

More Digitised Records

OpenGov NSW is a searchable online repository for NSW Government publications. It contains annual reports, strategic plans, guides, policy documents, and open access information released under the Government Information (Public Access) Act 2009 (GIPA Act) which has been published by NSW Government agencies.

Off interest to members will be documents such as the NSW Department of Main Roads Journals from 1929 through 1984. Another valuable resource for researchers.

NSW State Parliament Announces ON-LINE access to records of the First Legislative Council.

Over 60,000 documents, the **Digitised records of the First Legislative Council (1824 - 1855)**, are now available on the NSW Parliament's website

The First Legislative Council, the precursor to the current NSW Parliament, is the oldest legislative body in Australia, having been established in 1823 as an advisory body of 5 appointed members. Initially the Council's jurisdiction covered not only NSW, but also the colonies of Victoria, Tasmania, parts of Queensland, South Australia and even further afield.

RAHS President, Associate Professor Carol Liston, launched this fabulous collection of materials at Parliament House in March 2017. Examples are the Census Bill of 1828: an Act for ascertaining number, names and condition of the inhabitants of NSW; the Female Felons Factory Act 1829: an Act compelling married men to send for their wives, or to maintain them after the expiration of their sentence to the female factory, in order to save the expense to the public; and the University of Sydney Bill 1850, to name a few. Many of the records are handwritten and over time some of the early original material has become faded and in some places illegible. The papers are available for download as pdf files, to assist with your research. The records can be accessed at, "https://www.parliament.nsw.gov.au/hansard/pages/firstcouncil.aspx", along with other parliamentary records

Miss Wagga Wagga: 1949-1954. Part 2

December 1948 Carnival. This was the first year of the new carnival, which was now organised by the Wagga Wagga and District Chamber of Commerce.⁴⁸ Arrangements for New Year's Eve 1948 were much more extensive than for previous years. Seven city blocks were closed off for the carnival - an area bounded by Johnston, Forsyth, Peter and Tarcutta Streets - and the Miss Wagga Wagga and the Ugly Man competitions were primary features of the programme.

The procession commenced at 7 pm at the head of Baylis Street (at its intersection with Edward Street), travelled down Baylis Street and into Fitzmaurice Street, as far as Kincaid Street. The compere for the evening was Sydney radio hillbilly, and Columbia recording artist, Terry McNamara. The carnival featured street dancing, floats, plenty of confetti, and rides for the kids.⁴⁹

There was an enormous crowd in attendance, said to be as many as ten thousand people. The parade was led by a police motor truck, followed by three police motor bikes and then a fire engine and an ambulance. These were followed by the floats, the first of which was the Miss Wagga Wagga float, and the second was the Ugly Man float, which drew a lot of laughs. There were two other decorated floats.⁵⁰

Once the parade concluded the main attraction was a stream of entertainment from a stage at the council chambers' steps. Some twenty artists performed to an estimated crowd of some four thousand people. The entertainment ranged from mock trials, comedians, dance bands and hillbilly items. The comperes for the evening were Russ Ailling from radio station 2WG and Terry McNamara, a recording artist with Columbia Records in Sydney.

In the hour preceding midnight, Mr JA Johnstone was declared winner of the Ugly Man contest, he raising just over £700, well clear of his nearest competitor, Mr Kevin Carmody, who raised just over £130. The other two finalists in this completion were Charles Hartwig and J McPherson.

The concept of an Ugly Man competition first appears during the period of WW1 and was a common means of raising funds for returned soldiers and the monuments associated with those who had fallen. The first such competition in Wagga Wagga appears to have been in 1921, as part of the Anzac week celebrations.⁵¹ The basic concept was to see who collected the most votes – the latter sometimes being awarded at the rate of one vote for each penny (or other value) donated.⁵²

Miss Wagga 1949. There was much more interest in the Miss Wagga Wagga competition, with votes still being counted up until the last minutes. The eventual winner was Miss Thena Karofilis (Miss Cafes) who raised just over £1,636. Second place went to Miss Bernice Foster (Miss Sports) and third was Miss Joyce Peacock (Miss Commerce North), with Miss Doreen Waldon (Miss Commerce South) in fourth position.⁵³

When the clock struck midnight the crowd all joined hands and sang Auld Lang Syne, after which they all danced and sang some more.⁵⁴ Some two thousand people attended special midnight showings at the two picture theatres.⁵⁵

Miss Wagga 1950. In December 1949, thousands of Wagga Wagga citizens enjoyed the Wagga mardi gras on New Year's Eve. A highlight of the evening was the crowning of Miss Patricia Walker as Miss Wagga 1950. This was the second year of the carnival/mardi gras, and it was hosted by Harry Mossfield.

The full programme was spread over eight days, commencing on the 24th December and finishing on Saturday 31st December. There were events planned for every day except Xmas Day. The New Year's Eve programme featured a procession, headed by a police motor cycle flanked by two police cars, then followed by a fire engine, an ambulance and two armoured cars. After these came the Wagga City Band followed by the various floats and the crowds of people. The procession moved down Baylis Street, from Morgan Street to Johnson Streets. Radio 2WG broadcast from the street and street dancing continued into the New Year.

At 10 pm, a young Wagga Wagga bank clerk, Miss Patricia Walker was declared Miss Wagga Wagga, 1950. Miss Paula Glazier was runner up with Miss Patricia Spice placed third.

The other contestants, for Miss Wagga 1951, were Kathleen Bullen, Elaine Ellis, An Harvey, Betty Morrow, Marjorie Johnson, Beatrice White, Rita Rath, Enid Pilcha and Patricia Cowley. The girls all appeared on stage, where they were introduced firstly to the Mayor, Alderman HE Gissing and Mrs Gissing, and then secondly to the crowd.⁵⁷

Miss Wagga 1951. The programme was spread over five days in 1950 with celebrations finishing in the early hours on Sunday 1st January 1951. All funds raised were to go towards the construction of a town hall in Wagga Wagga. Mr Harry Mossfield was the compere again.

The main attractions of the five day Mardi Gras and New Year's celebrations were as follows:

- 1. Riverina Talent Quest (Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday).
- 2. Riverina Square Dance Championship (Friday).
- 3. Pillow Pillow Fight over Water Championship (Saturday afternoon).
- 4. Children's Bubble Gum Championship (Saturday afternoon).
- 5. Coronation 'Miss Wagga 1951' (Saturday).
- 6. Big Street Procession (Saturday afternoon, commencing 2.30).

Official advice had been received by the Secretary of the Wagga Chamber of Commerce (Mr. J. Hamill) that Cinesound Productions, of Sydney, would be sending a newsreel camera and crew to Wagga on December 29 to photograph the procession, the coronation of Miss Wagga and other features of the Mardi Gras and New Year celebrations. In addition, the Australian Broadcasting Commission would have a field unit in attendance on Saturday morning making wire recording of various features of the programme, and at night a direct broadcast was to be made, over Station 2CO, covering the coronation of Miss Wagga 1951.⁵⁸

The five days of events raised some £5,700 towards the erection of a town hall. With some sixteen thousand people looking on, Miss Marjorie Johnson (Miss Industry) was crowned Miss Wagga Wagga



1951, by the mayor, Alderman HE Gissing.

Miss Johnson had raised £2,412, whilst Miss Patricia McMullen (Miss Commerce South) came second with a tally of £1,841.

Third place went to Miss June Lyford (Miss Public Service).

The other candidates had been Miss Joan Tennison (Miss Cafes) and Miss Noela Koetz (Miss Sports).⁵⁹

Miss Wagga 1952. In December 1951 there were eleven nominations for Miss Wagga 1952. They were: Maureen O'Halloran, student; Jean Burness, clerk; Mildred Harris, bank employee; Sue Stubbs, teacher; Geraldine Foster, bank employee; Winsome Chapman, hairdresser; Fay McKinnon, shop assistant; Margaret Rutzou, receptionist; Clare Maloney, shop assistant, and two sisters, Bernlce and Muriel Henseleit. Bernlce was a telephonist and Muriel was a business girl. Margaret Rutzou had, in this year, been declared Bell of Balls at the Chamber of Commerce Community Ball.⁶¹

An estimated crowd of some eighteen thousand people witnessed the crowning of Miss Jean Burness as Miss Wagga Wagga 1952. Sydney radio identity, Mr Harry Mossfield was again the compere, whilst the presentation was made by the new mayor, Alderman WF Dunne. Miss Burness had lived in Wagga Wagga for some three years, her parents' home being at Wolseley Park, near Tumbarumba.⁶²

Miss Wagga 1953. The entrants for Miss Wagga Wagga, 1953, were: Miss Patricia Smith – Sydney University student; Miss Murlene L Bannon jeweller's assistant; Miss Margaret Olive Preston – clerk typist; Miss Janice Ann Ratliff – shorthand typist; Miss Elvie Rose Birkinshaw – business executive; Miss Eve Beverley Birkin – sales girl; Miss Margaret Mary Rutzou – stenographer; Miss Margaret Patricia Candish – Technical College teacher, and Miss Ann Doreen Birkin – sales girl.⁶³ An estimated crowd of sixteen to seventeen thousand people watched as the Mayor, Alderman WF Dunne, crowned Miss Margaret Rutzou, as the 1953 Miss Wagga Wagga.⁶⁴

Miss Wagga 1954. In December 1953 there were thirteen candidates for the title of Miss Wagga 1954, including two sisters, Margaret Mary Murdoch (clerical assistant) and Barbara Mary Murdoch (telephonist). The other candidates were: Marjorie Patricia Candish (teacher); Patricia Clark (showroom assistant); Annette Clear (teacher of operatic ballet dancing); Marie Jennings (salesgirl); Margaret Preston (clerk); Jennice Ann Ratliff (stenographer) ; Beverley Robertson (bank officer); June Silverstone (hairdresser); Margaret Storey (student teacher); Enid Thomas (comptometer operator) ; and Patricia Dodwell (home duties).⁶⁶



The local press described the 1953 New Year's Eve mardi gras as the, "gayest and brightest," since 1946 and estimated the crowd at sixteen thousand people, with numbers being swelled by a large number of people from other towns. It was a fancy dress night and many people, mostly children, wore fancy hats and masks, and blew noisy trumpets. Fancy hats, along with the noisy trumpets and bugles could be purchased at a stall in front of the council chambers.⁶⁷

Margaret had been a contestant in the 1953 competition, but fared better in the 1954 contest.⁶⁸

These early carnivals demonstrate just how significant the role of the Chamber of Commerce was in developing the Miss Wagga Wagga contests, and highlight the enjoyment brought to so many adults and children through the mardi gras concept, with crowds of up to eighteen thousand people - happy, singing and dancing in the streets, enjoying family entertainment.
