arm shattered) and was discharged. Businessman; conducting motor service between Wagga Wagga and Tumbarumba (DA Jan 12 & 22, 1918).

WOODS, C.N. Telegraphist, Wagga Wagga Telegraph Office, for eighteen months; transferred to Manilla, northern New South Wales, in 1923 (DA June 7, 1923). Well known rugby footballer. Engaged to Miss P. Luck of Wagga Wagga.

WOODS, F.W. Pharmacist; purchased business of Frank E. Medd* at Wagga Wagga. Liberal supporter of local institutions and movements; subscribed to the "kangaroo" march in 1915 during World War I (DA Nov 16, 1915). Sold pharmacy to R.L. Glazier* and retired to live in Sydney in 1916.

- WOODS, George W.** Clerk, employed by Edwin Bissel ("Ned") Tompson*, in 1885 (WWA Mar 28, 1885).
Wagga, 1873-78 (Burch; and WWE Aug 20, 1873).
- WOODS, J.D.** Enlisted during World War I (DA May 15, 1916).
- WOODS, J.G.R.** Allotted a block at the Toole's Creek Soldier Settlement (DA Dec 11, 1918); and a member of the Settlement's committee in 1919 (DA Apr 4, 1919).
- WOODS, Moses** Died on August 8, 1896 at the age of sixty-seven; buried Presbyterian Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WVMC).
- WOODS, Mrs R.** Daughter of Mrs Margaret Seymour*.
- WOODS, Mrs R.A.** Daughter of Henry Reberger*. Lived in Evans Street, Wagga Wagga, in 1928.
- WOODS, Mrs Stewart** Daughter of J.C. Manglesdorf*. Lived in Coolamon in 1902.
- WOOLCOTT, Frank Albert** Born Salecombe, Devonshire, England. Lived in Fitzmaurice Street, Wagga Wagga, for many years. Died at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital in April 1926 at the age of seventy-one; buried Methodist Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA May 1 & 3, 1926).
- WOOLF, J.** Owner of horse named "Troilus", ridden by A. Baker, which participated in the Murrumbidgee Turf Club's Ten Mile Race in 1868.
- WOOLLETT, K.** Lived in North Wagga Wagga in 1879 (Morris NWPS p.30); and had four children eligible to attend Pentlands' School, William (13), Alfred (10), Bertie (5) and Emily (9).
- WOOLLETT, William Henry** Publican; hotel at Gillenbah in the early 1860s and held an account with the Australian Joint Stock Bank, Wagga Wagga, 1860-61 (Ledger); later Riverine Hotel, Narrandera, in 1869; and then Black Swan Hotel, North Wagga
- WOOLLEY** Wardsman, Wagga Wagga Hospital, in the 1890s and the early 1900s while his wife was the cook (Morris ADB p.233; and WWA May 12, 1904).
- WOOLLEY, Mrs** Boarding house at corner of Morgan Street and Peter Street until 1915 when it was taken over by Miss McCarthy (DA Dec 11, 1915).
- WOOLLEY, Albert Ashton ("Bert")** Son of George W. Enlisted on May 28, 1916 during World War I; accepted on his second attempt; signaller, 35th Battalion; returned to Australia on June 12, 1919; listed on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga (AWM Nominal Roll; DA June 27, 1917; July 26, 1919; and Aug 15, 1919). Died on October 21, 1950 at the age of fifty-five; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WVMC). Daughter: Joyce.
- WOOLLEY, Daphne Jane** Died on May 5, 1943 at the age of forty-three (WVMC).
- WOOLLEY, George** Daughter: Stella Claremont.
- WOOLLEY, George** Died on February 7, 1934 at the age of seventy-six; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WVMC).
- WOOLLEY, George W.** Lived in Kincaid Street, Wagga Wagga, in 1917. Son: Albert Ashton ("Bert").
- WOOLLEY, Joyce** Daughter of Albert Ashton ("Bert"). Died on November 9, 1945 at the age of twenty.
- WOOLLEY, Louisa Caroline** Wife of George. Died on April 1, 1933 at the age of sixty-eight; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WVMC).
- WOOLLEY, Stella Claremont** Second daughter of George. Married Percy John Martin* at St John's Church,

WORMALL Slaughteryards at Wagga Wagga in 1875 (WWE Oct 2, 1875).

WORNES, J.W. Enlisted during World War I (DA May 15, 1916).

WORBY, S. Enlisted during World War I (DA may 15, 1916).

WORTH, M. Son of William. Enlisted during World War I; private, 3rd Battalion; wounded at the Dardanelles (DA June 1, 1915).

WORTH, William Employed at the Waterworks, Wagga Wagga, in 1915. Son: M.

WORTH, William Enlisted in 1915 during World War I; farewelled at the Methodist Church Hall; listed on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga (DA Oct 1, 1915).

WOTTON, A.C. Employed by the Union Bank, Wagga Wagga; left for Maitland, New South Wales, in 1896 (WWA Nov 7, 1896). Good cricketer and secretary of the Wagga Wagga Cricket Club.

WRATHALL, Robert Burrows Emigrated to Australia in the early 1850s. Arrived in Wagga Wagga in the early 1870s as a supercargo on one of the first river steamers; and remained for the following thirty years. Merchant-agent in partnership with Townly Edmondson*, James S. Edmondson* and James S. Lupton* (Messrs T. Edmondson and Co). Secretary of the Wagga Wagga Steam Navigation Company which had its headquarters at Wagga Wagga. Later a part owner of "Mittagong" station and took up residence there c.1885. Quiet and reserved; though committee member of the Murrumbidgee Pastoral and Agricultural Association. Died on February 14, 1901 at the age of sixty-eight; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWA Feb 14, 1901; and WWMC).

WREN, Caroline Annie Mary Third daughter of Erasmus and Caroline. Died on January 13, 1876; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery.

WREN, Caroline Susannah Elizabeth Wife of Erasmus. Died on April 8, 1894 at the age of seventy-four; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery.

WREN, Eliza Emma Daughter of Erasmus and Caroline. Married Arthur Paris Fenner*.

WREN, Emily Geraldine Wife of Walter. Died at the residence of Dr Wren on January 26, 1900 at the age of thirty-one after giving birth with influenza; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery.

WREN, Dr Erasmus Born Eastwood, Essex, England; and by 1837 a member of the Royal College of Surgeons in England, Licentiate of the Royal Cllege of Physicians and a Licenced Apothecary in London. Emigrated to Tasmania. Registered as a Medical Practitioner in New South Wales by 1844. Lived in Deniliquin for many years and an alderman there in 1871. Moved to Wagga Wagga in 1873; opened a dispensary in Gurwood Street (Tichborne Buildings) and was appointed a Medical Officer at the Wagga Wagga Hospital (Morris ADB pp.18, 22, 24, 122f, 124, 150 & 255; NSW Dir, 1903; and WWA Jan 15, 1873). Also Government Medical Officer for many years and Visiting Surgeon at the Wagga Wagga Gaol. Member of the Church Improvement Committee, St John's Anglican Church, Wagga Wagga. First medical officer to the Wagga Wagga Fire Brigade. Signed the request to J. Henry Douglas requesting him to stand as a candidate for parliament, Murrumbidgee Electorate (WWA Oct 26, 1880). Lived at "Aratong", Fox Street, Wagga Wagga. Died on March 6, 1905 at the age of ninety; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery. Wife: Caroline Susannah Elizabeth.

W

Children: Walter; Harry; Eliza Emma; and Caroline Annie Mary.

WREN, Hal Son of William Weld (Wren). Killed in action during World War I.

WREN, Henry ("Harry") Son of Erasmus and Caroline. Solicitor; articled to Messrs Henry B. Fitzhardinge* and George Coleman* at Wagga Wagga; and completed articles with M.A.H. Fitzhardinge* of Sydney; then solicitor at Narrandera and Brewarrina. Good athlete; one of Wagga Wagga's first footballers; and with Charles Hardy* was chosen in the New South Wales team which played against Queensland in 1884 (WWA Aug 9, 1884); represented Wagga Wagga against Junee, Albury and other towns and captained the Wagga Wagga team in 1888-89; also secretary-treasurer of the Wagga Football Association. Played cricket for the Newtown Cricket Club and later the Wagga Wagga Club, represented Wagga Wagga against Adelong and Junee; and played for the Wagga Wagga District 22 against the English XI in 1885 and again in 1888; secretary of the Wagga Wagga Cricket Club in 1888. Also played tennis; and represented Wagga Wagga in matches against Junee, Young, Albury and Goulburn 1887-89. Died in November 1928 (WWA May 5, 1885; and DA Nov 21 & 22, 1928).

WREN, Walter Son of Erasmus and Caroline. Married Emily Geraldine Desailly, daughter of Alfred Desailly, well known squatter in the Riverina area. Children: three daughters.

WREN, William Weld Son of Henry of Bega, New South Wales. Manager of "Kameruka" estate owned by Sir Robert Lucas Tooth. Then manager of his father's estate, "Terraganda". Married his first cousin, a daughter of Dr Erasmus Wren. Died in May 1919 at the age of seventy-two (DA May 12, 1919). Children: Hal (deceased); Clive

(Bega); Weld (Bega) and five daughters.

WRIGHT, Heaton and Co Cash buyers, Wagga Wagga, in the early 1900s (NSW Dir, 1903; and WWA).

WRIGHT, Alice Elizabeth Daughter of William and Mary. Born on August 8, 1880. Married Alfred John Rudd* at Newtown, Sydney, on June 10, 1899.

WRIGHT, Charlotte Married William Brown* at St John's Anglican Church, Wagga Wagga.

WRIGHT, Doreen Mavis Infant daughter of George. Died in December 1920 (DA Dec 17, 1920).

WRIGHT, Doris Second daughter of George. Married Frederick Ings at St John's Anglican Church, Wagga Wagga on September 22, 1923 (DA Oct 8, 1923).

WRIGHT, Ellen Daughter of Joseph and Sarah Ann. Born on December 26, 1833. Married Thomas Laney* at St Luke's Lower Norwood, Parish of Lambeth, Surrey, England, on March 20, 1853. Moved to New South Wales in 1856.

WRIGHT, Frank Manager, Union Theatres Ltd, Wagga Wagga, for some time; transferred to Sydney in 1920 and succeeded by Arthur Read* (DA July 26 & 30, 1920). Good entertainer; popular; and ever ready to assist charitable movements.

WRIGHT, Frederick Born in England. Labourer. Single. Anglican. No place of residence. Died at the Wagga Wagga District Hospital on December 26, 1900 at the age of fifty-one (WWDH Reg).

WRIGHT, George Born in Victoria. Businessman; conducted various confectioners' shops including the Wonderland Arcade Cafe, Wagga Wagga, in 1923. Member of the Wagga Wagga District Ambulance. Married Minnie Hulme. Lived at 11 Albury Street, Wagga Wagga, in his latter years. Died on April 11, 1943 at the age of seventy

W

(DA Apr 12, 1943). Children: Doris; Edith; and William.

WRIGHT, George Lived in Wall Street, North Wagga Wagga, in 1920. Daughter: Doreen Mavis.

WRIGHT, George Son of John and Jessie; born c.1882. Married Ethel Mary McClung at Wagga Wagga in 1905.

WRIGHT, Gladys Pearl Eldest daughter of G., North Wagga Wagga. Married Ernest Harold Carter at St John's Anglican Church, Wagga Wagga, on February 15, 1922 (DA Mar 14, 1922).

WRIGHT, H. Bootmaker and repairer, Wagga Wagga, in 1910.

WRIGHT, H.H. Attended Wagga Wagga Primary School. Enlisted during World War I.

WRIGHT Helen ("Ellen") Daughter of William and Mary; born c.1874. Married William Diessel.

WRIGHT, J. Lived at Grong Grong. Enlisted during World War I; wounded in 1918 (DA Nov 22, 1918).

WRIGHT, John Died in December 1856; buried Old Cemetery, Church Hill, Wagga Wagga.

WRIGHT, John Died on December 27, 1876 at the age of sixty-one; buried Catholic Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WRIGHT, John Son of William and Annie Eleanor. Married (1) Janet Powell nee Drover in 1874; one child, William. Married (2) Jessie Thompson in 1881; and three children, George B., James; and Thomas, were born at Wangaratta, Victoria.

WRIGHT, John Coachbuilder, Wagga Wagga; employed by W.J. Blake*; and then purchased Blake's factory, formed a partnership with Peter Rae* (Rae and Wright; later Rae, Wright, Davidge and King; then Rae, Wright and King and again Rae and Wright) and

moved to Johnston Street; partnership dissolved by mutual consent in 1891; and then chief coachsmith for Patrick Hehir*; (Morris NWWDHS No.245 Feb/Mar 1987; DA Feb 11 & 16, 1886; July 9, 1891; Apr 29, 1893; and May 13, 1893). Member of the Wagga Wagga Fire Brigade.

WRIGHT, Joseph Son of William and Sarah (Witts). Born c.1812; and baptized North Moreton in Berkshire, England, on August 16, 1812. Labourer. Married (1) Sarah Ann Eggleton in 1832. Married (2) Mary Palmer c.1838. Married (3) Rebecca Jeffrey c.1843. Came to New South Wales with Rebecca and son, William, on the **Aloe** on July 31, 1857. Farmer, Coreinbob Road, Kyeamba Creek. Died on March 4, 1876. Children (1): Ellen; and a son. Children (2): son who died at the age of two c.1841. Children (3): William.

WRIGHT, Joseph Son of William and Mary; born c.1867.

WRIGHT, Mary Wife of William nee George. Died on September 26, 1881; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery.

WRIGHT, Minnie Wife of George. Died on November 17, 1952 at the age of seventy-four; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WRIGHT, Moses Vice president, Wagga Wagga branch, Shearers' Union, in 1894 (WWA Feb 1, 1894).

WRIGHT, Rebecca Wife of Joseph nee Jeffrey. Born at Sundridge, Kent, England c.1816. Arrived in Australia on the **Aloe** on July 31, 1857. Married (2) Michael Maloney in 1880.

WRIGHT, Rebecca Harriet Daughter of William and Mary; born c.1871. Married John Broadhurst.

WRIGHT, Samuel Bootmaker near Wollundry Lagoon, Wagga Wagga (NSW Dir, 1903).

W

WRIGHT, Walter V. Overseer at Wagga Wagga. Enlisted on November 14, 1914 during World War I; private, 4th Battalion; awarded a Military Medal; returned to Australia on January 10, 1918 at the age of twenty-three (AWM Nominal Roll).

WRIGHT, William Son of Joseph and Rebecca. Born in England c.1843. Arrived in Australia on **Aloe** on July 31, 1857. Married Mary George at Yass, New South Wales, on January 18, 1864. Farmer, Alfredtown, Wagga Wagga District. Died in 1887. Children: Joseph; William Jonah; Rebecca Harriet; Ellen; and Alice Elizabeth.

WRIGHT, William Married Annie Eleanor Curphy in 1835. Lived at Kyeamba in the 1840s and 1850s. Blacksmith and publican; held the licence for Travellers Joy Inn, Kyeamba, in 1853 (Burch). Children: Margaret; Mary Ann; John; George; and Annie.

WRIGHT, William Jonah Son of William and Mary; born c.1876.

WRIGHT, William Robert Enlisted before the end of January 1915 during World War I (DA Feb 11, 1915).

WULFF, Charles Eldest son of Christian Henry Theodore. Married Mabel Faulkner, Bexley, on August 28, 1909 (WWA Sept 7, 1909). Employed in the Postal Department, Sydney, in 1915. Lived in Orange, New South Wales, in 1919.

WULFF, Christian Heirich Theodore Married Elizabeth Matilda Schosnnich. Moved to Wagga Wagga in the 1860s. Foreman for Messrs Hardy and Co for some time; and later a builder-contractor. Resided in Murray Street, Wagga Wagga. Died at his residence on February 18, 1915 at the age of seventy-one; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Feb 19 & 22, 1915). Children: Ferdinand Theodore; Edward

Alfred; Theodore William ("Tadell"); Charles; and Dora.

WULFF, Constance S.A. Probably the wife of Theodore William ("Tadell"). Died on April 4, 1874 at the age of eighty-eight; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WULFF, Edward Alfred Son of Christian Henry Theodore and Elizabeth Matilda. Born at Wagga Wagga. Building contractor. Left Wagga Wagga for Narrandera c.1921. Died on October 30, 1956 at the age of seventy-one (DA Oct 31, 1956).

WULFF, Elizabeth Matilda Wife of Christian Henry Theodore. Born Mornington, Victoria. Resided in Morgan Street, Wagga Wagga. Died on September 17, 1919 at the age of sixty-eight; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Sept 18 & 20, 1919).

WULFF, Eva Lilian Wife of Ferdinand nee Montgomery. Died in Sydney in February 1943 at the age of fifty-four (DA Feb 24, 1943). Children: Dorothy; Eric; Noel; and Jeffrey.

WULFF, Ferdinand Theodore Son of Christian Heinrich Theodore and Elizabeth Matilda; born c.1883. Builder, bricklayer contractor, 10 Peter Street, Wagga Wagga (DA June 21, 1925, 1926, 1927 & 1928). Married Eva Lilian Montgomery* on July 9, 1910 (Ang Reg).

WULFF, Henry Son of William Henry and Dinah. Born at Hornburg, Germany c.1871. Labourer, Wagga Wagga. Married Laura Maud Hodges (daughter of Albert Victor and Sarah Ann) on June 13, 1900 (Ang Reg).

WULFF, Mrs T. Daughter of George Henry Tilden*. Lived in Wagga Wagga in 1945.

WULFF, Theodore William ("Tadell") Youngest son of Christian Heinrich Theodore and Elizabeth Matilda. Builder.

Resided at 11 Coleman Street West, Wagga Wagga. Died at the Lewisham Hospital (later Calvary Hospital), Wagga Wagga, on July 16, 1946 at the age of fifty-seven; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC). Children: William (Wagga Wagga); Norman (Wagga Wagga); Mrs W. Birch (Griffith); and Mrs C. Casley (Collingullie).

WULFING, Frederick, W. Teacher; pupil teacher at Cleveland Street Public School from 1877; assistant teacher at Singleton Public School from October 1883; assistant teacher at Blue Gum Flat Public School from October 1886; teacher at Gerringong from March 1891; and head teacher at North Wagga Public School from 1898 (Morris NWPS p.36). Active interest in the benevolent branch of the local Freemasons' Lodge. Died (throat consumption) on February 1, 1902 at the age of thirty-eight, leaving a widow and three sons, the eldest thirteen and the youngest four (WWA Feb 4, 1902).

WUNSCH, Alice Margaret Wife of Andrew Louis nee Jackson. Lived Beckwith Street, Wagga Wagga. Died on January 3, 1939 at the age of sixty-seven (DA Jan 5, 1939).

WUNSCH, Andrew Louis ("Louis") Son of Christian and Marie. Draper (1895) and shop assistant (1899); employed by Messrs David Copland* and Co, Wagga Wagga, for many years. Fruiterer in the early 1900s (NSW Dir, 1903). Married Alice Margaret Jackson*. Lived at 26 Beckwith Street, Wagga Wagga; and in Best Street in 1897. Died after a lingering illness in April 1918 at the age of forty-eight; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Apr 25 & 27, 1918). Children: Louis Alva (or Alva Louis); Claude Maxwell; Harold Raymond; Gordon Bernard ("Dick"); Wilga Thelma; and Phyllis.

WUNSCH, Christian Came to Australia from Heidelberg,

Germany, c.1864. Miller; at first employed at a flour mill in Albury; then moved to Wodonga and conducted a flour mill and saw mills of his own for about ten years; then moved to Wagga Wagga, still following the milling industries, c.1876; for some years in business with George Dobbys of Junee at Mt Elliot near Whitton. Died (heart failure) on July 23, 1911 at the age of seventy-three (DA July 25, 1911). Wife: Marie. Children: George; Edward; Andrew Louis ("Louis"); Minnie; and Mrs F. Paris.

WUNSCH, Claude Maxwell Son of Andrew Louis and Alice Margaret. Born on November 28, 1894; and baptized on February 16, 1895 (Ang Reg). Attended Wagga Wagga Primary School Member of the Half Holiday Tennis Club, Wagga Wagga. Enlisted on January 19, 1915 during World War I; private, 4th Battalion; killed on action on August 6, 1915 at the age of twenty-one; listed on the Soldiers' Memorial and the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga (AWM Nominal Roll; DA Mar 16, 1916; June 24, 1916; and Sept 18, 1922).

WUNSCH, Cyril Edward Eldest son of Edward. Married Miss Mary Smith on June 16, 1926 (DA July 20, 1926).

WUNSCH, Dorothy Belle Daughter of Lewis and Emma. Born on October 22, 1900; and baptized on November 21, 1900 (Ang Reg).

WUNSCH, Edward Son of Christian and Marie. Employed by David Copland* and Co, Wagga Wagga, for thirty-nine years; one of the seven heads of department (the boot department) in 1908 (WWA June 16, 1908); retired in 1921 (DA Apr 14, 1921). Married a daughter of Thomas Henry Lawson Robinson. Good cricketer; played for the Half Holiday Club, second in batting and bowling averages in the 1896-97 season and won the trophy for taking the most catches; also played football and

W

represented Wagga Wagga in a match against Albury. Assisted the family of Charles John Tompson* during the flood of 1891 (WWA July 2, 1891). Lived in Beckwith Street, Wagga Wagga, in 1925. Sons: Cyril Edward; and Roy.

WUNSCH, Elaine Margaret Daughter of Gordon Bernard ("Dick") and Elsie M. Died on July 2, 1959 at the age of twenty-one; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA July 3, 1958 p.2).

WUNSCH, Eliza Janet ("Janet") Wife of George Lewis nee Bannantyne. Died on May 20, 1950 at the age of seventy-five; buried Presbyterian Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (WWMC).

WUNSCH, George Lewis Son of Christian and Marie. Born at Albury, New South Wales, c.1866. Came to Wagga Wagga as a child with his parents. Attended Gurwood Street Public School; pupil of Peter Durie*, John Dart and Thomas Bonny. Entered the office of Messrs Roberts and Copland, Wagga Wagga, as junior clerk at the age of thirteen and remained with the firm (later David Copland* and Co) for about forty-five years; appointed chief clerk on the retirement of Charles Scott, accountant; later associated with F.F. Copland* in the conduct of the business; acting manager while F.F. Copland was in England in 1924; always devoted to the affairs of the company and declined to take holidays. Associated with several public activities in Wagga Wagga. Prominent cricketer; secretary-treasurer of the Commercial Cricket Club in 1891; and treasurer of the Wagga Wagga Cricket Association in 1897. Also a keen footballer and tennis player. Prominently connected with th organisation and the administration of annual Combined Friendly Societies and Shearers Union's Sports. Foundation member of the Independant Order of Oddfellows, American Order, and to his energy and organising

ability as honorary secretary was due largely the rapid progress made by this friendly society in Wagga Wagga; became Grand Master for New South Wales (1886-1921). Well known in Masonic circles and was a Past Worshipful Master of Lodge Harmony for which he was also secretary for several years. Married Eliza Janet ("Janet") Bannantyne*. WUNSCH, Gordon Bernard ("Dick") Son of Andrew Louis and Alice Margaret. Born at Wagga Wagga on May 12, 1906; and baptized on June 17, 1906 (Ang Reg). Painting contractor; lived in Wagga Wagga all his life. Keen sportsman especially cricket and later a member of South Wagga Bowling Club. Died at the Wagga Wagga Base Hospital on May 18, 1958 at the age of fifty-two; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA May 19, 1958). Wife: Elsie. Children: Elaine Margaret; and David.

WUNSCH, Harold Raymond Son of Andrew Louis and Alice Margaret. Lived in Newcastle in 1939/58.

WUNSCH, Jack Stanley Son of Lewis Edward and Emma. Born on May 19, 1905; and baptized on February 24, 1906 (Ang Reg).

WUNSCH, Louis Alva (or Alva Louis) Son of Andrew Louis and Alice Margaret. Born on January 6, 1897; and baptized on March 6, 1897 (Ang Reg). Attended Wagga Wagga Primary School. Enlisted on February 15, 1916 during World War I; private, 56th Battalion; wounded in 1917; and again in 1918; listed on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga (DA Mar 5, 1917; June 13, 1918; and Aug 13, 1918). Died from the effects of World War I.

WUNSCH, Marie Wife of Christian. Lived in Beckwith Street, Wagga Wagga, for many years. Died in March 1924; buried Anglican Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Mar 25, 1924).

WUNSCH, Mary Wife of Cyril Edward; only daughter of S.M. Smith of Wagga Wagga and later Narrandera.

WUNSCH, Mary Josephine Nee Moffatt. Married (2) William Arthur Devlin*. Son: Henry William (Wunsch).

WUNSCH, Phyllis Hannah Marie Daughter of Andrew Louis and Alice Margaret. Born on March 31, 1899; and baptized on May 20, 1899 (Ang Reg). Married J. Pette; and lived in Melbourne, Victoria, in 1939/58.

WUNSCH, Roy Son of Edward. Member of the Half Holiday Tennis Club; and of Manchester Unity Independant Order of Oddfellows, Wagga Wagga. Enlisted on August 19, 1914 during World War I; private, 2nd Battalion, at Mena Camp, Egypt; later corporal and then sergeant, 1st Infantry Brigade; wounded (shot in the left shoulder) at the Dardanelles in May 1915; wounded again (in left knee) in the charges on Lone Pine in 1915 and taken to hospital in Malta and then England; returned to the front in France; and wounded for third time at Pozieres in July 1916; wounded for fourth time on October 4, 1916 at Ypres; and for the fifth time (in the right leg) on May 27, 1918 at Strazelle near Hazelbrook; taken to England; returned to Australia on December 9, 1918 and welcomed to Wagga Wagga in January 1919; listed on the Memorial Arch, Wagga Wagga (AWM Nominal Roll; DA May 15, 1915; June 9, 1915; Nov 11, 1915; Mar 16, 1916; Jan 3, 1917; Jan 6, 1917; Nov 1, 1917; and Jan 31, 1919). Married in Sydney in July 1920; and given a handsome clock by the employees of Messrs David Copland and Co (DA July 17, 1920).

WUNSCH, Wilga Thelma Daughter of Andrew Louis and Alice Margaret. Born on June 23, 1901; and baptized on August 31, 1901 (Ang Reg). Married Alf Sadlier*; deceased by 1958.

WYATT, Ransome Tovey Teller, Union Bank, Wagga Wagga, 1910-14. Active worker in the Church of England, Wagga Wagga, and a member of vestry and choir. Secretary and treasurer of the School of Arts Society; and took a leading role in the formation of the Arts and Craft Society. Resigned from the bank in 1914 to accept appointment as the Registrar of the Anglican Diocese of Goulburn (DA May 12, 1914). Enlisted on September 7, 1916 during World War I; private, 55th Battalion; seems to have been promoted to sergeant; returned to Australia on May 22, 1917 (AWM Nominal Roll; DA May 23, 1917; and July 20, 1917). Resumed duty at the registry at Goulburn in 1919 (DA Aug 4, 1919).

WYLD, Alfred Norman Eldest son of Benjamin of "Everleigh", Gilgandra, New South Wales. Enlisted on April 20, 1916 during World War I; gunner, 6th Army Australian Field Artillery; returned to Australia on July 1, 1919 and welcomed to Wagga Wagga in September 1919 at Samuel Angel's Albury Road residence (AWM Nominal Roll; DA Jan 24, 1916; and DA Sept 16, 1919). Married Olive Bertha Angel* (DA Mar 17, 1925).

WYLE, Mary Died on February 27, 1923 at the age of eighty-three; buried Presbyterian Portion, Wagga Wagga Cemetery (DA Mar 1, 1923; and WWMC). Son: B.J. (Albury Road, Wagga Wagga).

WYLIE, H. Gibson Conducted the Wagga Wagga Grammar School, Tompson Street, Wagga Wagga, in 1891.

WYNDHAM, J.P. Employed at the Wagga Wagga branch of the Union Bank for many years; transferred

to Warracnabeal branch as accountant; and later promoted to manager of the Blayney branch in 1903 (WWA July 11, 1903). Played cricket for the Wollundry Club, Wagga Wagga, in the late 1890s.
